Rain Sunday Brings '64 Total To Normal

General rain fell over the Cross Plains area Sunday. Measurements varied from one inch at Rowden to nearly three inches west of Cottonwood. Most stock ponds were replenished and streams ran.

Peanut harvesting was halted by the precipitation but farmers and ranchers welcomed it

as a boon to small grains and Winter pastures.

Mr. and Mrs. Homer Norris and daughter, Clovie, were returning home Sunday night after having attended church services at Cross Cut. As their 1959 Ford started to Cross Turkey Creek it became mired. The stream was barely running at the time but before the auto could be removed rising waters washed it 100 yards downstream. It was still in the water late Monday.

S. F. Bond, local weather observer, measured Sunday's rain in Cross Plains at 1.45 inches. His gauge is in the downtown district, though, and other areas of the city measured upward to two inches. Total for the first 10 months of 1964 now stands at 22.40 inches, considered approximately normal.

The year's total, though, tells only a portion of the local weather story. Although the aggregate is about normal it does not take into account that this area went 66 days without moisture during June, July and August. Crops and pasture grasses suffered most during the peak growing season.

Buffaloes Back Home To Host Clyde Friday Night

Cross Plains High School's Buffaloes come back home this week end after a four week absence to play host to the Clyde Bulldogs.

The Buffs, who are still looking for their first District 10-A win, will be taking on the cross-countians who have lost only one conference encounter. In loop action Clyde suffered its only loss last week at the hands of De Leon. In pre-season competition only Class AA Haskell triumphed over the Bulldogs.

Last year the Bulldogs romped to a 39-22 decision over the Herd, but the rallying Bison collected more points in

that clash than in the entire previous season. Clyde is riding a four-game win streak over the Herd, with the last Buff victory coming in 1959, 14-6.

Clyde was predicted to finish third in 10-A pre-season polls, but 17 returning lettermen make the Bulldogs a formidable foe. Heading a potent backfield is all-district honorable mention Quarterback Buddy Howe, 185 pound senior, and all-district and all-area Halfback Rick Dennis. The speedy 160-pound senior has seen only limited action this year due to a pre-season injury, but he was back in the line-up last week end and is expected to be sound Friday. Rounding out a balanced backfield quartet are are backs Butch Waggoner and Connie Ramos.

Up front the Bulldogs line is filled with seasoned veterans, but is only average in the weight department.

Kickoff Friday will be at 7:30 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium.

117 ABSENTEE VOTES POLLED IN CALLAHAN

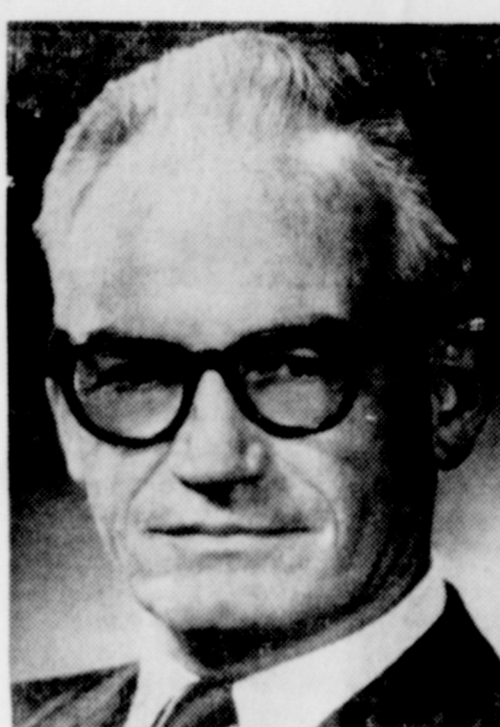

700 Votes Forecast Here Next Tuesday

Tuesday is general election day throughout the nation.

With hotly-contested races all the way from the courthouse to the White House, the greatest turnout of voters in history is forecast.

Cross Plains is expected to poll about 700 and Callahan County near 3,000.

Spirited campaigns by President Lyndon B. Johnson, Democrat, and Senator Barry M. Goldwater, Republican, have developed seething interest in the quadrennial contest. This race alone, though, will not be responsible for the Tuesday's turnout. Hard campaigns have been waged by candidates all down the ticket.

