

Tuesday is general election day. Issues are hotly contested and a record turnout is expected.

Fred Stacy, who'll serve as judge at the Cross Plains election predicts around 700 votes will be polled, an all-time general election high here.

One Saturday morning in the long ago, a group of Baird boys looked across the town's principal street and saw a fighting kid, strange in the crowd, loitering in front of L. Boydston's general merchandise store. Anxious for entertainment they crossed the street and began to poke fun and insults at the teenager.

Witt, as was not so characteristic of his demeanor in later life, accepted the abuse and was walking away to end altercation until Mahan grabbed his straw hat and was making merry. With the speed of wind, Witt lit into Mahan and beat his face raw.

After Witt had moved on up the street the gang remonstrated and began to tell Mahan that the only reason he got licked was that the other fellow started punching without warning. "If you'd been ready, you would have beat him good," they kept repeating.

Carl began to believe their words and invited the group to follow as he renewed the romp.

Second contact was made somewhere near the courthouse. This time Mahan was ready and he well-remembered making the first swing. It did nothing, though, as Witt ducked and came in punching with the fury of a cornered animal. Mahan's punishment this time was agonizing. When Witt finished this time, the county seat boys carried away their champion, leaving a puddle of blood and a few front teeth to mark the scene of combat.

Mahan now laughs and says that about 10 years later someone encountered him on the streets of Baird and said that a fellow named McMillan was looking for him down near the depot.

"I gave the guy \$5 to go all of Witt that I was dead," Mahan says.

Citizens Inspect 3 County Buildings

"Our money was wisely spent" appeared to be the consensus of Callahan Counts looking in on their courthouse, jail and hospital Saturday, in the first open-house ever held at the three buildings, all of which have recently undergone renovation and facelift. The county jail was empty of prisoners, the last having been removed to Cross Plains Friday night before going on to the state penitentiary in Huntsville Saturday. More than \$30,000 was recently spent in working over the courthouse and jail buildings, in a project financed by a county-wide bond election. Repainting and interior decoration had also just been completed at the hospital.

Callahan Man Lived Through One Of War's Strangest Sagas

The smoke and sounds of a thousand battlefields of World War II have long since faded but with Veterans Day — Nov. 11 — just ahead, the time seems fitting to recount one of the most unusual experiences of that great conflict, one in which a Callahan County boy was the central figure. Crawford Hughes was born and reared at Belle Plain. He attended Baird High School and often competed in athletic contests at Cross Plains, Clyde, Putnam and other Callahan County communities. When America went to war in 1941 he was one of the first young men from this section sent to overseas action. He won the wings of a navigator and was serving in the South Pacific when his bomber was hit by Japanese anti-aircraft fire and crashed into the sea. That was May 24, 1942. Three members of the crew were killed by the impact. Survivors made their way to New Britain Island, a spit of land held by the Japs. Two were captured by enemy patrols and the others fled into the hills. Another man died in a few weeks and all contracted malaria and dysentery. "We were a pretty sad lot but to surrender was to die," Hughes, who is now a Pecos businessman, says. Searching Japanese patrols scoured tropical jungles in search of the downed American airmen. To live by foraging on nature was a challenge but to sick men, ravaged by fever, and sought like beasts of prey, the odds sometimes seemed impossible. Unknown to Hughes, word

came from the War Department in Washington to his parents that their son had been lost in action and was presumed dead. The report was only scantily inaccurate. Young Hughes was barely alive and some days his fever was so high that he was irrational for hours. On day, nearly 11 months after his crash into the sea, the emaciated boy from Belle Plain heard the familiar drone of an American airplane high overhead. Somewhere he had acquired a piece of mirror. Flat of his back, the airman began to signal the plane with reflections from the glass against rays of the sun. Remembering the Morse Code of his basic training days, Hughes flashed out dots and dashes spelling his identity. The plane offered no recognition, however, a few days later

Shields Ready For Tuesday's Election

There'll be something new at the polls in Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde Tuesday as voters converge to express political preferences in the general election. New procedure will insure secret ballots. Voting shields have been built and will be placed in use. The shields are made of plywood and hinged in such a

manner as to assure voters complete privacy while ballots are being marked. They were manufactured by a Baird lumber yard upon specifications handed down by County Judge J. Lester Farmer. Twelve shields, or screens, will be installed in the City Hall in Cross Plains for use here, said Fred W. Stacy, who is to serve as presiding judge.

