## County Line Fuss May Go To Court For Settlement

A long-standing boundary line dispute between Coleman and Callahan Counties may go to the courts for settlement. If so, Coleman County may challenge Taylor County in the same litigation.

In a recent meeting with Taylor County Commissioners Court in Abilene, Coleman Judge Frank Lewis pointed out

that Callahan and Coleman have been disputing an overlap, which varies from 850 feet to less than 400 feet along their 25-mile mutual boundary. He said this was due to the establishment of a line by Callahan County in 1898 which has never been approved by Coleman County.

R. L. Barnett, Coleman County public surveyor was quoted as saying that Coleman County had received no cooperation at all from Callahan officials in an attempt to settle the problem and that it may have to be adjudicated in a court suit, which could also include Taylor County.

The Taylor-Coleman overlap is said to be about 400 feet for approximately four and one-half miles. It was explained that the discrepancy arose as a result of the two counties establishing boundaries at different dates and neither ratifying the other's.

Lewis said the main reason for getting the lines straightened out is for taxing purposes. He added there had been complaints due to the double taxing in Callahan and Coleman counties, but that there had been no such taxing due to the Taylor-Coleman overlap.

New No-Man's Land  
Lewis also pointed out that, although it did not concern Coleman County, there is apparently a "no-man's land" of about 350 feet between Taylor's east and Callahan's west boundary. He explained Coleman County's survey figures show that the two lines lack that much joining.

Callahan County officials are reportedly interested in settling the boundary line dispute for still another reason. They remind that questions of jurisdiction might arise should a crime be committed in the disputed area.

Courts Involved  
Callahan officials are reportedly aware that Coleman County's line was established first, however, they point out that the land description used for Callahan's south boundary line is the one presently followed in the Land Commissioner's office at the state capital.

The Callahan-Coleman dispute was brought to light when the Clyde Independent School District consolidated an area to the south border of this county. Tax levies were then made on several tracts, which were also on Coleman County school rolls. Land owners in the disputed area objected to double taxation.

Mrs. A. C. Billingsley Dies At San Angelo  
Mrs. A. C. Billingsley, 82, a 31-year resident of Cross Plains, died at 11:10 p.m. Monday in Shannon Memorial Hospital at San Angelo, where she had been a patient the past three weeks. Death resulted from heart trouble.

Funeral services were scheduled from the First United Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains Wednesday at 2 p.m. with Dr. Morris F. Elliott, pastor of the Immanuel Episcopal Church in San Angelo. Burial will be in the local cemetery beside the grave of Mr. Billingsley, who died in 1948.

Born at Ellsboro, in Young County, Feb. 2, 1882, Mrs. Billingsley and her late husband married at her home town in 1901. They came to Pioneer during the days of great oil activity there and moved to Cross Plains in 1933.

Mrs. Billingsley had been ill about four months, however, her condition worsened three weeks ago and she was rushed to the San Angelo hospital. She had grown steadily weaker. All of her four daughters had been in almost constant attendance at the bedside.

Survivors include, the daughters: Mrs. Hubert Johnson of Big Spring, Mrs. E. M. Pancake of Borger, Mrs. Max D. Lovett of San Angelo and Mrs. G. A. Lansdale of Costa Mesa, Calif.; three sisters, Miss Mattie Donnell of Cross Plains, Mrs. Eva Hulsey of Las Cruces, N. M., and Miss Jewel Donnell of Vernon; two brothers, Frank Donnell of Albany and Jim Donnell of Newcastle; four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

## Recreational Center Gets State FHA O.K.

A vast recreational center, midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, moved a step nearer reality last week as approval of a loan application was given by state office of the Farmers Home Administration.

The approval is tentative and based upon compliance with federal requirements. Exact amount of the loan is not yet definite. It is expected to be between \$60,000 and \$100,000. The outline of purposes for which it will be used and the area to be served were given sanction of the state FHA office.

Oscar Schaefer, member of a three-man board for Eastland County which first approved the loan application, told this newspaper that there is now every reason to believe the project will be built.

Plans call for Lakewood Country Club, once known as Philpeco, to be the site for the recreational center. The 69 acres there would be deeded to a non-profit corporation and completely developed. A committee headed by R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains and W. E. (Bill) Tyler of Rising Star

is presently drafting preliminary plans.

The golf course would be rebuilt and greens enlarged. Highly-popular turf grass would replace Bermuda. New pipelines and pumping equipment would be installed to adequately irrigate fairways as well as greens. A concrete swimming pool is called for and picnic facilities, boat docks and playground equipment would be a part of the master plan.

In addition to a clubhouse, facilities are planned to accommodate family reunions and other large gatherings at the recreational center.

All facilities would be available to the people of Cross Plains, Rising Star and surrounding communities without membership fees. Accommodations are called for such as sewage, water hydrants and fire protection for trailer houses which may be moved to the center for annual family vacations.

