Big Water Well Hit At Sabanno

A water well, believed to be one of the strongest ever drilled in the Cross Plains area, was completed by Horace King at his 427-acre place, nine miles northeast of Cross Plains Friday. Three days of checking revealed the well to have a potential of between 300 and 400 gallons per minute. It is bottomed at 39 feet.

King has two other wells near by, capable of yielding a total of 150 gallons per minute. Irrigation equipment was being installed Monday morning to water Costal Bermuda, planted earlier this year. Oscar Schaefer was completing Monday another well, just south of King's place, which promised to be exceptionally strong. It was said to be slight-

ly deeper and will be utilized for irrigation.

C. W. Richter, whose land joins the Schaefer tract on the southeast, plans to test the water strata at his place with the thought of possibly putting in irrigation.

The recent water strikes are just north of the Cowan Hutton farm, much of which has been under irrigation several years.

The King land is that which was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. W. T. (Dub) McClure about 12 years ago. The Kings are presently making their home at the old Jess Moore place west of Cross Plains, however, they plan to move to the acreage nine miles north of here, a mile and one-half east of Sabanno, later this year.

Mrs. Maude Ann Richardson, 84, an early-day resident of the Pioneer community and widow of Barton McFarland Richardson, died June 11 in Memorial Hospital at Fort Stockton. She was a sister of the late E. M. Curry, former prominent independent oil operator.

The following day, Mrs. Clark Richardson, 61, daughter-in-law of the deceased, died following an illness of three weeks in a Kermit hospital.

The elder Mrs. Richardson was born in Hope, Ark., Oct. 1, 1879. She was married at Pioneer in 1896 and resided in this area until moving to Fort Stockton 24 years ago. Her husband died Nov. 21, 1950.

Survivors include five sons, two daughters, 21 grandchildren, 45 great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren, as well as a number of kinsmen who reside in and near Cross Plains.

The younger Mrs. Richardson was born Sept. 3, 1902, in Shawnee, Okla. She and her husband had made their home in Wink the past three years. Survivors include the husband, two sons, her mother and five grandchildren.

20 Seek 3 Posts On Local Faculty

Cross Plains school board members will meet in called session Wednesday night to screen 20 applications for three vacancies on the local faculty.

Two teacher openings currently exist in junior high and there is one vacancy in the primary department. Needed are: a teacher for 7th and 8th grade social studies, an instructor for 7th and 8th grade science, and a second grade teacher.

Faculty for the ensuing term

will number 26, as compared with 27 during the year just ended. Superintendent Paul Whitton explained yesterday that the size of the incoming first grade created the curtailment. There will be 25 beginners when the new term opens Aug. 31, as compared with 42 last year.

Maintenance personnel at the school system has been engaged in painting and repair projects the past four weeks and will continue in that type of work

until the new term begins. Seats on the east side of the football stadium have already been repainted and repaired and workmen Tuesday were mending windows in classroom buildings. Desks, study hall tables, lunchroom and laboratory equipment are scheduled for next attention of maintenance workers.

"Indications point to a challenging school year," said Whitton Tuesday, "and we're attempting to have everything in readiness — both personnel and facilities — to make it the most successful term in local history."

School trustees who will sit down with Whitton Wednesday night to screen the 20 applications for faculty positions, are: Charlie Sowell, Hadden Payne, Sterling Odum, Nathan Foster, Dr. Carl J. Sohns, Jimmy McCowen and Forrest Walker.

Ex-Putnam Man Heads Vast Missions Program

The Rev. George Gaskins of Fort Collins, Colo., a brother of Mrs. Exal D. McMillan of Cross Plains, has been elected superintendent of the Baptist Church's metropolitan missions for the greater Denver area.

The Rev. Mr. Gaskins, who has pastored Immanuel Baptist at Fort Collins the past five and one-half years, will promote mission programs in 35 Southern Baptist Churches in

metropolitan Denver and lead in establishing new congregations.

Gaskins is a native of Putnam and graduated from high school there in 1941. His father, the late G. P. Gaskins, was in the grocery business in Putnam for 32 years.

Grain Crop Sold, Co-Op Building Peanut Dryer

Small grain harvesting is complete in the Cross Plains area, save for the remnants of a few small fields. All but a slight percentage of the crop has been marketed.

