

RATTLESNAKES PLAGUE OIL LEASES NEAR HERE Snakes seem uncommonly plentiful in the Cross Plains area this Spring, as-

pecially on oil leases. Largest poisonous reptile reported to this newspaper this year was slain last Saturday on the Amerada Lease midway between Cross Plains and Burkett.

Wilburn Weiss and a crew of oil workers saw the rattlesnake crossing a road to a warehouse on the lease. Weiss said that the rattler crawled into a bush at the side of the road and the men killed it with rocks.

It measured 5 feet in length and weighed five pounds. The slayers estimated the reptile to be six or seven inches in circumference. It had 12 rattles and some had been broken off.

Hubert Belew, field superintendent of Harding Brothers Lease in the Cross Cut locality, recently killed seven rattlesnakes in a week there.
