Council Favors Hiring Engineer

Contract is now being prepared by attorney for the city of Cross Plains, prepar-

tory to the municipality's entering into an agreement with a firm of engineers to make a preliminary and factual survey of the local water situation.

Action to employ National Engineering Company of Austin was taken at a special meeting of aldermen last Wednesday night.

Purpose of the engineering work is to determine whether or not federal funds can be obtained to build a lake near here to supply the local water system. Cost of the preliminary survey is paid from a non-interest-bearing loan from the government. If a public works project is later developed and a federal grant secured, the loan will be paid from funds received from that source. If no public works project is arranged as a result of the survey, the report will become property of the government and repayment of the obligation will not be required.

The City Council has urged that the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District construct a 5,000-acre-foot retention dam along the tributaries of Pecan Bayou, which might be converted to municipal use here.

Before a public works project is definitely accepted by the city council, plans are to hold a mass meeting in the school auditorium and have a representative of the engineering firm explain it to the people in detail.

Since that time I have been keeping company with the hours, recognizing the approaches of vernal Equinoxes and the advent of many Spring seasons. Homage has been paid to the success of this little, terrestrial orb, completing its journey around the effluent luminary of day and announcing the fact that I have had another birthday.

I have enjoyed the generosity of unnumbered friends. In recognition of that event, I remember the lines of Browning:

Come and go with me,
The best is yet to be
The last of life
For which the first was made.

Or better still, I recall my little Italian friend, Luigi Conaro.

Proposed Lakes At Clyde, Cross Plains Gain Support

Civic leaders here have been told that the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District's board of supervisors recently endorsed proposals to build reservoirs for Cross Plains and Clyde along the watershed of

the Upper Pecan Bayou.

The recommendation carried with it, however, the specification that the two municipalities pay whatever additional funds were required for building lakes larger than 5,000 acre feet.

A letter from J. B. McCord, chairman of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District,

read as follows:

"In the board meeting of March 11, a motion was passed that this organization assist in any way possible in obtaining municipal water supplies for your towns. Of course any additional funds involved would have to be the responsibility of the cities."

Abilene, Are You Listening?

AN EDITORIAL

Abilene is a fine city, populated by many people of great wisdom. That is not to say, however, that rural communities surrounding the great Taylor County metropolis are incapable of thinking for themselves.

An Abilene City Commissioner was quoted in a newspaper article Friday morning as saying he could not understand the action of Callahan and Shackelford Counties in refusing a proposed contract with the City of Abilene for fire protection in rural areas.

"It's hard to understand why they would turn down the 'helping hand' and offer," he said.

Just what the offer entailed was not immediately explained. This newspaper sought out a copy of the proposed contract and a single reading was enough to completely understand action taken by Commissioners Courts of both Callahan and Shackelford Counties.

To begin with, fire protection is generally provided by municipalities. In Callahan County there are three cities with well-organized fire companies, each of which has bought special trucks and equipment to combat rural blazes. Units from Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde stand on 24-hour call to help in any section of the county where their services are required. In fact, they go beyond county lines to aid any neighbor in time of peril.

How does this service compare with that offered by the City of Abilene which the spokesmen cannot understand Callahan and Shackelford Counties refusing?

The Abilene offer would charge a \$100 fee for the first hour and one-half at each structural fire, \$50 for any other type blaze — including false alarm — for the first 90 minutes, a \$5 per mile traveling fee and one-half the above rates at each fire beyond the first hour and a half.

This is not to say that Abilene firemen are not worth that price if and when needed. But if such is true, firemen from Cross Plains, Clyde and Baird rendered an estimated \$7,000 worth of equally as competent service without charge during 1962. If the county is able to pay for fire protection, it seems in fairness that the stipend should go to the three efficient units already on the job. They're closer to the scene of threat and in most cases would do all possible before a truck dispatched from Abilene could arrive on the ground.

While it is plainly implied that Callahan and Shackelford Counties should henceforth seek no help from the Abilene Fire Department, the three volunteer companies from this county will readily respond to the big city's need if a conflagration ever breaks out there.