Smaller boxes will not utilize the voting shields Tuesday. Stacy forecasts 700 votes will be polled in Cross Plains, possibly the heaviest turnout of any single Callahan County polling place. Democrats and Republicans report interest keen in many races, particularly that of governor and lieutenant governor. Strong campaigns are being waged at all levels. For the first time in recollection of local election officials opposition is offered by the Republican Party at the county and precinct levels. At least 12 persons will work at the polls in Cross Plains, six of whom were appointed by the Commissioners Court. The other six will be named by Stacy. Chosen by the court were: Stacy, Howard Coburn, Mrs. Melody Strickland, Mrs. Mary Wagner, Miss Missouri Strahan and F. C. Newton. Mrs. H. P. Moon will replace Newton, who will be unable to serve.

J. R. (Russell) Hart, 71, former oil operator and long-time resident of Callahan County, died Tuesday morning at two o'clock in a Fort Worth hospital after an extended illness. Funeral services are to be held at 2:30 at Greenwood Funeral Chapel in Fort Worth with interment in a mausoleum in that city. Mr. Hart was a member of one of Callahan County's oldest families, the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Hart. His father was the first white man to establish permanent residence here, having settled north of Putnam in 1869. He married Miss Lula Cutbirth at Baird Aug. 14, 1912. The Harts moved from Baird to Fort Worth more than 20 years ago and had maintained residence at 1401 Cooper in that city. Survivors include the widow; three daughters, Mrs. Ward Haynie of El Paso, Mrs. Bromo Bennett of Fort Worth and Mrs. Art Shaw of Odessa; one grandson, Bob Young, who lives on a ranch south of Clyde and two brothers, Fred and H. D. Hart of Baird.

Kathryn Cravens is coming home to Burkett. The vivacious blond who left this area more than 30 years ago to win national acclaim in several fields is returning to the scene of her girlhood.

Miss Cravens is one of the nation's best known women reporters and established an impressive "string of firsts" during a long and illustrious career.

A farwell tribute to Miss Cravens was held Friday at the Savoy Hilton Hotel in New York City by the Texas Club of New York City. The group honored her for work in behalf of the club's scholarship fund and other charitable activities.

Miss Cravens is the last remaining resident of a New York landmark, Hotel Devon, which is to go under the sledge hammers of demolition squads as soon as she moves out.

**Many Souvenirs**  
For the past several weeks Miss Cravens has been supervising the crating of her extensive library and souvenirs of her world-wide travels for shipment to her home in Burkett.

Her careers have encompassed the motion picture, radio and newspaper fields. A striking blonde, her photograph has appeared on national magazine covers and she was voted the best dressed woman in radio and one of the 10 best dressed in the United States in 1938, 1948 and 1957.

Miss Cravens is best known as the first woman coast-to-coast news commentator, starting a career with CBS in 1936.

**Covered Europe**  
In World War II she covered Europe, Asia and the Middle East for her radio assignments. She scored several notable scoops and was the first woman to broadcast from Berlin following the Allied victory.

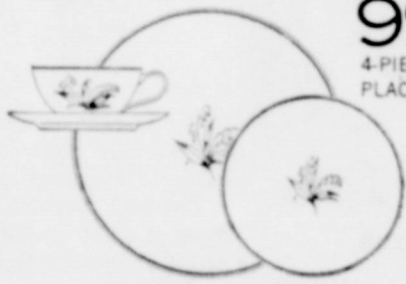

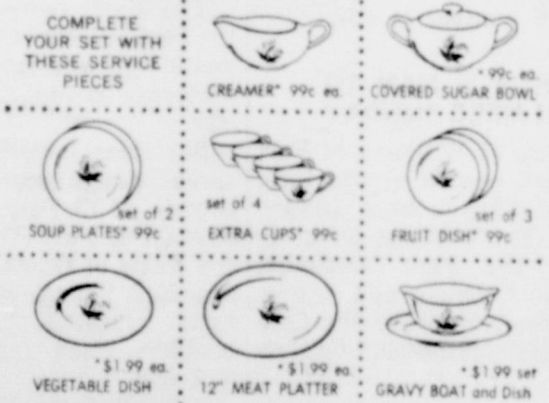

## Youth Interested In Heritage, Bookmobile Librarian Declares

Mrs. S. L. McElroy, Bookmobile librarian of the demonstration unit serving Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor counties, reports a "noticeable increase in demand for books concerning our pioneer days and heritage." "It is pleasant to see that young people are showing a keen interest in knowing about early days in America," she added.

