Gas System Initiates New Method Monday

A new procedure affecting Cross Plains municipally owned gas distributing system began here Monday.

Under the new plan the city provides its own orifice meter, removes the charts, has them computed and then remits to the firm which owns the gas wells and lines coming to the city gate.

Charts removed this week were sent to a Tyler firm for reading. When returned the city will figure its own bill — 20 cents per thousand cubic feet — and remit to the supplier.

UNDEFEATED PUTNAM TO BATTLE MATTSOM

The Putnam Panthers will go for their fourth consecutive victory Saturday night at Baird. The Callahan County sextet will host Mattson in a non-conference tilt beginning at 8 p.m.

Montgomery, who is well-versed in the peanut situation by virtue of having been a local buyer 20 years, opined that approximately 600 tons will be sold in Cross Plains this year as compared with 700 in 1961.

"A few crops will go to drying plants and be sold elsewhere," he said. Top yield reported in the Cross Plains area thus far is from an irrigated field owned by Cowan Hutton, five miles north of Pioneer. He harvested an estimated 3,596 bushels from 58 acres for an approximate average of 62 bushels to the acre. He baled 1,480 bales of hay from the field, valued around \$1 per bale.

Top dry-land yield reported in this locality was made by Bill Ingram, farming the Dave Ingram land, four miles west of town. He harvested 1,950 bushels from 65 acres with an average of 30 bushels to the acre. The nuts sold at \$3.45 for a total of \$6,727.50.

A. L. Breeding had a four and one-half acre patch which averaged 52 bushels to the acre. The nuts tested 73. Only a part of his crop had been harvested yesterday.

Montgomery estimated Monday afternoon that it would be from six to eight weeks before the present harvest is complete. "Many growers will not dig for another three or four weeks," he said.

Rising Star Dumps Buffs 12-6 In Defensive Battle Saturday

The Rising Star Wildcats scored twice in the first half before a homecoming crowd, and handed the Cross Plains Buffaloes their fourth defeat this season 12-6.

Saturday night's annual Buffalo-Wildcat tussel was a defensive battle with numerous penalties and mistakes credited to both elevens.

Neither football squad could manage much forward progress. Cross Plains netted 109 yards from scrimmage while Rising Star collected 69, and the Bison went through the air for 34 yards on three completions, and the hosts caught four for 27 yards. Each team lost three fumbles and the Herd drew five penalties for 35 yards while the victors were setback six times for 40 yards.

Alford Rambles

Rising Star rang-up six-pointers late in the first and second quarters, and Cross Plains crossed the double stripe with only six seconds remaining in the game.

Wildcat left end and defensive safety man Tommy Alford burst into the end zone with 2:40 left in the first canto after returning a Buff punt 75 yards. The fleet Wildcat caught the pigskin, ran up his left sideline, turned laterally through a host of would-be Buffalo tacklers, and angled toward the right side at mid-field, out-running pursuers. Fullback Bill Clark was stopped on the attempted two-point conversion at left tackle.

Right halfback Kenneth Nunnally ended Wildcat scoring with 38 seconds left in the first half on a one-yard sweep of right end. Nunnally's touchdown came on third down after Rising Star had a first and goal on the Bison three. The drive covered 53 yards, 15 of which were free on three offside penalties, in 14 plays. Left halfback Darwin Cain was downed short on the two-point conversion try.

Herd Scores

Left halfback Jim Hargrove got the locals late tally on a three-yard cross with six seconds showing on the scoreboard clock. Hargrove's plunge terminated a 49-yard, seven play, march.

Although Hargrove scored, right halfback Darrel Wyatt and fullback Charles Barr sparked the drive.

Hargrove flipped a nine-yard pass to Wyatt on the first play of the series, and Barr got the first on a four-yard blast. Hargrove then lofted a 21-yard aerial to Barr for a first on the Wildcat 15. Wyatt rushed to the five for another first, and after an incompleated pass and Barr's two-yard plunge, Hargrove hit paydirt.

Barr's crack at the left side was unsuccessful on the two-point conversion.

In Hole

In the first 24 minutes of play only three plays were run outside of Cross Plains territory but in the second half most of the action was centered in the Wildcat end of the field.

Rising Star moved inside the Buffalo 20-yard line three times in the first half, but the Buff defense held on two of the occasions. Both threats came on Bison fumbles. Cross Plains held for downs on their 17 late in the opening 12 minutes, and Buffalo defensive tackle Terry Dewbre smothered a Wildcat botble to end a threat that went to the locals' two-yard line in the second stanza.

The victors did not mount a threat in the second half, but Cross Plains drove inside the hosts' 20 two times, scoring on last effort. The first march covered 34 yards to the Wildcat 19 before losing the ball on downs.

Body of a 50-year-old Abilene service station operator was recovered at 9:10 p.m. Saturday after an extensive two day and night search.

Jesse Barnes, who lived at 3166 South Ninth in Abilene, fell from a boat Thursday night near the bridge which spans the Cross Plains-Brownwood highway and is believed to have drowned immediately.

Search for Barnes began Thursday night after he left boat docks at Lake Shore Lodge in a boat to drain water out of it. The boat was found about an hour later empty and going in circles. A bottle was bouyed at the point the boat was recovered and the search was centered in that area, which is about one and one-half miles from the highway bridge.