Free Headstones Available To Cite Confederate Graves

B. C. Chrisman, chairman of Callahan County Historical Survey Committee, announces that commemorative markers are now available for graves of all Confederate veterans.

The headstones are free, provided by the state and federal governments. Although personalized to contain individual names and vital statistics, they are of uniform design and similar to those installed at the graves of veterans of the Texas Revolution during the Centennial year of 1936.

Only cost of the markers will be that of providing the concrete base and setting of the slab, Chrisman said.

Callahan Countians who wish to apply for one of the head-

stones are advised to contact Mrs. W. Clyde White of Baird, who will compile the necessary data and prepare the official application.

The historical survey committee met in the courthouse at Baird Friday night and laid plans for an annual meeting to be held in the Community Center at Clyde April 26. John Berry of Clyde, author and well-known historian, is arranging for that night's program.

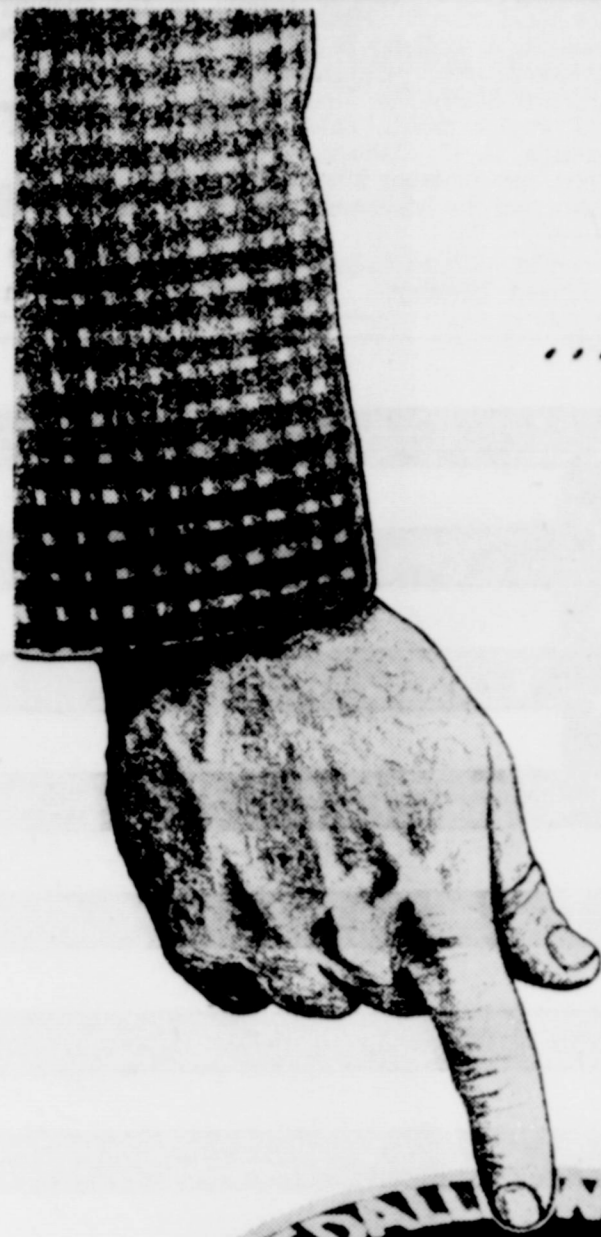

28-Year-Old Man Dies In Fall From Light Pole

Sammie Norwood of Tahoka, 28-year-old construction worker, was killed Sunday afternoon near Putnam, when he apparently came in contact with a 12,000 volt electricity transmission line.

He was said to have fallen from a utility pole where he was working.

Rescue workers applied artificial respiration for more than an hour, however, efforts were unsuccessful and he was pronounced dead by a Baird physician. Mrs. Bud Fleming, Putnam justice of the peace, ruled accidental death.

Norwood, an employee of Lewis Construction Company of Tahoka, which has been building the transmission line for West Texas Utilities Company from Cross Plains to Putnam, had worked for the firm eight years, the past three months near here.