Callahan County, organized in 1877 from the 1858 acreage of Gar, Travis and Bosque counties, was named for James H. Callahan, an early-day Texas Ranger and soldier who participated in many battles. Shackelford County, organized three years earlier, in 1874 from the 1858 boundaries of Bosque County, was named in honor of John (Jack) Shackelford, who personally furnished the clothing and arms for more than 300 Red Rovers who fought many Texas battles.

And strangely enough, both Callahan and Shackelford were in the Battle of Goliad (known today as the Goliad Massacre) and both were spared because of their particular talents needed by the Mexican Army. Callahan was reported to have been an expert mechanic and Dr. Shackelford was spared for his medical skill. Later Dr. Shackelford wrote one of the best ac-

counts of the Goliad event. Taylor County, organized in 1878 from the 1858 land in Bexar and Travis counties, was named for a number of families whose surname was Taylor, who were part of the famed Robertson Colony. This colony of more than 600 families was second in size only to Stephen F. Austin's largest colony. Although history does not record the fact, it is easy to assume that members of the Taylor families also participated in the Massacre at Goliad — and one would certainly surmise that one of these men of the several Taylor families, also escaped with his life at Goliad.

Romantic days of the pioneers or today's race for the first lunar landing, are all covered in information found in the jointly-sponsored mobile-information-center. Citizens were reminded that the service is free-for-the-asking.

To the voters of Callahan County, who have honored me with their confidence and trust in permitting me to serve as their County Superintendent of Schools, I wish to express deepest gratitude and renew my pledge that if returned to this office I will continue to work with dedication and enthusiasm for the best interest of our boys and girls.

  - G. Personnel records and payroll
  - H. Recording and payment of invoices
  - I. Preparing and transmitting all records required in connection with the transportation system of the county

- IV. The State requires that all business of Rural High School Districts shall be transacted through the Office of the County Superintendent. (The following are only a few items of said business)

- XI. Constant assistance in problem-solving
- XIV. Serve as liaison officer between schools and educational agencies
- XIII. Prepare annual depository reports
- XIV. Serve as an appellate board for school matters
- XV. Work on permanent county school funds.
- XVI. Procure materials for local Common School District elections
- XVII. Deal with evaluation problems and new procedures

2. No school in the County could receive any additional funds under the law should the office be abolished.

3. Under the state plan of financing which provides for equalizing the cost of education in the state, which applies to the County Superintendent's Office as well as to the school districts, you, the taxpayers of Callahan County pay less than \$100 of the annual cost of the office either directly or indirectly.

4. In conferences with all school boards, in the County, six months ago I promised that anytime the elected school officials of the county decided that the office should be abolished I would help do it. That promise will be kept.

I urge you to investigate the truth of this information and trust that it will be helpful to you in determining for whom to cast your ballot in the November election. I ask your support on the basis of valued service to our schools and the important task to which they are dedicated.

**Bears Win Aerial Battle 32-14;  
5 TD Passes Dot Annual Clash**

Although the Cross Plains Buffaloes lost their seventh straight game of the season at Baird last Friday night 32-14, they nevertheless accomplished two firsts.

The Herd scored twice in the game, 14 points, which eclipsed their total output in the first six tilts this season by two points, and both came via the air in the locals' most successful air show of the current campaign.

Hosts also used space advantageously, connecting on 11 of 20 launches for 167 yards and 20 points. All came from the arm of the Bear's all-state can-

didate quarterback Calvin Barnes.

Versatility in the form of Darrel Wyatt was the key to the Buffs second half surge. He not only scored the first touchdown, but stepped into the quarterback slot from his regular halfback position late in the first half when starting signal-caller Charles Barr was injured. He completed 10 of 15 passes for 158 yards. Regular left end Sam Odom also displayed additional talents as he moved into the fullback post following starting fullback Jim Hargrove's injury-forced departure early in the second half, and tallied the first conversion for the Bison this season.

