C. (Lake Between Cross Plains and Rising Star): Consideration was given to locating a source of supply approximately equidistant from the two towns. Such a supply should be developed by reconstructing and raising the old Humble dam, located on a branch of Pecan Bayou about three and one-half miles south of State Highway 36 and about half way between Cross Plains and Rising Star. Or, a new dam could be constructed upstream from this location. A single treatment plant would suffice.
