News Made Fast Around Midnight

Things are not necessarily quiet in Cross Plains at midnight.

At 12:02 Sunday morning the fire siren sounded, calling firemen to a blaze which broke out in Grider's Cafe on South Main Street. The fire, believed to have originated from a gas flame in the kitchen, was extinguished with damage confined chiefly to that caused by smoke and water.

Just as the blaze was extinguished a crash occurred at the intersection of Main Street and Highway 36.

The ambulance, driven by Roy

A Higginbotham ambulance from Rising Star was involved in a collision with a car occupied by four young people from Cross Plains.

Holly, was enroute to an Abilene hospital, to deliver Covie Weaver, 18, of Route 5, Comanche, for medical attention. Weaver had sustained two breaks in his leg and severe facial cuts in a wreck at Rising Star 45 minutes earlier. He received a broken shoulder in the accident here. It was reported from Abilene that 158 stitches were taken to close the cuts about his face and head. Weaver was taken on to Abilene in a Cross Plains ambulance. Holly was not hurt.

The other car in the accident belonged to Doyle Oliver. He and Miss Glenda Jennings, Jimmy Hargrove and Miss Karen Calhoun were all passengers. None was injured.

Absentee voting for the May primary begins April 12 and continues through the 28th.

Site Inspection Due For Housing Project

A representative of the Public Housing Administration was being expected in Cross Plains late yesterday for an inspection of the site for a proposed low-rent housing development.

Fred Tunnell and Dale Bishop, members of the local housing authority's board of directors, expressed the opinion that if the site is approved, the full project may gain government sanction.

Application has been made for 20 units to be constructed here with federal funds.

City Calls Bond Election April 3

Cross Plains City Council voted unanimously Tuesday night to call a bond election for April 3 to ballot on \$75,000 worth of general obligation bonds for improvements to the municipal waterworks.

Voting will take place in the City Hall. Alton Hornsby was named presiding judge and Mrs. Melody Strickland alternate.

Only one proposition will be balloted on. It will be substantially the same as number four on the ticket at an election Feb. 15. At that time two proposals carried and two failed. The issue to be voted on April 3 was one of the two which failed. It received 171 votes against and 170 for.

The other issue which did not carry in the Feb. 15 election was that asking \$22,000 for a

municipal swimming pool. That proposition, which failed by 54 votes, will not be re-submitted for the April 3 election.

All members of the City Council were present at Tuesday night's session and participated in ordering the April 3 vote.

C. N. Burt of Dallas, the city's bond representative, met with the council Tuesday night and at the close of the session announced that during the past five years the municipality has paid \$21,000 worth of its bonds ahead of schedule. During the same period another \$19,000 was paid on maturity dates, making a total of \$40,000 in the five-year period, or an average of \$8,000 yearly. These payments were over and above interest charges.

"The city's bonded debt is now only \$17,000," Burt said.

GOP Primaries Set In Baird, Clyde, Cross Plains; Maybe Denton Valley

A Republican primary will again be held in Callahan County.

Jack W. Tunnell of Cross Plains, county chairman, said Tuesday the G.O.P. would have polling places at Baird, Clyde, Cross Plains and possibly Denton Valley.

Members of the Republican Executive Committee met here Monday night and conducted a

drawing to determine the order in which names of candidates will appear on the ballot.

"We will offer a full slate of candidates," Tunnell said, "drawings were only necessary, however, in three races."

For Representative in Congress the order will be Phil Bridges and Dr. Clyde V. Morgan. Both are from Taylor County.

For U. S. Senate: Jack Cox of Harris County, Robert Morris of Dallas County, Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas County, and George Bush of Harris County. The announced candidates for president on the Republican ticket will be listed on the ballot in Callahan County as follows: Barry M. Goldwater, Nelson Rockefeller, Margaret Chase Smith and Harold Stassen.

Peanut Producers Have 17 Days To Release Acreage

April 6—only 17 days away—is one of the year's most significant dates for Callahan County peanut farmers.

J. C. Earp, county manager of the ASCS program reminds that April 6 is the final date which his office can accept requests for additional peanut allotments or release of unwanted acreage. "It is highly desirable," Earp says, "that peanut farmers who

do not intend to plant all or any part of their allotment for 1964 to release it."

When an allotment is released timely the peanut history of the farm is protected. This also permits the County Committee to reapportion unwanted acreage.

Requests for more acreage are reported exceeding the amount being released in Callahan County.
