Prayer And Grit Avert Death By Drowning

R. O. Kellar, 50, who lives five miles southeast of Cross Cut, is alive and well. His wife, through, how it looks, look death squarely in the eye.

It was alone last Wednesday morning, at the place where she and her husband lived the past 20 years, she stepped from where it banks of Red River, a stream from where it flows with Pecan Bayou. She decided to water the garden. She walked down to the steep edge to start the hose. Her feet slipped and she fell into water several feet deep.

She had never learned to swim. She pawed frantically in sinking, grabbed the line which ran to the bank. She was able to pull herself almost to the bank before the hose ripped off its reel. In a desperate grab she caught the bank's edge she caught her foot. It was strong

enough to pull her closer to the edge but gave away as she tried to lift her body from the water. With the other hand, she caught another root about like the one she'd just lost.

Her situation was becoming desperate, already she was near exhaustion. Changing hands to hold the small root, which was literally her thread of life, she pondered her plight. Her husband was away working on a drilling rig and would not return until four that afternoon, nearly five hours away.

Threw Out Evidence
"If I drown I must at least leave evidence of what happened," Mrs. Kellar said to herself. Accordingly, she took the free hand, removed her water-soaked bonnet and eye-glasses and pitched them on the creek bank.

Cries for help would be futile. There was no one within a mile. She decided to remain calm.

"I prayed for God's help, for wisdom in what to do and strength to do it," she said to a Review writer Thursday.

Her decision was to try to inch down the creek, holding the match-stem size roots until she could find a place where her feet would touch bottom. She went downstream as far as there were roots to sustain her without relief. Backward she inched until her finger, tinged with arthritis, sorely ached.

Fight For Life
"I know how one feels when the fight for life seems too hard," she said. "I was near the point of giving up and submitting to the inevitable when I saw a small willow limb just beyond reach."

With all the stretch she was able to muster the fingers of one hand grabbed the willow just after those of the other hand had turned loose from the root. The willow was stronger but still too small to sustain

her weight out of the water. Carefully she worked her way to where a foot was partially supported by another protruding root. Dividing her weight as best she could, she pulled to a piece of willow large enough to let her pull herself out, if she still had strength. Four times she tried to make it and fell back.

"It seemed that my arms were just not strong enough to lift my 160 pounds; I was near exhaustion," Mrs. Kellar recalls.

Again she prayed for strength and made covenants with God.

The fifth try was successful. She pulled herself out of the water and lay motionless until strength returned.

Examined by a physician Thursday, the Cross Cut lady was pronounced completely well, however, her hands and arms bore scratches and bruises, evidencing her final fight for life in the willows.

Cross Plains Patrolman Second Best Pistol Shot

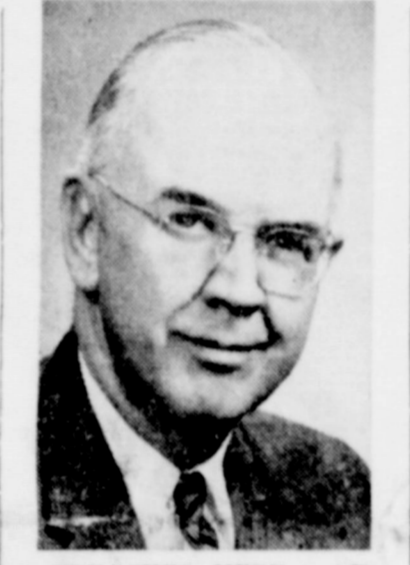
Vineyard, Cross Plains patrolman, returned last week end from Austin with two trophies won in competition with Texas Department of Public Safety's marksmen.

City Council Will Have Special Session Friday

Cross Plains City Council will meet in special session Friday night to pass on two ordinances, governing issuance of bonds for improvements to the water and gas systems.

Originally, propositions covering \$39,000 worth of improvements to the waterworks and \$14,000 worth of improvements to the gas system were combined in a single ordinance. These bonds were voted in an election held Feb. 15.

Dr. M. E. Roth, newly-elected mayor, refused to sign the ordinance or the bonds, contending that the propositions should be under two ordinances, not one. He intimated in a meeting Tuesday night that he would sign for the gas but not for the water.

"I think there may be ways to save all or a part of the \$39,000," he said.

Wayne Westerman was present at Tuesday night's meeting of the council and tendered a

proposition to build a pipeline to the water field on the W. T. McClure ranch and deliver it to the municipality at the city limits. Cost to the city would be 35 cents to the pipeline and five cents royalty per 1,000 gallons.