Figures released from the Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. in Cross Plains Monday revealed that 5,816,930 pounds of new crop wheat, 96,948 bushels, had been bought

by the firm. Oats purchased totaled 429,640 pounds, 13,426 bushels, for which \$8,375.51 was paid.

With the harvest completed, the co-op began Monday morning installing equipment for a peanut dryer to be in operation for this fall's crop. Damon D. Jones, assistant local manager, is supervising construction and will oversee this phase of the firm's business.

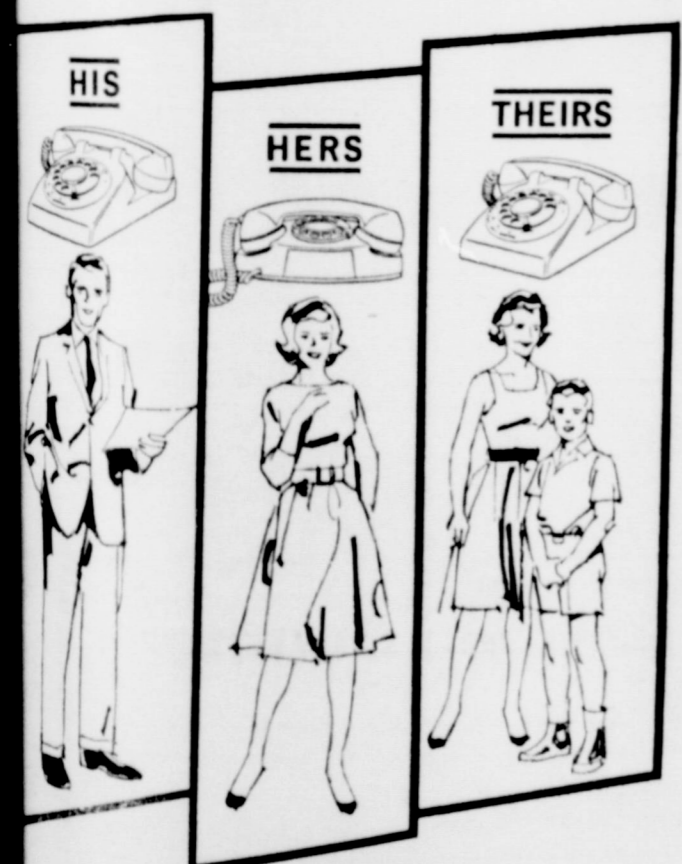

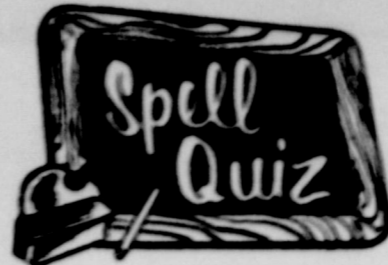

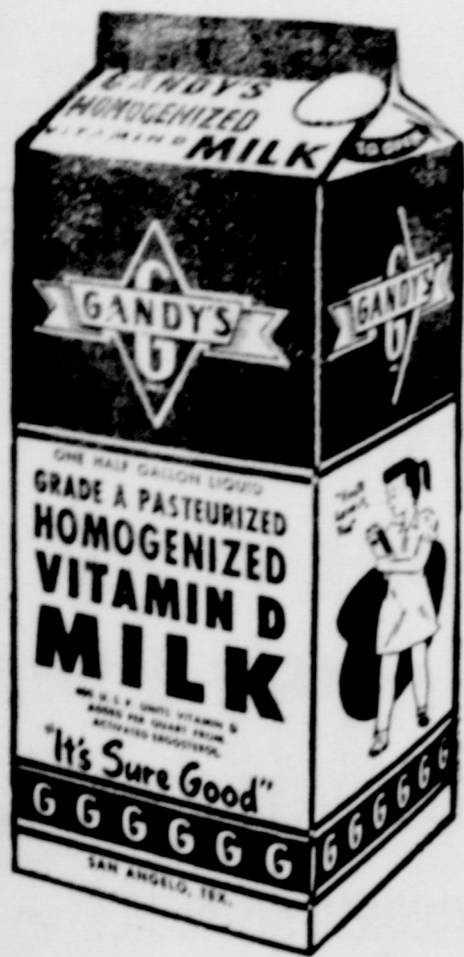
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
