Wheat Sales Hit \$28,165

Two Cross Plains grain buying concerns had paid \$28,165.80 for new crop wheat and oats to Tuesday at noon. Consensus was that less than 15 per cent of current small grain crops had been marketed.

Local buyers are Farm and Ranch Supply, headed by Bill Lawrence, and Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. headed by A. G. Black.

Persistent rains during the harvesting season have slowed combines and resulted in some damage. Early crops, particu-

larly oats, are said to have suffered most.

Moisture content of most crops marketed thus far has been above normal, buyers report, but grades have been surprisingly high. Sales of wheat are reported averaging around \$1.30 a bushel, possibly one cent either way. Exact figures were not immediately obtainable.

Unloading facilities were being completed by Lawrence's concern yesterday on South Main Street at property recently acquired from C. H. Dawson.

Black announced that the Co-Op had arranged to become purchasers of guar, a summer legume, to which several hundred acres of the Cross Plains area have been planted. The crop is harvested in mid-summer, about like milo, however, it customarily produces about twice as many dollars per acre, authorities declare.

August 24 Deadline To End Brucellosis Tests

Callahan County has until Aug. 24 to complete re-testing cattle herds for brucellosis. In the 1962 tests when Callahan County was certified, there were 42 suspect herds and 68 reactor herds in the county. All of these herds have been re-tested except eight. All were free except one herd.

In order for the county to be recertified, 189 other herds in addition were required. Approximately 60 herds have been re-tested. About 129 additional herds must be tested if the county is to retain its certification.

If these herds are not tested by the recertification date of Aug. 24, 1965, the county will lose its certification, reports County Agent Pat C. Garner. This loss will seriously restrict movement of cattle out of the

county. Health certificates will be required before cattle can be shipped to certified areas. All adjoining counties are certified.

"Should we not be recertified by Aug. 24 and lose our certification, it will be necessary to start with petitions as in 1962, and all herds will then have to be tested," Garner declared.

"If you are working your cattle, contact either Jim Ellis of Animal Disease Eradication, or the County Agent, and make arrangements to have your cattle tested," Garner continued.

All people with milk cows are urged to have these cows tested because brucellosis is one disease that is transmissible from the infected animal to man. It can be most prolonged and serious.

Local Girl 1 Of 3 Picked On Farm Seminar Panel

Three girls will represent Callahan County and this county's Farm Bureau at the 1965 High School Student Citizenship Seminar sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau later this year.

The feminine trio was selected by an out-of-county judge at a contest held Tuesday of last week in the school cafeteria at Eula.

Cross Plains gained a place on the three-girl panel in the person of Miss Peggy Erwin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wordis Erwin.

Susan Rock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Rock, of Eula and Jolene Rowe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Rowe, of Baird are the other two panel members. Bobby Payne of Cross Plains and Don Price of

Baird also participated in the contest.

Each of the five students gave a five minute talk to the open meeting of the local bureau on American Heritage. In order to be eligible to vie for places on the panel, each student had to be either in the 11th or 12th grades, be in the upper 30 per cent of his class and have good character and leadership abilities.

Judge for the selection was J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher at Bronte High School. Judge selection was done by Ed Cumbie of Bronte, district field representative for the Farm Bureau. Identity of the judge was not known to either the contestants or local bureau members until shortly before the session last week.

The seminar, according to Hadden Payne, Callahan Farm Bureau president, "will emphasize the story of better citizenship, and will not contradict, but rather compliment high school courses in areas of economic, moral and social aspects of the American society."

The annual FB event will be held on the campus of Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville Aug. 10-14. All expenses will be paid by the county FB unit.

An added highlight of the meeting Tuesday was David Black, last year's Callahan County representative to the FB seminar, giving his impression of the short course held in 1964.

W. E. 'Pop' Lusk Buried On Sunday

William Emory (Pop) Lusk, 74, died at 4 p.m. Friday in the Graham Hospital at Cisco after an illness of five days.