The project was made possible as a result of the recently broadened objectives of FHA, one of which is to aid small towns and rural communities in battling problems of stagnation and deterioration.

## Santa Anna Mountaineers Second Test For Buffaloes

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will travel to Buffalo country Friday night in the second grid action for both schools this season.

The Mountaineers currently own a three-year win streak over the Herd. Cross Plains has not scored against Santa Anna the past two tilts, the Mountaineers winning 14-0 in 1963 and 28-0 in 1962. In 1961 Santa Anna triumphed 14-7. The last Buff-victory came in '60 when the Bisons emerged victorious 16-8.

Kickoff time is slated for 8 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium.

Neither team has won a decision this year. Baird romped to a 45-12 decision over the Mountaineers, and the Buffs played Early to a 9-0 tie in initial outings last Friday.

In pre-season predictions Santa Anna was rated at the bottom of five-team District 9-A, and was supposedly in a rebuilding era. The Mountaineers claim seven returning lettermen from a 4-5-1 record last year.

Frank Valdez, 150 pound senior fullback is the only returnee of the ball handling quartet. He was highly regarded in scouting reports and he has earned three letters.

Six linemen are back, headed by 190-pound tackle Nelson Perry. He is also a three-year letter carrier. Other linemen back are center Ronnie McCarroll, tackle Jackie Walker, guard Warren Wallace and ends Joe Rutherford and Billy Don Cupps.

# Defense Halts Loss Skein As Bisons-Horns Tie 0-0

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes still have not won a game in their last 13 outings, but they did put an end to a 12-game losing streak Friday night.

The Herd fought visiting Early High School Longhorns to a 0-0 draw in a tight defensive game.

Cross Plains last won an opening tilt in 1957 when the Bison found rain to their liking and whipped Baird 19-0. Since that time they have lost six consecutive initial contests. Last victory recorded by the Herd was a 12-0 verdict over Eastland in Buffalo Stadium on Nov. 2, 1962, before a Dad's Night crowd.

### Defense Shines

Defensive units of both elevens far out-performed their offensive counterparts here last Friday. Neither team was able to gain a net of 100 yards rushing. Cross Plains was held to just 37 yards, and the Longhorns were limited to 88 net yards.

In the passing department both did somewhat better. The Buffaloes connected on two passing attempts for 49 yards and Early completed three for 38 yards. The Buffaloes' aggregate from scrimmage was 86 yards and the Longhorns totaled 116 yards.

Both teams had one penetration, but Early led in first downs nine to six.

### Early Threatens

Following the opening kickoff Early began one of its two 50-yard drives. The visitors

traveled from their own 38 to the Herd's 18 before the locals defense held on downs. Key play of the 10-effort march was a 28-yard pass and run from Quarterback Richard Davis to Left End Herbie Martin.

Twice in the second canto the Longhorns penetrated to the Herd 26 on short-lived drives but the Buff defense was capable and held for downs.

Only once did Cross Plains control the ball in Longhorn territory in the first half, and that was just inches across mid-field following a punt. Early's defense was toughest in the second period when the Buffs were thrown for a minus 26 yards rushing.

### Opens Up

Offensive units began working better in the second half. After taking the kickoff the Bison blitzed from midfield to the Longhorn 25 in three plays, but a fumble, one of three the Herd lost, rebuffed that attack. Right Halfback Sammy Strickland provided the early thrill of the half with a 13-yard sprint.

Buff Left Tackle Freddy Johnston stymied a mild Longhorn threat with a fumble recovery midway through the stanza.

Late in the last quarter Early cranked up its second 50-yard, 10-play march, but once again Buff defenders held. On the first play, Cross Plains' fumble was recovered by Fullback Edgar Huddleston and Left End Mike Whiteley. A Longhorn desperation aerial attack was thwarted

and Cross Plains then imposed its only serious threat of the game as the seconds ticked away.

### Near Touchdown

Operating from its own 45, Cross Plains gained midfield via a penalty. A passing try was tipped away and the stage was set for the final spine tinging play.

With less than 10 seconds remaining, Quarterback Tommy Purvis rolled to his left and launched the pigskin to two Buff receivers covered by two longhorns. After a juggling act senior Left End Reggie Stover gained possession at the Early 20, but he was dragged down at the 10 yard line by Huddleston and a teammate as the final gun sounded.

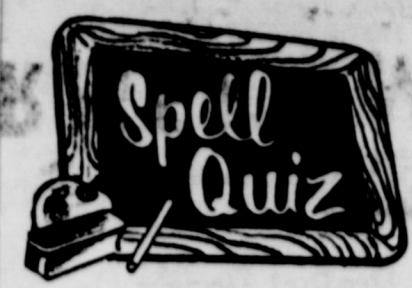