Workers at the scene said that a wire which Norwood was carrying over his shoulder may have come into contact with a 12,000 volt electrical transmission line and the shock probably caused him to fall from the top of a utility pole.

Other workmen did not hear Norwood fall and discovered his limp body moments later. Cisco's Volunteer Fire Department dispatched a resuscitator to the scene and artificial respiration was tried. Efforts, however, were unavailing.

Norwood is survived by his mother, Mrs. Nannie Norwood of Tahoka; three sisters, Mrs. C. J. Renfro and Mrs. Winifred Craig, both of Tahoka, and Mrs. Price Richey of Placerville Calif.

Reminder is made to Callahan County farmers that March 21 is the final date to sign up for participation in the 1963 feed grain program handled through the ASC office.

To participate in the program, producers must divert at least 20 per cent of the farm feed grain base. The maximum acreage that may be diverted is the larger of 25 acres or 40 per cent of the feed grain base, not to exceed the total feed grain base. All designated diverted acreage may be grazed until May 1, with no grazing permitted from that date to Nov. 1.

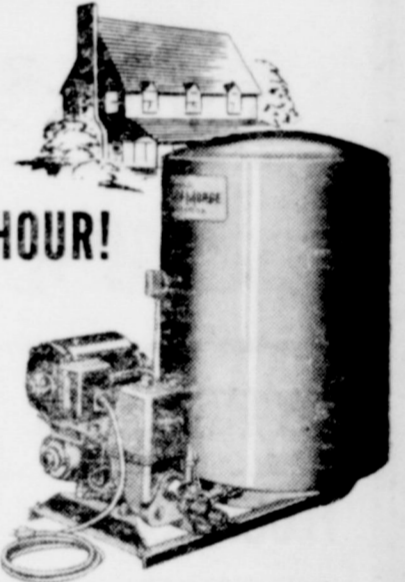

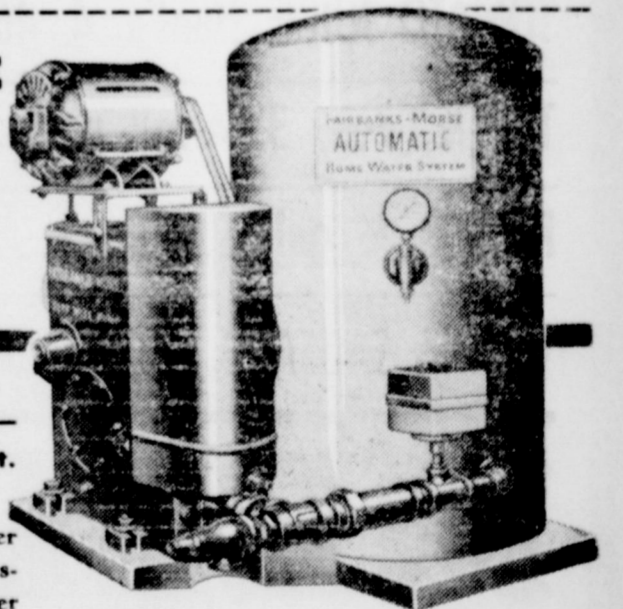

3,386 People Lived In Callahan In '80

Few people are alive who can remember when Callahan County was a sparsely-settled frontier.

First federal census made of the county was in 1880 and there were 3,386 people here then, despite the fact that the county had been organized only three years.

Names, ages and occupations of those 3,386 residents as enumerated 83 years ago are listed on a copy of the first census which is now in possession of B. C. Chrisman of Baird.

The initial census was taken by a printer named Albert D. Rust. First page of his report carried the following preface, describing conditions in Callahan County at that time.

"The almost total failure of crops reported is accounted for by the terrible summer on the newly-opened frontier.

"At least five per cent of the people of the county were on the move as is the custom here in the summer and must have failed to be enumerated. The largest number of cattle is owned by people reporting no farms and it is difficult to estimate all the cows and the number of their calves.

"The terrible loss of stock reported is far greater than was known and was caused by an unprecedented dry summer, followed by a very severe winter, with an exceedingly heavy fall of snow."
