## School Enrollment Drops To New Low Opening Day

Opening day enrollment at Cross Plains schools Monday dropped to the lowest point in 25 years. A total of 479 students met first-day classes, as compared with 540 last year.

The decrease this year resulted from 15 fewer in high school and 46 less in elementary grades.

Unless there is an increase within the next few weeks," said Superintendent Paul Whitton, "it means that next year's

faculty will be reduced by two or three teachers."

Largest class in the entire system here is the fifth grade which has 55 members. The section taught by Mrs. Roy Stambaugh has 28 and that of Mrs.

L. W. Tyson 27. Largest high school class is the sophomore group with 49.

Total enrollment of elementary grades Monday was 322, compared with 368 a year ago. The high school are 157 students, compared with 172 last year.

Enrollments by individual classes are as follows: Mrs. Chas. Ballew, first grade, 28; Miss Jewel Denton, second, 17; Mrs. Paul Whitton, second, 18; Miss Billie Frances Carroll, third, 21; Miss Betty Browning, third, 22; Mrs. L. W. First-day enrollment of other recent years have been: 1963, 540; 1962, 530; 1961, 525; 1960, 512; 1959, 538; 1958, 511; 1957, 499; 1956, 522; 1955, 527; 1954, 545; 1953, 543; 1952, 540; 1951, 588. A check made by the newspaper staff revealed that not since the close of World War II had opening day enrollment been as low as that here on Monday.

## School Budget Set At \$214,727

Recently approved budget for Cross Plains schools for the current fiscal year totals \$214,727.

Major expenditures are listed as follows: teachers salaries \$150,570, other instructional expenses \$11,696, salary of bus drivers \$12,400, maintenance and operation of buses \$8,200, payments on buses \$2,624, operation of school plant \$6,500, maintenance of plant and equip-

ment \$6,200, insurance on school buildings and their contents \$1,600, student activities \$1,000, furniture and equipment \$2,000, retirement of bonds \$7,281 and interest on bonds \$6,656.

Estimated sources of income total \$214,568. They are local taxation \$58,000, interest on investments \$1,400, receipts from the county available fund \$744, state funds \$154,384 and miscellaneous receipts \$10. Complete collection of all the itemized anticipation revenues would leave a deficit of \$159.

## Lightning Pains Telephone Men

Telephone men have had their troubles the past week.

A large truck, hauling an oil field tank, snapped wires west of Cross Plains last Thursday afternoon and disrupted service west of Clark's Station on State Highway 36 all the way to Rowden. Telephones in 40 rural homes were affected.

Then Thursday night, lightning knocked out circuits at Cross Cut, Atwell, Sabanno and in the Burnt Branch vicinity. The disruption of service, because of lightning, was the second such event in two weeks in the Atwell community.

Local repairmen, as well as crews from the outside, worked almost around-the-clock Thursday night, Friday and Saturday to restore service in all the damaged areas.

## Motorcade Will Visit Two Farms

Elmer L. Foster, area supervisor for the Farm Home Administration, and John Curry, director of the program in Callahan and Coleman Counties, will head a motorcade of interested citizens Thursday to two Cross Plains area farms for tours of inspection.

Both places, those of Chester E. Woody and Paul Lutzenberger, are cited as superior examples of agricultural industry being supported by FHA credit.

The motorcade will leave the Citizens State Bank building in Cross Plains Thursday morning at 9:30 and move to the Woody farm, near Cottonwood, where an irrigation project was recently installed. Water is being supplied from a flood retention dam built by the Soil Conservation Service's cooperation with Turkey Creek Water Control District.

Second visit will be to the Lutzenberger place, where trippers will view one of this area's most outstanding dairy operations.

Curry, who was in Cross Plains one day last week making arrangements for the tour, invited all interested citizens to be at the bank building by departure time and join the motorcade.

## Wettest August On Record Nips Drouth

August, generally the year's driest month, proved to be 1964's wettest in Cross Plains. A total of 3.02 inches was gauged here after seven showers by S. F. Bond, official Weather Bureau observer.

Not only was August the wettest month of the current year, it also brought more moisture than any other August since 1950, as far back as could be quickly checked locally.