In Cross Plains voting will take place at the City Hall. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Franzel Odum will serve as presiding judge. His assistants will be Fred W. Stacy and 10 ladies: Mmes. O. B. Edmondson, Elvis B. Scott, Juanita Mayes, Johnny O. Adair, Hadden Payne, Zenovia Strickland, Bill Kilgore, Forrest Walker, Chester Glover and L. D. Koenig.

A new feature in Tuesday's election will be a recently-enacted federal constitutional amendment which abolishes the poll tax as a voting requirement for national offices. The provision will allow persons who registered during a special 30-day period which ended March 6 to vote, even though they paid no poll tax. The vote, though, will be allowed only on federal candidates. A heavy black line across the ballot indicates the portion of the ticket on which they are eligible to vote.

Peanuts Bring \$227 In Government Loan

Harvesting of Peanuts was just getting underway over the Cross Plains area when weekend rains halted digging.

Callahan County Farmers Cooperative in Cross Plains had dried 187,575 pounds to noon Tuesday. The newly-completed plant operated at half capacity Monday.

A. G. Black, general manager of the Co-Op, said yesterday that it is important that producers bring their marketing cards when they wish to place peanuts in government loan. The local facility is handling papers on these transactions and serving as a government warehouse. It was reported that most peanuts are averaging about \$227 per ton when placed in the loan. The amount is adjusted upward or downward, dependent upon grades.

A grading shed has been built just across the street west of the Co-Op and federal graders will be here daily until the crop is gathered. It is estimated that harvesting will continue through most of November.

B. D. Montgomery, Cross Plains peanut buyer, recently made a tour of fields in this area and reported that yields are going to be higher than first believed. "The drought hurt," he said, "but not as first feared."

214 Pledge Support For Big Recreational Center

With 214 persons signed to pay \$5 per month for the first year of operation of a proposed recreational center, to be located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, success of the project loomed likely late yesterday.

Efforts are being made to push the total to 250 by the time the \$70,000 loan application comes up for financial approval. Spearheading the campaign for members are R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains and W. E. (Bill) Tyler of Rising Star.

Names of Cross Plains area persons who have signed to support the recreational facility are published elsewhere in today's issue of the Review. Solicitors urge that families who have not yet affiliated, plan to do so within the next seven days. Petition blanks are available at the Citizens State Bank, Dave Lee's Service Station and the Cross Plains Review.

Plans call for about \$70,000 to be spent at the old Lakewood Country Club to rebuild a flashy nine-hole golf course with watered fairways and greens, to construct a clubhouse, a swimming pool, miniature golf course, bathing and boating facilities, picnic areas and modern camping grounds. Preliminary approval of the loan has been given by Farmers Home Administration, however, a requirement stipulated in the passing was that a sufficient number of supporters be secured to guarantee financial success for the first year. 4 Negroes Charged With Robbery Here

Four Abilene Negroes have been charged in connection with robbery of a Cross Plains service station the night of Sept. 29. Statements were signed by three of the group. They will appear before a 42nd District Court grand jury in Baird Thursday morning.

Jackie Webber, 17, and Emmit Williams and Curtis James Robinson, both 18, are being held in county jail at Ballinger. A fourth suspect was jailed at Benjamin in Knox County.

The youths are reported to have told officers that they passed through Cross Plains enroute to Waco and decided to rob a station. They allegedly broke a window at Otis Purvis Phillips 66 Station on Highway 36 and looted the cash register and a vending machine, taking

about \$51. Efforts to rob Dilard and Falkner Station, two blocks east of the Purvis place, failed.

From here the group is said to have gone to Comanche and robbed a cafe. Webber, Williams and Robinson are presently being held in Ballinger in connection with the robbery of a drive-in cafe Oct. 14. Arrests were first made in a crackdown at Abilene on a wide-ranging ring of burglary suspects. A number of other youths were taken into custody but only four are believed to have been involved in break-ins in this county.

Officers from a number of nearby counties have been questioning the youths being held in connection with a wave of thefts over this section of Texas.

County Transfers \$18,800 For Hospital's Operation

Care of indigent patients at Callahan County Hospital for the past fiscal year amounted to \$14,253, according to a recently-completed audit. Outstanding debts at the hospital also increased \$14,543 during the period, giving the two items to be overcome a total of \$28,796.

County funds transferred to the hospital during the past fiscal year amounted to \$18,800. Members of the hospital board met with Callahan County Commissioners Court Monday afternoon and reduced the labor budget from \$3,500 monthly to \$2,400, a curtailment of \$1,100 monthly.

