The late Col. T. A. Burns of Burkett was interviewed on his 100th birthday and asked by a Cross Plains newspaper if he had a secret for long life.

"Sure," replied the centenarian, "it's sound, restful sleep every night."

"How can you always be sure of getting it?" he was asked.

"Well, just before bedtime," he said, with a devilish twinkle in his eye, "I always eat a bowl of Post Toasties and read your paper. That way I go to bed with nothing on my mind or stomach either; sleep comes easy."

It was no accident when street lights came on Monday afternoon and burned brightly for almost an hour in the downtown district.

Cross Plains has 12 electronic controls to switch the lights on and off as needed. Light meters automatically operate the equipment.

New York City's "Great White Way" has no more modern method for controlling street illumination.

With apologies to local bankers, Rev. C. R. Myrick lists this one:

Cross Plains has a pretty well-bunch of football fans. They don't demand that their Buffaloes be district champions, just that they play hard and sportsmanlike.

Loyalty of the home town group is attested by gate receipts thus far this season. Despite the loss of five straight, gate receipts are running only \$159.69 below last year. All of this deficit was incurred at the first home game with Bangs, when torrential rain fell throughout the contest.

New Meter Cuts Bill Down \$315

"Our meter is all right," said Roy Cox, city gas commissioner, Monday.

That comment was made after readings taken from the city-installed orifice meter showed September gas purchases to be 3,123,000 cubic feet. This amount figured at 20 cents per thousand made the September bill \$624.60. That is \$315 less

than gas purchases in July and \$232 below that for August, however, a \$150 adjustment was later made on the August statement. Gas purchases by the city in September 1961 amounted to \$1,093.60.

Gas sales to consumers by the city during September amounted to \$1,009.55, which after deducting purchases of \$624.60, allowed a gross profit of \$384.95.

Gross profit for July, last month in which a meter owned by the firm which wholesales to the city was used, without an adjustment being made, was \$64.20.

It is pointed out that Cross Plains schools, one of the largest local consumers of gas, were supplied during September, whereas they were not in session during July.

Under agreement made with W. B. Evans of Lubbock, part-owner of the firm which supplies gas to the municipally-owned system, gas purchases are now measured on a city-owned meter, one which Cox and other members of the council believe more accurate.

An improvement, designed to better serve consumers in the southeast part of town, began on the gas system this week. It will include the laying of a 2,500 foot high-pressure line from the intake main at the city gate to a point near the Hillcrest Motel.

"We believe this will remedy a poor-service situation which has existed for a long time," Cox said.

Week End Football Features Bison 'B'

Cross Plains High School "B" team will supply the only gridiron action here this week end.

The varsity Buffaloes have the week end off, but their understudies will host Early High School reserves at 7:30 p.m. Saturday night.

A previously scheduled tilt with DeLeon's "B" string was cancelled and the game with the Early number two unit was arranged instead.

The interning Buffs will be looking for their first victory of the season having posted a 0-2-1 record thus far this year.

Last Saturday the locals and visiting Rising Star "B" team fought to a 0-0 deadlock.

Ronnie will exhibit two lambs, a Southdown and a Hampshire. They will be judged Wednesday, Oct. 17 and the lamb sale will be Saturday, Oct. 20. Marianne will exhibit a milked hereford calf and it will be judged Wednesday.

Battle Assured If Liquor Vote Called

In an effort to prevent legalized liquor sales gaining a foothold in Callahan County, 103 persons gathered at the First Baptist Church in Baird Sunday afternoon and organized the Callahan County Moral and Civic League.

Plans for a concentrated effort were made to defeat a proposed election to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages in Baird.

Dr. Alfred Tucker, executive secretary of the Texas Alcoholic and Narcotics Information Inc., was speaker for the organizational session.

The Rev. Bobby Ecklund, pastor of the Baird Baptist Church, was named president of the organization. Other officers are Ellsworth Meyer, vice-president; Leonard Gallegos, secretary;

Bruce Parks and Ellis Cosgrove, publicity committee.