**Baird Scores**

Baird right tackle Tally Windham pounced on a Buff fumble to set up Baird's first TD on their second offensive thrust of the night. Barnes guided the Bears 42 yards in six plays climaxing the drive with a 15-yard heave to left halfback Wally Harris. Barnes skirted right end for the two points.

Less than five minutes later pile-driving fullback Tommy Higgins bulled over right tackle the final four yards of a 48-yard drive for the Bears' second TD. A Barnes to right end Johnny Higgins pass got the two point conversion.

**Buff's Cut Margin**

Buff Bobby McMillan set the stage for the Herd's first counter when he recovered a bobbled punt on the hosts' 34 yard line. Hargrove got 17 yards on three lugs, Barr flipped Wyatt a seven-yarder, and right halfback Reggie Stover carried for six for a second down and four. Hargrove was stopped cold on two line plunges, but on fourth down Barr rolled to his left and hit the outstretched arms of

Wyatt in the extreme left side of the end zone. Stover was stopped on the PAT try with 10:25 remaining in the second period.

The Bears retaliated with an air strike for their third score. Barnes threw five times, four of which were complete in the five play blitz. The last was a 17-yard chunk to end Higgins. Fullback Higgins blasted up the middle for two more points.

Baird rounded out their scoring midway through the second canto with a seven-play, 81-yard drive. Finaling play was a Barnes to J. Higgins pass that covered 27 yards. T. Higgins banged into pay for two points.

**Goal Post Crash**

On Barnes last pass of the tilt, Bison Hargrove was injured. Two Baird receivers converged on the missile with Hargrove and Sam Odom defending. The four contenders crashed into the goal post with Hargrove badly bruising an arm and shoulder, and Odom falling unconscious. Odom was revived and remained in the game, however, Hargrove was removed from the field.

**Second TD**

Early in the final quarter the combination of Wyatt and Stover turned what appeared to be a fluke into a Buffalo touchdown.

Wyatt, with a tackler hanging onto him, lofted a pass to Stover who reversed his field, tucked the pigskin under his arm, and sped 74 yards untouched across the double stripe. Odom then rambled around right end for Cross Plains' first successful conversion attempt this year.