Project Agriculture . . . ZIP Coded Mailings Move With Frost Line Farmers and Gardeners Benefit From New Service

The old saw that "Everyone talks about the weather, but nobody does anything about it," no longer applies to the Post Office Department. It's ZIP Coding the Frost Line!

In doing something about the weather, the Department is offering a boon to farmers, nurserymen, truckers and businessmen whose margin of profit depends, to a great degree, on beating Jack Frost to the market.

Dubbed PROJECT A—for Agriculture—the new program consists of speeding delivery of mail order seeds, plants, and food products by ZIP Coding parcels according to the movement of the Frost Line.

Here's how Project A works: A farm or a nursery ships its perishable products—flowers, shrubberies, trees, vegetables, seeds, etc.—by parcel post, ZIP Coded according to the frost lines announced annually by the Weather Bureau.

In filling orders from customers, the mailer breaks down these weather zones into ZIP Code sectional centers, to which delivery is made directly from his local post office.

The result? Plants are received days earlier.

Does it work? The Jackson and Perkins Nurseries, of Newark, N.J.—the world's largest nursery and the largest rose growers in the United States—are sold on the program.

They have found—in shipping nearly a million parcels of perishable plants—that an estimated three handlings are eliminated between the point of mailing and the point of receipt, when the parcels are ZIP Coded according to the Frost Line.

And the Jackson and Perkins parcels were received "in almost record time and in excellent condition."

Study Group

Developed by a Parcel Post Study group established by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to revitalize parcel post services, Project A will also provide special Post Office Department labels, free of charge, which identify ZIP Coded parcels as agricultural or botanical products, subject to spoilage or damage.

Pool Cases

The Parcel Post Study Group has also devised a new program for extensive use of "pool cases"—large cardboard boxes in which smaller parcels destined for the same sectional center are pooled for mailing—to further reduce parcel post damage.

Upon its arrival, the pool case would be immediately opened, and the contents delivered quickly to the addresses in nearby communities.

This method saves time enroute, by reducing the number of necessary post office handlings, and greatly reduces the likelihood of damage—which traditionally has increased with each handling.

President Johnson has called for the best possible postal service at the lowest possible cost. Project Agriculture and pool cases are just two new programs recently initiated by the Post Office Department.

Scheduled Parcel Post

At Lansing, Mich., Mr. Fredrick Belen, Deputy Postmaster General, recently supervised the start of a new program for shipment of automotive parts using ZIP Code and pool cases.

In many areas of the country parcel post shipments are being scheduled so that mailers can be told when they can expect their packages to be delivered. In many instances next day delivery is being accomplished.

On Sept. 9 at Annapolis, Md., Mr. Gronouski announced an experiment for "scheduled" delivery over about 14,000 square miles in the mid-Atlantic area for parcel post, providing guaranteed delivery within specified times between 656 post offices. This is the first of many such programs being developed.

Albany Man Heading Callahan Census Job

Floyd Myron Johnson of Albany has been named crew leader to supervise enumerators for an agricultural census in Callahan and adjoining counties.

The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after Nov. 5, the Bureau of the Census will mail questionnaires to all rural box holders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leader is a key person in conducting a Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules their work, reviews the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the agricultural resources and production. Such information is used in making decisions on many segments of the economy. Data gathered the number and size of acreage and harvest of livestock inventories, information on farm equipment and improvements and some production figures.

The information will be published starting in 1965.

