Evidencing hardiness of trail-blazing pioneers, 2,500 old settlers of Callahan County braved 100-degree temperature here Friday and celebrated together in their 24th annual reunion.

The old-timers' get-together, which opened with a parade at 9 a.m., was filled with activity from early morning to late that night.

Registration for the one-day affair, was followed by group singing led by Mrs. Vida Hill and Mrs. Dorothy Boydston Harper. Singers were accompanied by Barbara Ann Brooks on the accordion.

Meade F. Griffin of Austin, associate Supreme Court justice and outgoing president of the Pioneers' Association, gave the welcoming talk. The welcome was followed by group singing and a silent tribute to deceased pioneers.

Archie Simmon, 66, of Big Spring won first place in the old fiddlers contest. Second place went to Joe Burleson, 73, of Anson and third was taken by John H. Deathridge, 83, of Abilene. Elmer Gardiner, 68, of

Abilene took fourth. Bob Blakley of Aspermont was selected the earliest cowboy and earliest man in the county, coming here in 1878. The earliest pioneer woman award went to Mrs. Nuff Arvin of Cottonwood who arrived in 1879.

The earliest pioneer man with continued residence was George Blakley of Rowden who came to the county in 1883, and the similar award for a woman went to Mrs. Jennie Baum of Cross Plains who was born here in 1878.

The oldest native-born man present at the reunion was Curtis Oglesby of Cross Plains who was born here in 1877. Mrs. Baum was the oldest native woman.

Mrs. Baum was also the oldest native-born woman with continued residence and H. L. Harris of Cross Plains who was born here in 1879 was the comparable among the men.

Louis Nichols of San Bernardino, Calif., and Clara Nell McDermott Barr of Angleton, Tex., came the greatest distance.

## Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine To Be Given On Sept. 16

Twenty-seven persons from Baird and Cross Plains met in the school cafeteria here Monday night and laid plans for a countywide mass immunization program against polio.

Sept. 16 — a Sunday — was the date designated for the immunization effort. That same date will be observed in Taylor, Shackelford and Callahan Counties.

Representatives of pharma-

ceutical manufacturers were present and explained how the program is being successfully operated in other areas.

The vaccine to be utilized here is of the Sabin oral variety. It is administered by drinking a small glass of water to which two cubic centimeters of the drug have been mixed. The fluid is tasteless and causes no reactions, say physicians and health officials.

In Cross Plains Byron Richardson was named chief coordinator. It will be his responsibility to secure and assign qualified medical and administrative personnel. Dr. Carl J. Sohns, city health officer, Mrs. John Purvis, registered nurse, and Ike Neal, pharmacist, have reported themselves available for this public service.

In Baird the community coordinator will be Elton Ables, Chamber of Commerce manager. He will be assisted by Mrs. J. L. Ault, county public school nurse, physicians and druggists.

Richardson points out that the immunization effort in Cross Plains will not be confined to Callahan County. All residents of this school district, many of whom live in Eastland, Brown and Coleman Counties, are expected to avail themselves to the vaccine here.

Although plans are not complete, the immunization program in Cross Plains will probably be carried out at one of the buildings on the school campus. There will be no charge for the vaccine, however, receptacles will be available for those who wish to drop in a quarter or so to help defray expenses.

Texas is reported to have had 57 per cent of the polio cases in the nation this year, indicating an urgent need for the mass use of vaccine.

Asked his opinion of the vaccine and the present need for it, Dr. Sohns had this to say at the Monday night meeting: "I hope every person will leave this room an enthusiastic supporter of the program. This plan not only offers immunization but promises to be effective against carriers; I have advised my patients of every age to take this type of vaccine."

Polio is classified in three distinct types. The vaccine to be given Sept. 16 will be an immunization against type one. Other immunization efforts will be made later — no sooner than six weeks — against the other varieties.

It was pointed out Monday night that persons who have previously taken the Salk vaccine should also be immunized with the oral dose. It serves as a booster for the Salk treatment.

In answer to a question as to who should take the vaccine, authorities said every person over six weeks of age should be immunized. Only exceptions would be those who at vaccination time had a high fever.

To receive the vaccination minors will be required to submit a certificate of agreement by a parent or guardian.

Much polio is said to have been spread through the intestinal tract by persons, who because of age are generally immune to the disease and have not taken vaccines against it. They are unwitting carriers. Immunization of this group is said to be necessary to ultimately eliminate the disease entirely.

For immunization to be generally successful, it is said to be necessary that at least 70 per cent of the population be vaccinated.

Actual cost of each individual vaccine is said to be about 13 cents. Various civic organizations will underwrite the expense, in the event that voluntary contributions prove insufficient.