He was born June 27, 1890, at Sidney in Comanche County. He married Viola Newman May 17, 1914, at Sweetwater. Both were school teachers. At the time she was teaching at Dora, south of Sweetwater, and he was teaching at Walnut in Comanche County.

They moved to Sabanno, eight miles east of Cross Plains, in 1916, and had made their home there since.

Mr. Lusk retired from teaching in 1951 after 39 years in the classroom, the last 20 of which were in the Cross Plains system. He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Cross Plains and was active in layman affairs.

Survivors are his wife; two sons, Beryl of Cross Plains and Basil of 1266 Portland in Abilene; two brothers, Herbert of Dallas and Clifton of Sidney; two sisters, Miss Eula Lusk of Dallas and Mrs. Neva Cooper of Mojave, Calif.; nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. One son preceded him in death.

Funeral was held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Methodist Church here with the Rev. Jimmie Mobley, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Joe McAfee, former pastor.

Burial was in Pendergrass Cemetery in Sidney, under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. Masons served as pallbearers and were in charge of graveside rites.

Pallbearers were Eddy Petty, Ben Atwood, Billy Mac Copping, E. K. Copping, Travis Foster, Norman Coffey, Parker Baum and Dave Smith.

Coach Accepts Post After Refusing Once

Carter V. Williams of Paint Rock who formerly asked not to be considered for the job of assistant football coach here, has since accepted the post.

His acceptance has filled the local faculty to its 23 teacher strength.

Williams was head coach at Paint Rock, a Class B school which played six-man football, but will come here as assistant grid mentor and boys basketball coach in high school. In addition to his athletic duties, he will teach history and commercial subjects in high school.

Girls basketball team will be coached by Jack Gray, head coach here who comes from Eden where he was an assistant.

Williams, 28, is married and the father of three pre-school age children. He took a bachelor degree in business administration from Texas A&M University in 1963. As a high school grader at Texarkana, he was named an all-state football player his senior year, and he played four years of semi-pro basketball while in college. He and his family are expected here about the middle of July.

Trial Set Friday In County Lines Fuss

Friday, Callahan County will learn if its limits will continue to encompass as much land as when it was organized in 1877 or whether all detail maps of the State of Texas will be obsolete.

The decision will be made by Judge Truman Roberts in 52nd District Court in Comanche following pleadings by attorneys of defending Callahan and Tay-

lor counties and complaining Coleman County. James Paul Shanks, Callahan County Attorney, and Jim Jeffery, Taylor County Attorney, will present the defense, and Hal Woodward, private Coleman attorney and member of the Texas Highway Commission, will represent the plaintiff.

In dispute is a strip of land along the southern lines of Cal-

lahan and Taylor Counties and the northern limits of Coleman. The "no man's land" varies in width from 850 feet to less than 400 feet along 20.5 miles of Callahan-Coleman border and about four and one-half miles along the mutual dividing line of Coleman and Taylor.

According to Shanks, Callahan would lose less than \$100 in taxation should the case be won by Coleman, however, the question of jurisdiction and possible complications at a later date in abstracts of property owners in the affected area make it necessary to settle the matter.

The boundary discrepancy was discovered when Clyde Independent School District, which extends to the southern boundary of this county, levied taxes against property which was also being assessed by a Coleman district.

Coleman County contends that its line should be recognized because it out-dates the Callahan survey. On the other hand Callahan's line is the one most used and is used by the Texas General Land Office. Taylor County points out that its survey was made three years prior to Coleman's.

Several months ago the three attorneys met in Coleman and agreed on a statement of facts which was filed with Judge Roberts. Its purpose was to clearly define what was at question in the case.

120 Workers Due Here Friday To Pick 'Cukes'

Grading shed for cucumbers produced in this area will open Friday, according to Ted Souder and Wayne Westerman, sponsors of the local pilot project.