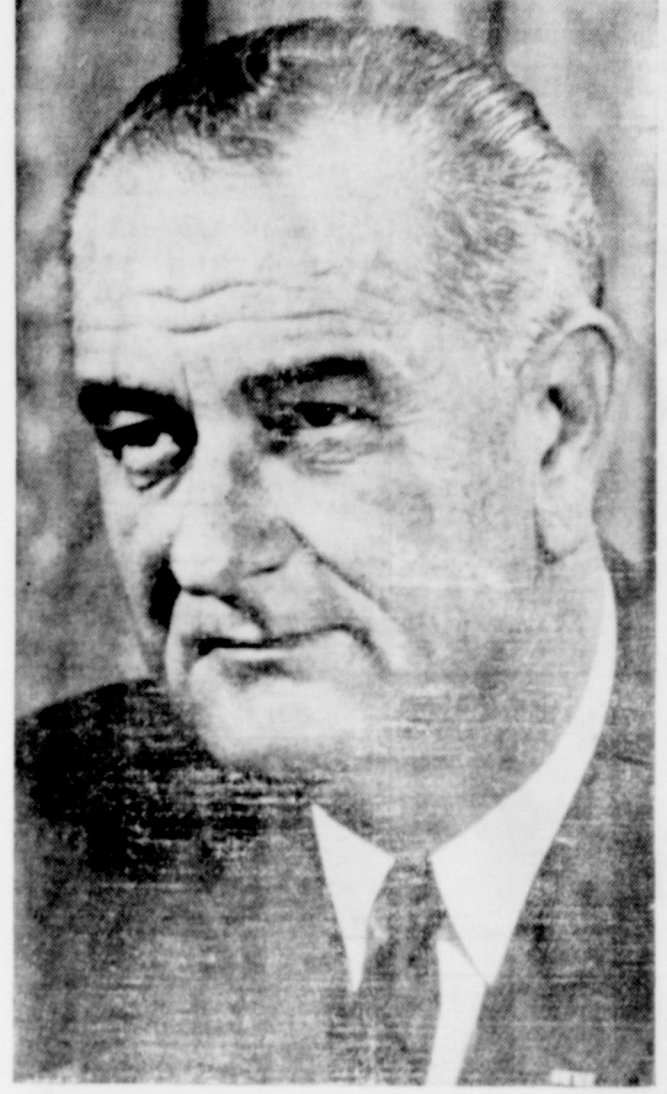

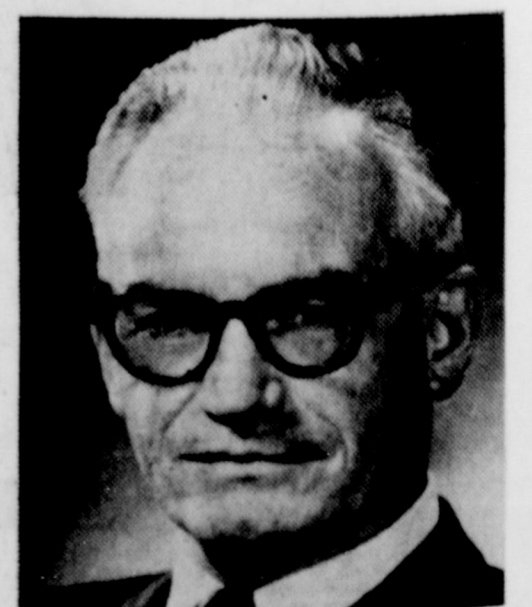

Baird Dumps Herd 35-16 Homecoming Saturday

Plains Buffaloes spotted Baird Bears three first-half touchdowns then played an even game through the first three quarters Saturday.

Baird built up a 21-0 first-half lead and dominated the second half but it was Cross Plains who provided the big game of the night in the second half.

Strickland got the Bears into the scorebook in the first quarter with a 71-yard punt return. Cross Plains surprised the Bears with a high single-game output of 16 points, shadowing Baird's lone victory over the Bears. Cross Plains' heretofore featureless aerial game came Saturday with six successive airborne attacks netting 16 points although two were interceptions. The herd got 72 net yards and made two touchdowns. Baird, however,

picked up 12 firsts, 191 yards rushing and 106 via the air lanes.

Quick Lead
of sixes again with 5:17 showing.

Baird quickly proved its superiority to the large homecoming crowd by scoring the first three times it possessed the pigskin.

The Bears took the opening kickoff and moved steadily downfield 52 yards in 11 plays in four minutes, 15 seconds. Fullback Richard Windham capped the drive with a two-yard run through a gaping hole at right tackle. Quarterback Richie Crow split the uprights for the first of four one-point conversions.

A partially blocked, very short punt which slid off right halfback Bobby McMillan's foot, set the Bruins in motion for the second tally at the Herd's 17. On the first play Left Half-

back Steve Stanley stunted his way around right end for the touchdown. Crow made seven of sixes again with 5:17 showing on the clock.

An unidentified Bear fell on a Buff fumble at the Herd 15 and just two plays later Right Halfback Eddie Childers skirted left end for the tally. Crow's unerring toe upped the score to 21-0 with 3:26 left in the initial quarter.

Strickland Rambles
After a short Bison drive cut short by a fumble, Baird was forced to punt Left Halfback Sammy Strickland gathered in the bounding oval on his own 29, side-stepped two onrushing Bears and outran Baird's Windham 71 yards for a Cross Plains touchdown. With 10:55 remaining in the second stanza, Fullback Jim Brown cracked over right tackle for the two-point conversion.