## First Baptist Church Will Launch Meeting Sunday

Annual summer revival of the First Baptist Church of Cross Plains will begin Sunday morning and continue through Aug. 29.

Evangelist for the meeting will be Rev. H. E. Small, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church at Lufkin. The Rev. Mr. Small is a graduate of Louisiana State College, from which institution he took his bachelor of arts degree. He also holds a bachelor of divinity and a master of religious education from Southwestern Theological Seminary. He has been pastor of the Lufkin church 11 years, during which time his congregation has enjoyed exceptional growth, a \$175,000 church auditorium having been dedicated last October.

Music for the meeting will be under direction of Billy N. Davis of Abilene. A native of Brownwood, Davis attended Howard Payne one year and then accepted a position with the Texas Highway Patrol. In 1956 he reentered college and was graduated from Hardin-Simmons University with the class of 1958. He later attended Baylor University, studying voice under Dr. Euell Porter.

"We are indeed fortunate to have two such outstanding and dedicated men to be associated with us in the forthcoming revival effort," said the Rev. Don Turner, pastor of the Cross Plains church.

Services are to be held twice daily, at seven each morning and at eight each evening.

## J. L. Settle Tailor Plant Now One Of Texas Best Small-Town Shops

One of Cross Plains' oldest business concerns is taking on a new look.

The establishment is J. L. Settle's Dry Cleaning Plant, where broad improvements have just been completed in the firm's mechanical facilities.

To celebrate the completion of new machinery installation and interior decoration, the business will hold open house Wednesday of next week — Aug. 22 — at which time friends and customers are invited to visit the plant and view most modern cleaning and pressing processes.

As an added inducement to attract the public, a drawing will be held every hour, on the hour, that day from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m., with lucky registrants winning a free cleaning and pressing of either a suit or dress.

"There is nothing to buy, you don't even have to be present to win," Settle said, "we simply

want our friends to drop by, register and see the recent improvements we've made."

The Settle plant is now believed to be one of the most modern small town establishments of its kind in Texas. Two complete plants compose the firm's mechanical equipment.

"We've always wanted to have two machines of every kind," Settle says, "to assure service being prompt and complete, even though mechanical breakdowns and failures occur, as will eventually happen with any kind of machinery."

Included, however, are many innovations to the former equipment at the plant. All garments are now cleaned with solvents, filtered by the minute, as a greater sanitation and maintenance-safeguard to fabrics."

Pressing equipment at the plant likewise has new additions, including more elaborate, form-fitting machinery.

Settle first entered the tailor business in Cross Plains 43 years ago, having bought out Wayne Tartt in 1919.

Not only has the Settle plant been maintained modern, far ahead of most other small town shops, but local businessmen declare the proprietor, J. L. Settle, has been one of the community's most dedicated merchants, supporting every community building undertaking through the years.

## Schools Become Big Business

Schools are big business. Cross Plains school trustees met Monday night and approved a \$212,708 budget for the ensuing 12 months. This is an increase of \$3,058 over the 1961-62 budget.

The \$212,708 will be received: \$62,000 from local sources and \$150,191 from

the state and federal governments.

Major items of expenditures on the new budget include these: salaries, \$143,200; transportation, \$24,551; interest on bonded indebtedness, \$7,095; payment on principal of bonded indebtedness \$7,252, and band uniforms \$3,000.

"Cotton growers should be alert and observe damage of insects to their crops," said County Agent Travis Allen yesterday.

A group of farmers in the Cross Plains-Rowden area recently made an inspection of fields in this area and report heavy infestation of fleahoppers, leafhoppers and bollworms. Making the inspection were: Hadden Payne, Tommie Harris, Deel Edington, John D. Montgomery, O. B. Fortune, Howard Neeb and the County Agent.

"Peanut growers should also be on the look-out for insects," Allen stated.

John Howard Balkum found leafworms and armyworms so numerous in his peanut crop recently that poisoning was immediately necessary.

Allen urges other growers to inspect their fields frequently, declaring: "An entire year's work can be lost with a little neglect right at this time."

### Sisters Cafe Nears Bowling Loop Lead

Sisters Cafe padded its three-game Cross Plains Bowling Club lead by two and one-half games last Thursday and moved a step nearer the league crown.

The loop leaders dumped hapless Mayes Flower Shop 4-0 while last week's second place team, Higginbothams, dropped a 4-0 decision to George Hutchins Mobil which vaulted from fifth to second. Higginbothams fell to fourth, D. C. Lee Gulf took over third place with a 3-1 defeat of Johnston Truck & Supply which slumped to fifth.

With only 12 games remaining on the schedule, Sisters Cafe's five and one-half game edge presents an almost insurmountable lead for the trailing five teams to overcome, although, each quintet, with the exception of Mayes Flowers, still has a shot at the league championship.