A petition has been issued to call for an election for the legal sale of alcoholic beverages in Baird. Backers of the petition have until Oct. 18 to file it if the election is to be called.

Dr. Tucker told the group Sunday that it must be remembered that "this is not a battle with individuals, but a battle with an industry which is using individuals to do its work in this area."

Milder Petition On Liquor Vote Circulates At Baird

A new petition, asking an election to legalize the sale of liquor and beer, is circulating in Baird.

The present petition asks a vote to legalize sales on all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption, whereas another instrument which had been circulating in the county seat the past two weeks specified on-

premises privileges.

A spokesman for "wet" forces said the first petition was being abandoned, although more than 90 signatures asking the vote had been obtained.

Callahan County Commissioners Court in session Monday ruled that 150 signers would be required on the latest petition to demand the election. The

ruling of the court was necessary for the reason that Texas law requires that 25 percent of citizens who voted in the last governor's election must sign such a petition, and since the limits of the Baird voting precinct do not coincide with the corporate limits of the town — in which liquor sales would be legalized — a minimum number

of signers had to be officially adjudicated. Statutes empower the court to set that number after a study of the names and residences of those who voted in the last general election.

Proponents of the election have 30 days in which to return their petition to the Commissioners Court with the required 150 signatures of voters.

Mrs. John Price, 75, Buried Here Friday

Mrs. John Price, 75, a resident of the Cross Plains area 65 years, died in Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene Thursday morning, where she had been a patient three days. She had been in declining health, however, for more than a year.

Born in Mississippi, Dec. 7, 1886, the deceased came to Texas in girlhood with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Dan Patterson, settling just south of the old Lon Haley place. She was married to John Price, who survives, at Cottonwood in 1906.

Funeral services were held from Higginbotham Chapel Friday afternoon at 2:30 with Rev. Jim Mosley of Brownwood, pastor of the Baptist Church at Sabanno, officiating. He was assisted by Minister Paul Wilkinson of the Cross Plains Church of Christ. Mrs. Price was a long-time member of the Baptist Church.

Burial was in the local cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mrs. Price was one of the oldest surviving pupils of Cross Plains schools, having attended here around 1900.

Survivors include the husband; one son, Howard Price of Weatherford; three daughters, Mrs. Leonard Ingram of Cross Plains, Mrs. Lynwood Bishop of Sacramento, Calif., and Mrs. Joe Ramsey of Abilene; 21 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Local Men Give Ride, Search To Goldthwaite Bank Robber

A blue-jeaned bank robber, who held up the Mills County State Bank Monday and escaped with \$500, was given a lift on the highway a few hours earlier by Horace Gray, who operates the skating rink in Cross Plains.

Gray, whose home is in Goldthwaite was enroute here, and picked up a hitchhiker, who

said he was headed for Comanche.

The robber is said to have stolen a car in Comanche and then gone back to Goldthwaite to loot the bank. Descriptions given of the robber coincide with the man whom the Cross Plains skating rink owner had hauled several miles.

The man is said to have entered the Goldthwaite bank, carrying a pack on his back. Inside he borrowed a pencil and wrote a note, which he handed to a teller.

The note read: "This is a hold-up put all your money in a paper sack do not make a sound or I will kill you." It was printed on the back of a deposit slip, without punctuation.

The teller read the note, looked up and saw a small caliber automatic pistol pointed toward him. The teller started to open a cash drawer.

"Don't do that," said the robber.

"You want the money don't you?" asked the teller.

The man pointed to a canvas bag on the counter, seized it and fled.

The bag had been left in the bank's night depository by a Goldthwaite grocery concern. It contained \$500 in cash and \$2,050 in checks.

The robber left vanishing down the bank's driveway which gives access to its motor banking facilities.

Local Officers Help Mills County Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield said the robber was believed to have made his getaway in a 1962 Ford stolen about 11 a.m. Monday from a Comanche car lot.

Officers from a wide area converged on Mills County and a giant manhunt began. Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson and State Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews of Cross Plains helped in the search late Monday and early Tuesday.