Many views were expressed, including opinions from nine citizens present as spectators, however, no action was taken Tuesday night.

Water Commissioner Ira Hall asked the group what he should presently be doing to meet the increasing demand for water during Summer months. There were diverse opinions but no consensus of solution.

"The people should be told," Hall said, "there's a likelihood of water rationing to laundries, service stations and other users unless we do something soon."

"Heaven help us if we have a dry Summer and a major fire," he cautioned.

Leukemia Fatal To 2 1/2-Year-Old Child

Robert Lee Thomas, III, 2 1/2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lee Thomas of Abilene and a great-grandson of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Gill of Cross Plains, died Tuesday afternoon of last week in Baylor Hospital at Dallas of leukemia.

He had been under treatment about five weeks and had been in the Dallas hospital the past month.

Band Leaving Monday On 2,200 Mile Trip

Sixty-one Cross Plains High School bandmen, Director Wayne McDonald and six other adults will leave here Monday morning at eight o'clock for a 2,200 mile trip in specially chartered, air conditioned buses.

The local band will be one of 33 featured in parade and festival concerts at the International 500 Speedway Classic at Indianapolis. The Cross Plains contingent will be the only Texas musical group in the procession.

Joplin First Day
First day's journey calls for the group to spend the night at Joplin, Mo., where reservations have been made at Sands Motor Lodge. Tuesday the trippers will go to Saint Louis, arriving there around 3:30 p.m. They will be quartered at the Mark Twain Hotel there that night. Wednesday they will take a sight-seeing tour to For-

est Park Zoo, one of the world's most outstanding municipally-operated zoos, and also visit a construction project where a steel arch is being built near the Mississippi River, commemorating that city's claim as "Gateway to the West." Wednesday night they will see Saint Louis Cardinals and San Francisco Giants, both contenders for the National League pennant.

Thursday morning the delegation will depart for Indianapolis, arriving there around noon. Quarters there are being arranged by the committee in charge of housing during the Festival.

Thursday night at six o'clock Director McDonald and Miss Linda Whitton, drum major of the band, will be presented an honor band award, commemorating appearance of the Cross Plains group at the International 500.

A three-mile street parade, in which the Cross Plains band will march, starts at 7 p.m. (DST). It will be televised. An estimated 500,000 people will see the procession from specially constructed bleachers lining the streets.

Friday, the Cross Plains Band will play a concert in downtown Indianapolis and go on a four-hour, sight-seeing tour of the city.

Saturday at 9 a.m. the local group will be at the Speedway for the Parade of Bands, a pre-race ceremony. The local musicians will march a mile and one-fourth, culminating at the finish line. An estimated 200,000 people will see the Cross Plains group at that time.

In addition to seeing the races Saturday, the group from here will visit the Speedway museum and other historical attractions.

At the end of the races Sat-

urday afternoon the trippers will again take to the road, driving to Louisville, Ky., to spend first night of their homeward journey. They will attend church there Sunday morning.

After lunch Sunday, the group will leave for Elizabethtown, Ky., to be guest of the Memorial Methodist Church that night. The congregation will serve dinner for the Cross Plains crowd. The band will play an outdoor program there beginning at 6:30 p.m. Church families will quarter the visitors in their homes overnight.

Monday morning plans call for departure from Elizabethtown to be made early to permit a stop at Mammoth Cave, one of the seven natural wonders of the world. Monday night will be spent at Little Rock, Ark.

Arrive Thursday
The trip will be culminated with arrival back in Cross

Plains on Tuesday afternoon, June 2, at six o'clock.

Adults to accompany the group in addition to McDonald are: Paul Whitton, Jack Watkins, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Latson, Mrs. Edwin Baum and Mrs. Forrest Waler.

Several other Cross Plains families will be in Indianapolis during the celebration. Among them are Mr. and Mrs. Dan Johnston, who plan to fly by private plane; Mr. and Mrs. Morris Thomas, who will stop there enroute to New York City, and Mrs. Zenovia Strickland, who will be there with her son Billy Dale Strickland, and possibly the Alton Hornsby's, whose plans were not complete yesterday.

Hundreds of local people are expected to be on hand Monday morning to see the band off. Dr. M. E. Roth, mayor, has proclaimed May 25 as Buffalo Band Day here.