V. A. Montgomery's 185 in the first game boosted Sisters Cafe to victory and gave him high game honors, and Ted Souder paced the Mobil five to victory with the nights best average, a 163 and series of 490. Gulf's Jim Gilmore placed second in both individual races with a 181 second game and 159 average on a 478 three game total.

Mobil collected 1,969 pins for the best team series, but Sisters team got 704 pins in a single game for top honors in that contest. Gulf was runner up in both divisions with 1,962 and 697 pins respectively.

Next week pits Sisters against Higginbothams, Mobil against Gulf and Johnston against Mayes Flowers.

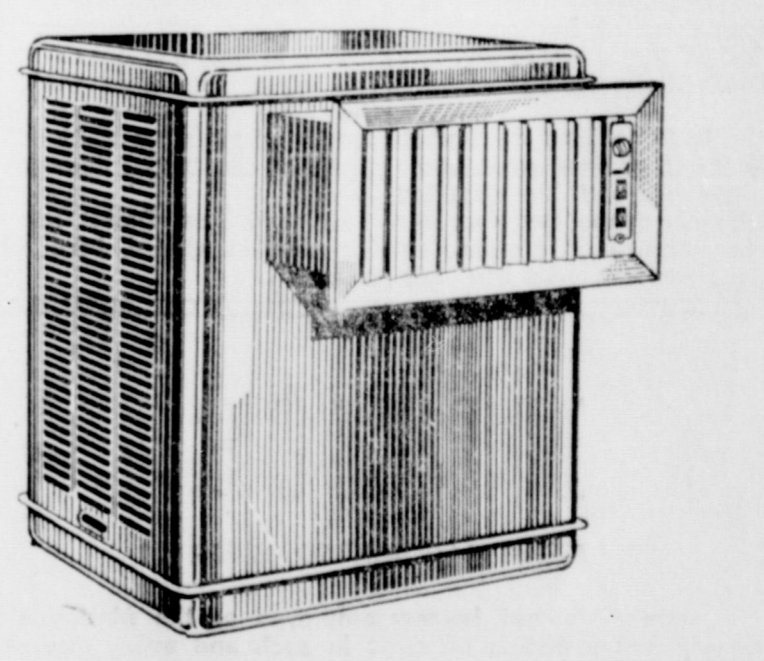

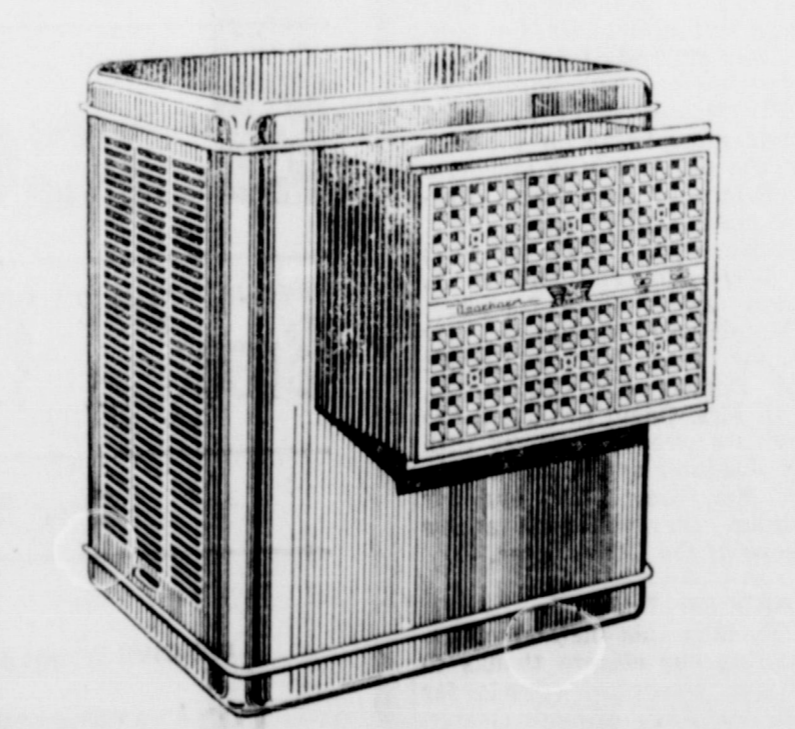

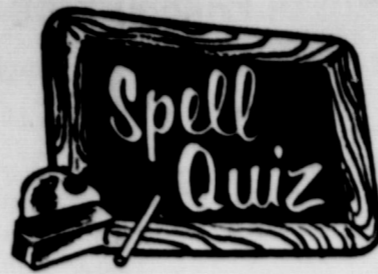