The fugitive was captured late Tuesday night and is held at Goldthwaite.

A 62-year-old Sweetwater nurse was arrested in Cross Plains Sunday morning and lodged in jail here, charged with being under the influence of barbiturates.

She was taken into custody by Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson after three complaints were made by motorists on State Highway 36 that she was "driving all over the road."

The woman is said to have had 15 different types of pills in her possession and was in the act of taking several when stopped for questioning.

After spending eight hours in jail she pleaded guilty as charged in J. M. McMillan's justice court and was fined \$29.50.

The woman told authorities that she was a licensed vocational nurse and had been working in Sweetwater.

Amarillo Firm Bids Low On Dams Here

DePaw Construction Co., of Amarillo, one of nine bidders on the contract involving Sites 4 and 5, Turkey Creek, was apparent low bidder at a bid opening in Temple, Oct. 3.

DePaw is an experienced contractor, having built floodwater retarding structures on Brady Creek and the Washita in Oklahoma.

It is expected that the contract will be officially awarded within the next few days. Work will begin within 20 days of

awarding and is scheduled for completion within 247 calendar days.

The contract will provide for two earthen floodwater retarding structures that will involve approximately 260,000 cubic yards of earth fill material. Ralph W. White, project construction engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood, will supervise the construction according to E. J. Hughes, area conservator.

Buffaloes Absorb 34-0 Loss At DeLeon Last Friday Night

The DeLeon Bearcats used the air lanes in the first half and a brace of fleet halfbacks in the second half to overpower the visiting Cross Plains Buffaloes 34-0 Friday night.

DeLeon scored in every quarter to hand the Bison eleven of its fifth straight loss of the current campaign and extend the Herd's losing string to seven consecutive games.

Injuries Take Toll

Buffalo junior right end Mike Montgomery was feared lost to the local squad for the remainder of the season. He received a brain concussion late in Friday's contest, and did not regain consciousness until Saturday morning. He suffered a similar injury last year.

Team physician Dr. Carl J. Sohns plans to take Montgomery to Temple for tests this week end.

Jerry Payne, senior guard, received a painful neck injury in the first half Friday, and did not see action again. But he is expected to be ready to go in the first district encounter, two weeks away.

Freshman guard James Switzer bruised a hip in Friday's action, but Coach Bill Gunn said that Switzer would also be in playing condition for the next encounter.

Although held scoreless, the Buffaloes also used the pass to advantage. In their most impressive air-show of the season, the Herd completed 11 of 24 aerials for 79 yards. Fullback-quarterback Charles Barr was the primary hurler, and right halfback Darrel Wyatt was the principal receiver.

Touchdown Parade

With less than five minutes gone in the opening quarter, fullback Wade Smith ran through a gaping hole the final seven yards of a 36-yard drive. Late in the first period quarterback Gary Burlison hit right end Neil Weaver with a 35-yard touchdown pass.

Mid-way through the second stanza the same combination worked for a 32-yard tally. The third time charm worked for Burlison on the two-point conversion try on a left end sweep after the first two PAT attempts were stopped short.

In the second half DeLeon scored late in each quarter. Left halfback Billy Lamb skirted right end for 28 yards in the third canto on the first play following a Buffalo blocked punt. Burlison banged over the right side for two points. Right halfback Mickey Robinett capped a 38-yard, six-play, drive with a seven-yard slant over his left side for the final TD. A high snap from center fouled Weaver's attempted kick.

The winless Bison eleven threatened only one time. Late in the initial quarter the Herd cranked up a 46-yard march that died on the hosts' 17-yard line on a fumble. Two passes sparked the seven-play drive. The first was a 25-yard heave from Barr to Wyatt then Wyatt lofted the pigskin to halfback Reggie Stover for a 23 yard gainer.

The local football team will rest this coming week end before going into District 10-A competition. First conference game will be played here Friday, Oct. 19, at 7:30 p.m. with the Ranger Bulldogs.

The Buffalo "B" team will host the Early High School reserves Saturday night at 7:30.