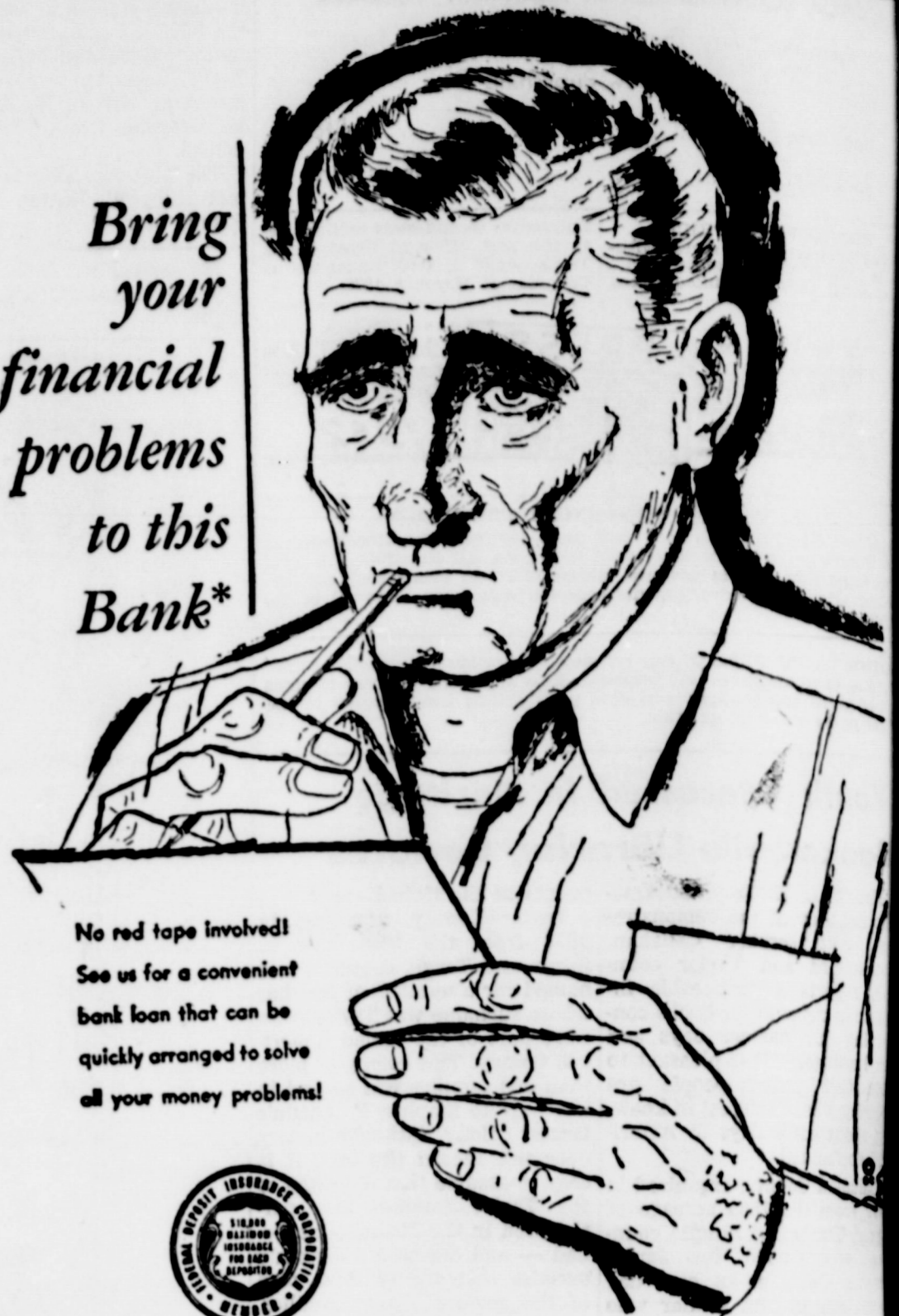

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# Imaging Storm Dumps 20 Inch Rain Sunday

Windstorm which raged over the Cross Plains area early Sunday morning dumped 2.20 inches of rain and debris and damage in its wake.

A number of telephone circuits were disrupted and electric service interrupted both east and west of town. Most service was restored by noon.

Outside the western city limits of Cross Plains, wind lifted stock shed at Raymond's farm and blew it 100 feet over his barn into a twist-er of worthless lumber. Damage was estimated at \$2,200.

2.20 inches of moisture brought the October rainfall in Cross Plains to 3.07 inches, making the aggregate

for the first 10 months of 1962 now 26.80. Average annual rainfall for this area is 24.54 inches.

Elvie Byrd reported that Cross Cut received more moisture Sunday than did Cross Plains. At his place the precipitation measured 2.50 inches.

Peanut farmers, who have yet an estimated one-fourth of their crop to harvest, are hopeful for a protracted dry spell. Grain farmers and livestockmen, on the other hand, report recent rains helpful and declare more would be welcomed.

Most streams in this area were running Sunday as virtually all stock ponds have been full since September, when the Cross Plains area received 7.36 inches of moisture. Both Jim Ned Creek and Pecan Bayou were running half-bank-full into Lake Brownwood Sunday morning.

# Charlie Coats Dies After Brief Illness

C. W. (Charlie) Coats, 68, lifelong resident of the Cottonwood community, died Friday morning at 6:40 in the Callahan County Hospital at Baird after a brief illness. He was a retired refinery worker, prominent land owner and a driving force in the creation of Turkey Creek Flood Control District, in which 12 retention dams are now under construction.

Born at Cottonwood Dec. 25, 1894, Mr. Coats lived virtually all of his life in that community with the exception of time spent in the military service during World War I. He married Miss Kate Mitchell at Cottonwood April 7, 1917. He was a long-time employee of Premier Oil Company and worked in the refinery south of Baird until about three years ago. Since then he devoted much time to the procurement of titles and easements necessary for the building of the 12 flood control projects. Directors of the district say that Coats, more than any other person, was responsible for the mass of legal requirements finally being met and work instituted.

Funeral services were held from the Cottonwood Methodist Church, of which he was an active member, Saturday afternoon at three o'clock with the Rev. C. R. Myrick, Baptist minister, officiating. Interment was in the family plot of Cottonwood Cemetery under direction of Higginbothams of Cross Plains.