Total precipitation for the year now stands at 11.56 inches,

2.17 inches below to the same period in 1963 and about three and one-half inches less than normal to this date.

While August rainfall was too late to be of wide benefit to peanut crops, it was particularly welcomed by farmers waiting to plant small grains and livestockmen as a boon to winter grasses. Last week end's showers also put water in stock ponds, many of which were perilously low. Some were completely dry.

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes open the 1964 football season before home fans Friday night hosting the Early Longhorns.

Friday's initial game is a renewal of the Buff-Horn series which was interrupted in 1962 due to a revamping of District 10-A. Last meeting of the two schools was in 1961 when the Longhorns took a 21-6 victory in Buffalo Stadium.

Kickoff time is slated for 8 p.m. in the non-conference affair.

### Early Rebuilding

Although the Longhorns have 11 returning lettermen in the herd, lack of size is expected to be their main drawback.

## Freddy Johnston Speaks To Businessmen Tuesday

Freddy Johnston, Cross Plains High School senior, who represented Cross Plains at a recent seminar on crime prevention held in Austin, spoke to business and professional men at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday noon. Sixteen attended the session, held in basement of the First Methodist Church.

"First of all," said the youthful speaker, "I'd like to thank this organization for its part in sending me to Austin to participate in the conference." "It was a rewarding experience," he continued, "and things learned there may be later implemented here."

The youth pointed out that

85 per cent of the dropouts from public schools quit their education because of financial pinch. In many cases, he advised, as little as 50 cents per day would keep them in classes. It is from these dropouts that a large percentage of juvenile crime originates.

Young Johnston also explained a plan being tried in a number of Texas towns where students are attending school a half day and working in stores and plants the other half. Their instruction at school, together with experience obtained in their jobs is pointed toward equipping them for a trade and the life of a useful citizen.

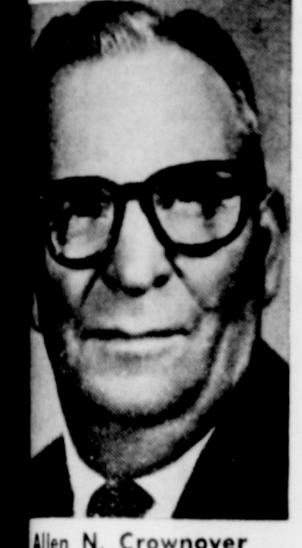
## Local Man's 40 Years Service Cited By Humble

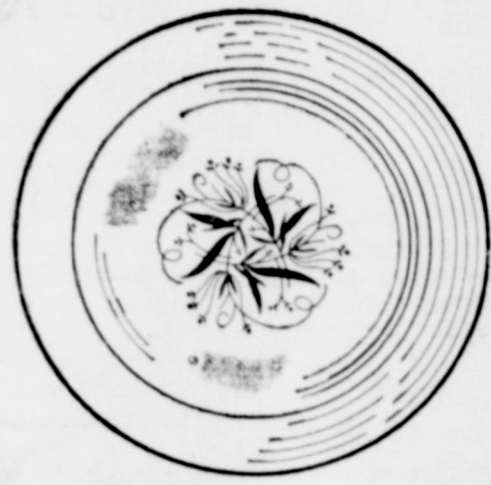
Renfro allowed 10 hits, stopped two at the plate and issued one walk in going the

## 17 Accidents Plague Rural County In July

Callahan County had a total of 17 accidents in rural areas during July, including two with personal injury, according to figures recently released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Property damage in the 17 mishaps is said to have totaled \$7,895.

So far this year, the county has had five fatal accidents, 25 personal injury crashes and 75 property damage accidents for a total of 105. Six persons died and property damage was \$72,505.

In the first seven months of 1963, Callahan County had four fatal accidents, 14 personal injury crashes, and 55 property damage for a total of 73 wrecks. Nine people died and 22 were injured. Property damage was \$68,140.

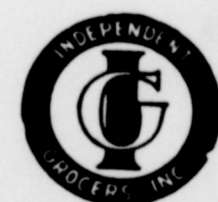
