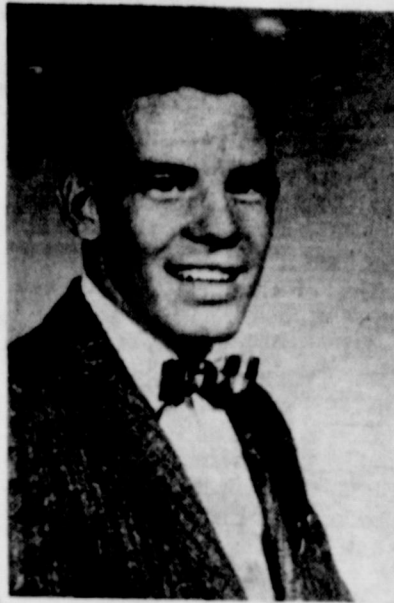
Alvin Hutchins Selected Boy Scoutmaster Here

3 Counties Hunt For Area Of Agreement

Operating on the premise that the best way to settle an argument is to first find areas of agreement, attorneys involved in a boundary line dispute between Callahan, Taylor and Coleman Counties are now attempting to prepare a list of mutually-acknowledged facts.

The decision to approach the controversy from that angle came during a pre-trial hearing before District Judge Truman Roberts in 52nd District Court at Comanche Saturday afternoon.

The list of facts upon which litigants agree, in the suit brought by Coleman County against Callahan and Taylor, is to be tendered the court before trial is set either the latter part of March or early in April.

Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks gave this word Monday after he met with Taylor County Attorney Jim Jeffery and State Highway Commissioner Hal Woodward, who is representing Coleman County.

The purpose of the statement of facts will be to "see how much we can agree on and what is really in controversy," Shanks said.

Coleman County says its line should be recognized because it is the oldest, but Shanks said Jeffery now has discovered that the Taylor line was set up three years prior to the Coleman line.

Callahan County contends the Taylor-Callahan line should be recognized because it is the one currently most in use and is used by the General Land Office, Shanks, said.

During the pre-trial hearing at Comanche last Saturday afternoon, the Taylor and Callahan County officials agreed to file more specific pleadings concerning their boundaries by Feb. 15.

The discrepancy in Coleman's northern boundary line and the southern lines of Callahan and Taylor Counties arose after tax levies of the Clyde Independent School District, which extends to the southern line of this county, were made against property which was also being assessed to a Coleman district.

Mark Adair Resigns As Head Of Water District

Mark Adair has resigned after serving four years as chairman of the board of supervisors for Turkey Creek Water Control District. Named to succeed him was A. L. Breeding.

Adair, who was one of the early proponents of the conservation district, has played a vital role in the vast construction program which has curtailed damaging erosion and restored fertility of thousands of acres.

Accomplishments of the Turkey Creek district have been

often cited as an outstanding example of what can be accomplished in soil conservation by close cooperation of land owners and the Soil Conservation Service.

Adair explained that he was resigning for reasons of health and not because of any lack of interest in the district's continued success.

In addition to Breeding other members of the board of supervisors are: Tommie B. Conlee, Earl Pyle, Damon D. Jones, Mike Cunningham and Chuck Woody.

\$57,594.21 Paid In School Taxes

Monday morning, when penalties and interest began accruing on taxes unpaid to Cross Plains Independent School District, A. J. (Ted) McCuin, assessor and collector, reported that a total of \$52,805.03 had been received on the 1964 levy.

In addition to assessments paid on the 1964 roll, McCuin had collected \$4,789.18 on delinquent accounts for the prior years, making current collections aggregate \$57,594.21.

Yet delinquent on the 1964 roll is a total of \$7,086. McCuin said that he was unable to quickly supply the total of delinquent taxes for years prior to 1964.

Total assessed valuation of the Cross Plains district is \$4,001,098. Of this amount \$1,298,310 is on petroleum properties, \$2,068,958 on real property and \$633,830 on personal property.

130 May Attend Banquet For Band Saturday Night

Candidates Missing For School And City Places

With filing deadlines only four weeks in the offing, no candidates had appeared late Tuesday for either the City Council or School Board. Three vacancies arise on each body in April.

Last date for filing for a place on the ballot is 30 days prior to voting. Since the school election is scheduled April 3, the last day to become a candidate will be March 3. The city election is to be April 6, making the filing deadline March 6.

On the school board the terms of Forrest Walker, Charles Sowell and Hadden Payne are expiring. None of the trio has indicated whether or not he will again be a candidate.

School trustees serve terms of three years.

On the city council the tenures of Freddy Tatom, Darwin Anderson and L. F. Foster are nearing completion. It is not known whether any or all of the three will seek reelection. City councilmen serve two-year terms.

To file for a place on the ballot in either the school or city election, eligible persons are required only to appear before the organization's secretary and sign candidacy blanks. In the case of the school vote such blanks may be filed with Dr. Carl J. Sohns. For a city post Mrs. Ava Childers receives the papers.

Open House Sunday Set To Show Eula School's New Improvements

Eula schools will hold open house from two until five Sunday afternoon to permit patrons and friends to view a recently-completed \$46,732 improvement to facilities.

Billy Mac Coppinger, superintendent at Eula, said the new cafeteria and library building will be open for inspection of the public. "We're hoping all our friends will attend," he said.

The cafeteria is said to be one of the most modern school lunchroom facilities in this section of the state. It seats 150 without crowding, has stainless steel kitchen furniture and fixtures and most modern appliances.

The Eula library incorporates hundreds of new volumes and affords ultra-modern comforts, intended to enhance frequent use of students and keen appreciation of works of literature.

T B Testing For Students Will Start Here Monday

Patch-testing for tuberculosis among Callahan County school children will begin in Cross Plains Monday morning. Mrs. J. L. Ault of Baird, county school nurse, will be in charge of the program and work in connection with Callahan County TB Association.

Mrs. Mary Martin, secretary of the county TB Association, reported Tuesday morning that the recent Christmas Seals campaign brought in \$1,193.80. These funds will be used for

the prevention, detection and treatment of tuberculosis.

The Callahan County Association has been one of the state's most outstanding in carrying on the fight against dreaded tuberculosis for more than 20 years.

"We are grateful for the cooperation of our people in every undertaking through the years," Mrs. Martin said, "and to show our gratitude there will be no relaxing of vigilance as we strive to eliminate tuberculosis as a menace to public health."

JANUARY WETTEST HERE SINCE 1961

January moisture in Cross Plains totaled two and one-half inches.

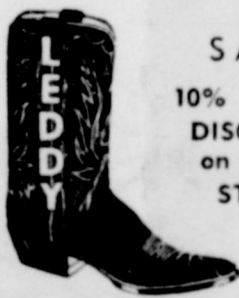
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Baptists Will Launch Sunday School Drive

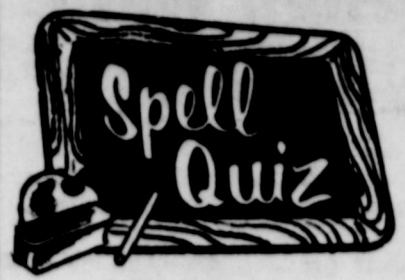