Souder said yesterday, "We will work three hands in grading and loading the cucumbers at first, although we may have to expand as production nears its peak."

A grading machine was to have been installed in the Dawson building at the corner of Main Street and Highway 36 here this week. It is furnished by the Dalton Pickle Co. of Fort Worth, contractors of the area's new commercial cash crop.

Picking Season Extended
Most growers have already reported some cukes on the vines, but picking will not begin until Friday. Cold and dry weather at the time set for planting and abnormally heavy rainfall since cut acreage planted to an estimated 250 acres.

Cold and wet conditions, however, have slowed growth of the vines and a horticulturist, Ira Campsey, who was here first of the week inspecting lo-

cal crops, said that the picking season should be extended about three weeks. Normal production period is about seven weeks, but Campsey predicted that it will take 10 weeks for production to end here.

Pickers To Arrive
Labor to harvest the cucumbers is slated to arrive here Friday to begin picking Souder reported. Raymond Daize, crew chief, of Coleman has contracted to have 120 workers here that morning. Horace L. King has been working approximately 50 laborers the past several days hoeing his large irrigated plot of cucumbers.

Campsey estimated that the heavy rainfall here has resulted in about 10 per cent water damage to the vines, but opined an average yield of 20,000 pounds per acre is still possible. A test picking was conducted on the King farm in the Sabanno community, and according to the horticulturist his crop tested at 2,870 pounds per acre per picking.

Souder also stated that bees needed for pollenization of blooms were slated to arrive here last of the week from East Texas.

Lakewood Center Nears End Of Planning Stage

R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains, president of the Board of Directors of the Lakewood Recreation Center, said yesterday that the project is entering its final stages.

He added, "We expect to get the \$112,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration shortly after July 1, and construction should begin shortly thereafter." He continued, "The engineers told me yesterday things were going well and plans were in the final stages."

Some concern was voiced here recently over lack of a permit legalizing irrigation from the lake on the 69-acre tract. Needham said, however, that the engineers had applied for the permit and approval was thought forthcoming shortly.

Texas State Board of Water Engineers requires a permit to irrigate grass and other vegetation with water from any reservoir, private or public, with a capacity in excess of 200 acre-feet. The center plans to water

golf greens and fairways after the nine-hole course is rebuilt.

Virtually all that remains before the project becomes a reality is the low-interest loan being released by the FHA and approval of final plans by the board of directors. The loan has already received approval by county, state and national offices.

Brownwood Lake Gets \$10,000,000 Project

Of interest to Cross Plains area residents, many of whom own cabins on Brownwood Lake, was the announcement Monday by Texas Water Commission of federal approval for \$10 million worth of work at the popular recreation spot.

Proposals call for \$3 million to be spent in building a second dam. It is to be 19 feet higher and located 800 feet

downstream from the existing dam. Spillway at the lake will remain at the same level, however, and no new property will be flooded.

The projects, recommended by the Army engineers, also included a \$7 million flood control reservoir on Pecan Bayou and channel improvements on the bayou, Adams Branch, Tom Williams Branch and Willis Creek.

