



Strickland ran for 471 yards and lugged the pigskin on 107 occassions. His 4.4 yards per was also tops in that category. Halfback Bobby McMillan was second with 136 net yards in 55 carrier for an average of 2.47. Fullback Jim Brown was

the only other Buff to top the century mark with 104 yards on 52 trips for an average of two yards per carry.

McMillan was the top pass receiver and the only one to make more than one grab. He caught five aerials for 78 yards. Following with one snare each were: Reggie Stover 39 yards, Mike Turner 16 yards, Tommy Purvis 10, Jack Baum 7, Jerry Strickland 6, Sammy Strickland and Jim Brown -6.

Halfback Strickland was also the leading scorer with 22 points on three touchdowns and two two-point conversions. Purvis was next with 14 points on two TDs and one two-pointer. Brown scored 10 points on a touchdown and two two-point conversions. Jack Baum tallied one touchdown and James Switzer kicked one extra point.


