The number of persons buried in Cross Plains Cemetery exceeds present population of the town. Necessity demands that former residents share the burden of upkeep if it is to be maintained in a dignified condition.

Love and friendship do not end at the grave. This is a time for rededication to a solemn obligation.

Cotton Farmers Vote On Controls Tuesday

Callahan County cotton producers will vote next Tuesday, Dec. 15, to determine if marketing quotas and acreage allotments will be continued in 1965. Polling places will be at the City Hall in Cross Plains, the drug store in Putnam, the Co-op in Clyde and at the school building in Oplin.

J. C. Earp, manager of the Callahan County office of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, explained the meanings of yes and no votes in the referendum as follows: A yes vote by at least two-thirds of the growers voting will mean that price support of from 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to producers who do not exceed their effective cotton allotments.

A no vote will mean that cotton producers can grow all the cotton they so desire at whatever price they can obtain and there will be no domestic allotment program. Price support will be available at 50 percent of parity to growers who plant within their effective farm allotments.

Gas And Sewer Rates Go Higher By Council Action

Immediate increase in gas and sewer rates have been voted by Cross Plains City Council and will be reflected on billings the last of this month.

Rates on all utility services supplied by the municipality came up for study at the Council's last meeting, however, no change was made in water charges.

An excerpt from minutes of

the meeting says: "Water, gas and sewer rates were discussed and on motion made by Roy Cox, the gas rate was revised as follows: \$2 for the first 1,000 cubic feet, 55 cents per thousand and for the next seven thousand, and 45 cents per thousand thereafter. Motion seconded by I. H. Hall, carried by four votes. L. F. Foster voted no."

The former rate provided the same minimum charge of \$2, however, it allowed 2,000 cubic feet instead of 1,000. The old schedule on gas was 50 cents for the next seven thousand and 45 cents thereafter.

The advance in sewer rates will concern only commercial users and business concerns employing four or more persons. City minutes on this new schedule read as follows: "Motion made by Cox that all commercial users of sewer services (cafes, filling stations, laundries, laundromats, locker-plants and businesses employing four or more persons) be charged \$3 per month. Freddy Tatom seconded the motion and all councilmen voted aye."

Sewer rental was formerly \$150 per month everywhere except at the Citizens State Bank, Higginbothams, West Texas Utilities Co., and local churches.

On motion made by Hall and seconded by Foster, the water rate remains unchanged at \$1.50 for the first 1,000 gallons and 60 cents per thousand gallons thereafter.

Other business transacted at the Council's last meeting included a decision not to employ a replacement for Rueben McCowen, who recently resigned from the gas and sewer departments to accept superintendency of the municipal utilities at Cohoma. By secret ballot the vote was three to two not to hire another man at this time.

Approval was given by the Council to provide gas service to trailer homes on North Main Street, with the specification that each of the three potential users avail themselves of the service and make \$10 deposits each.

All members of the council were present at the recent meeting including: Mayor M. E. Roth and Aldermen, Cox, Hall, Foster, Tatom and Darwin Anderson.

Blaze Fatal For Ex-Burkett Lady

Mrs. Vanda Sanderson, 52, member of a well-known Burkett family, burned to death at 7:30 Saturday night in Brownwood, when her home was ravished by fire.

Firemen said evidence indicated that Mrs. Sanderson had been preparing supper when grease ignited, causing the fatal blaze. She apparently was overcome by smoke. Her body was not discovered until firemen extinguished the blaze.

Funeral was held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from a Brownwood chapel with Paul Wallace, Brownwood Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial was in the Burkett Cemetery.

Born May 22, 1918, in Burkett, she had lived in Brownwood 25 years.

Surviving are her mother, Mrs. Mae Beavers of Burkett; two brothers, Merrel Burkett of Burkett and Henry Burkett of San Angelo; two sisters, Mrs. Bernice Sultenfuss of San Angelo and Mrs. Barbara McMillan of Arizona.

No Consolidation Due For Local Mail Routes

A proposal to consolidate routes one and two out of the Cross Plains post office has been abandoned.

Congressman Omar Burleson wired the Review last week end from Washington, D. C. as follows: "Am pleased to inform you that Cross Plains rural routes will not be consolidated and that appropriate action will be taken to fill the existing vacancy."

Since retirement of O. M. Bailey as carrier on rural route 2 it has been served by L. D. Koenig, substitute carrier. Two surveys were made by the Post Office Department and recommendations issued favoring the merging of that route with the one out of the local office supplied by Morris Thomas. Patrons on both routes prepared and sent petitions of protest, pointing out the inconveniences and slower services that would result by the merger. Local business and professional men joined in the fight to retain the route. Congressman Burleson, in championing the cause of Cross Plains people, failed to yield when twice informed that the routes would be consolidated. Ultimately his voice prevailed and there will now be no curtailment of mail service to rural homes supplied through the local office.

\$701.05 Brought In By Yule Seal Sales

Callahan County Tuberculosis Association, an organization, devoted to the prevention and treatment of respiratory diseases, reports receipts from the sale of Christmas seals have brought in \$701.05 to date.

Persons to whom seals were mailed for yuletide use are being urged to make their remittances as soon as possible, for the local organization is planning an aggressive program in its fight against disease during the year ahead.

\$4,800 Pecan Crop Now Being Reaped At Pioneer

Doss Alexander has done it again.

His pecans were adjudged the champion shelling entry at Comanche County's big annual exposition Saturday. Pecans were entered from nine nearby counties, representing the outstanding orchards of West Central Texas.

The local man also captured 12 ribbons, winning five first places, five seconds and two third places.

Despite the fact that pecan growers across the state report yields and grades are lower than normal this year, the Alexander orchard at Pioneer will produce 12,000 pounds of quality nuts. Selling at the rate of 40 cents per pound the crop will bring \$4,800.

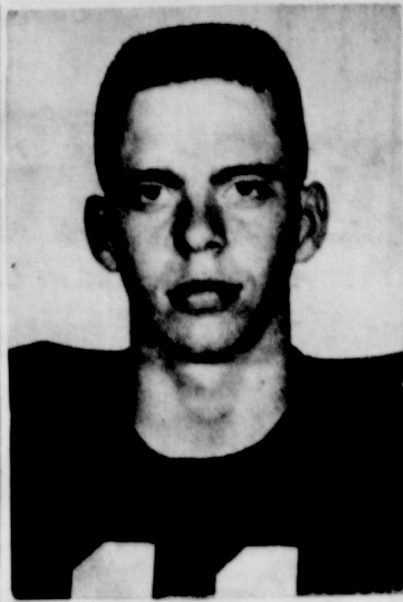

Joe Pierce, 164-pound Right Guard, was the only Cross Plains High School gridders named a member of the District 10-A All-District football first team.

Pierce, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kermit Pierce, was also the only sophomore to be chosen by the conference coaches on either the offensive or defensive squads. Pierce, who switched from the backfield to the guard post early in the season, was honored on the offensive unit.

Jack Baum, senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Baum, and Sammy Strickland, junior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strickland of Burkett, both received honorable mention to the conference elite.