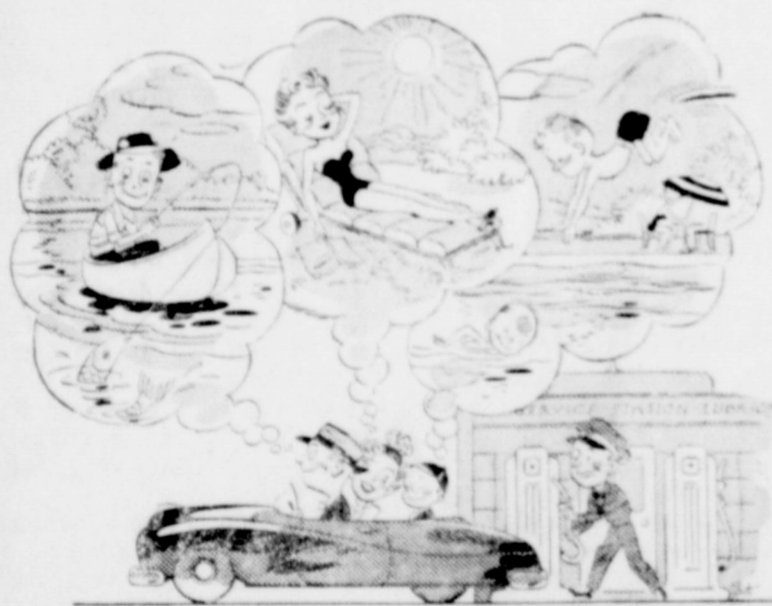
See Post Office At World Fair - Bryan

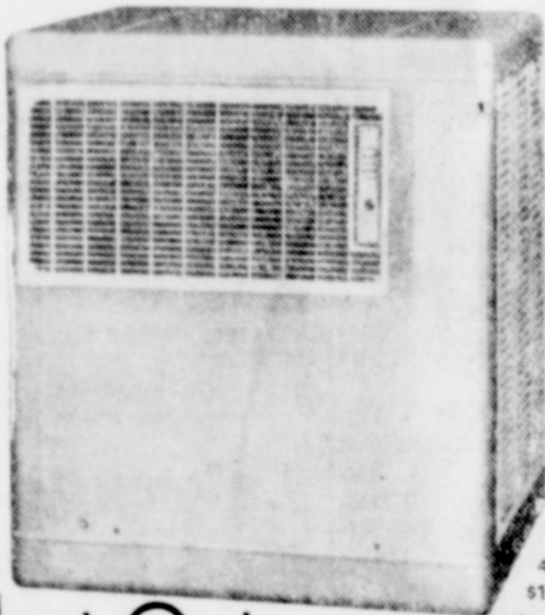

Pecan Bayou Control Gets State Approval

Texas Water Commission gave formal approval last week to a U. S. Army Corps of Engineers proposed flood control project for the Pecan Bayou in Callahan, Coleman and Brown Counties.

The commission suggested some changes in the report on the Bayou watershed. It stated that a combination flood control and water supply dam to be built on the Jim Ned Creek would now be impossible. The city of Coleman had already begun construction of a small water supply reservoir on the creek, and therefore the proposed larger-sized federal dam could not be constructed. The Coleman project was further amended to raise the dam three feet in order to impound the specified 40,000 acre-feet of water.

A resolution, adopted by the commission, will go to Congress as the official state comment on the project. It included and urged that Congress act as soon as possible to authorize and finance the "urgently needed project ... to protect existing and future facilities in this important and rapidly developing

area." The commission further suggested that a proposed flood control and water supply reservoir proposed for Pecan Bayou above Brownwood Lake be limited to a flood control structure only. After further study by the commission the Pecan Bayou dam was considered a part of the proposed channel improvement and reconstruction of the Lake Brownwood dam. Commissioners gave a strong approval to the channel improvement and dam rebuilding project.

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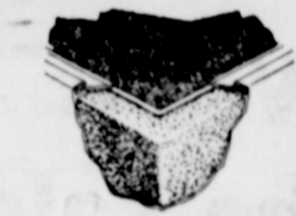

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

The shower dumped .86 of an inch of rain on Cross Plains Friday, and Tuesday S. F. Bond, official weather observer here for the U. S. Weather

Bureau, recorded 42 of an inch. The 1.28 inches thus far in June boosted the year's total to 14.67, above normal for this time of year.

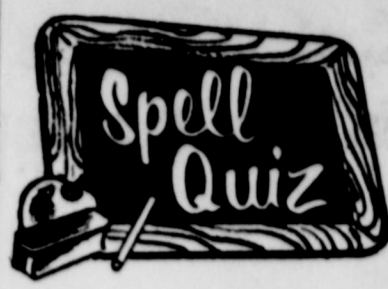
