Has someone forgotten?

Through the first 10 months of this year only \$1,002.05 has been contributed for the upkeep of Cross Plains Cemetery. Fixed expenses totaled \$1,-360.88. The deficit has averaged about \$38.00 per month and a \$464.07 surplus which existed at the beginning of the year is now exhausted.

Something must be done. To the living belongs the responsibility of maintaining the last resting place of the dead. It is an obligation which one generation bequeaths to another.

Families which have recently passed through the agonies of losing a loved one are generally responsive. Gifts from this small group, however, fall short of the amount needed to maintain the grounds where more than 1,200 lie buried.

Officers of the local Cemetery Association are appealing that the burial plot be placed on every Christmas gift list. Even if it means foregoing something else, dignity and duty demand that this generation meet its responsibility.

Most all Cross Plains churches took note of the historic events in Sabbath services and besought divine guidance for President Johnson as he assumed the helm of state. A special memorial service was held at the First Baptist Church Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Seventyfive persons of many faiths attended.

Classes were dismissed and Monday was a full holiday at Cross Plains schools as well as at most all other educational institutions in this section of the state. Cross Plains business establishments closed during funeral time of the fallen President in Washington.