Baird countered late in the same period on a five play, 49-yard touchdown drive set up on a fumble recovery. The scoring play was a 31-yard toss from quarterback Tommy Barton to Left End Thomas Robbins in the right flat. Windham this time split the uprights and at intermission the Bruins led 28-8.

Even Second Half
The two elevens played an even game through the last 24 minutes each getting a touchdown.

Early in the third quarter Baird took a Buffalo punt at its own 37 and mounted a sustained drive that carried to the Herd nine. Red flags nullified an 18-yard scoring run by Stanley in the drive and Buff defenders staved off the threat and held for downs.

Three plays later though Stanley stole a Quarterback Tommy Purvis to Brown pass and ran it back for the tally. With two minutes left in the third period Crow kicked his fourth consecutive point.

Cross Plains' last marker came as a result of a break as Baird lost its only fumble of the night.

Taking possession on the Bear 25, two Brown to Left End Bruce Adams passes fell incomplete. Then with a bit of dippy-doodle, Right Halfback Bobby McMillan circled left end for 13 yards and a first on the Baird 12. Strickland then swept right end for the touchdown. Brown again slashed at right tackle for the two point conversion.

Thereafter the two teams traded short drives as both held on downs. Baird penetrated to the Buff 27, and Cross Plains drove to the Bear 32.

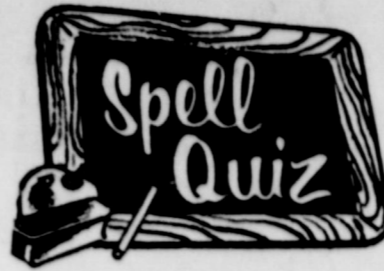

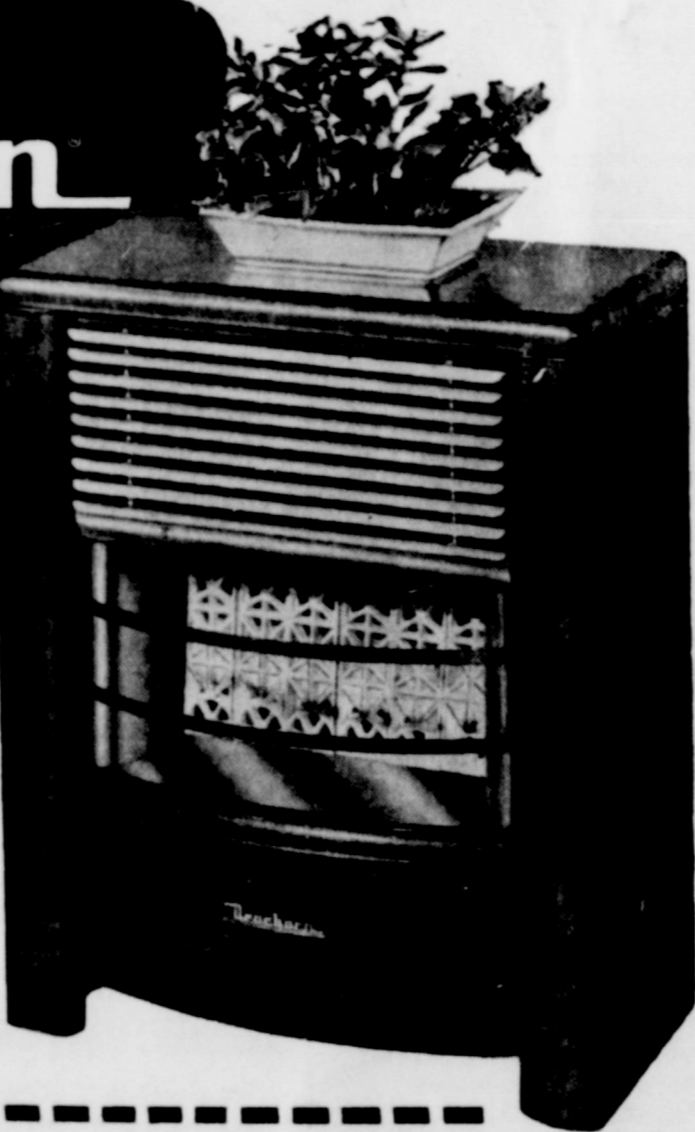