Survivors include the wife; two sons, J. B. (Bucky) Coats of Pecos and C. W. Coats, Jr., of Eastland; two daughters, Mrs. C. G. Lawson of Kansas City, Mo., and Mrs. Jack Sparks of Snyder, and seven grandchildren.

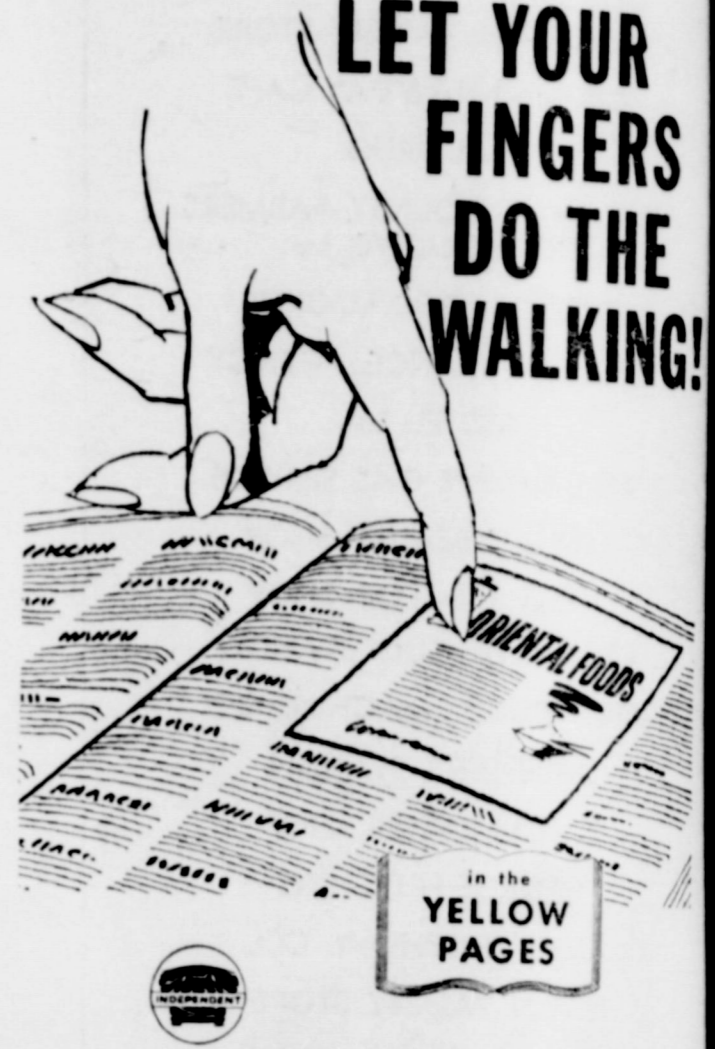

Fort Worth Star Telegram, January 12, 1961.
- ▶ In 1956 Lyndon Johnson tapped Connally to place Johnson's name in nomination for President at the Democratic National Convention.
- ▶ In 1956, 1958, and 1960 Connally was picked to lead the Johnson forces in the county and state conventions.
- ▶ In 1960, Johnson called on Connally to lead the drive to obtain the Presidential nomination for him. Later, Connally was active in Johnson's Texas campaign.
- ▶ As a reward, Connally was tagged for the post of Secretary of the Navy shortly after President Kennedy visited Vice-President-elect Johnson's ranch. The New York Times termed Connally's appointment as "Mr. Johnson's biggest patronage plum." (June 4, 1962)
- ▶ In 1961 Connally, after less than a year on the job he pledged to fill for four years, resigned to run for Governor of Texas. Time magazine said Connally's announcement for Governor "certainly seemed to carry Lyndon Johnson's political fingerprints." (December 22, 1961) After Connally's victory over Yarborough, Time said "His mentor Lyndon Johnson thus tightened his grip on the Texas Democratic organization." (June 8, 1962)

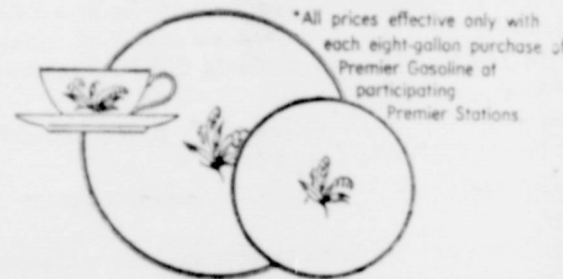
