Small Manufacturing Plant To Locate Here

Cross Plains may become the site for two small industries within the next 90 days. It was estimated that the two manufacturing concerns would employ from three to five persons.

E. G. Walker of Odessa, owner of a firm which builds playground equipment, said here recently that his application for a small business loan was currently being processed, and results should be known within 90 days. An option to purchase has been transacted for the Howard McGowen building on East Eighth Street here, proposed location of the industry. The building formerly housed McGowen Motors.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce industrial committee, which has been working closely with Walker, learned Tuesday that another small manufacturing firm, one which

builds racks for garbage cans, may also be located in the same building. Owner of the second small industry will probably serve as salesman for both concerns, according to reports received here.

According to Walker, an order for 5,000 of the garbage racks was recently taken from a Houston firm, and a Kansas City concern ordered 2,500.

Walker explained that he chose Cross Plains for site of the business because of his preference of a well-located small town, and because of the enthusiastic cooperation given him by local businessmen.

Fred V. Tunnell, local bank president, said Tuesday afternoon, "Prospect of the two industries locating here appear good, however, no binding decision will be made until results of the small business loan are known."

Rabid House Cat Bites 2 At John Purvis Home

Two persons are undergoing inoculations for the prevention of hydrophobia after being bitten by a rabid house cat at the John Purvis place north of Cottonwood.

The animal, a pet of the Purvis children, attacked Richard Purvis, Zephyr school superintendent, who was visiting in the home. He reached down to pet the cat and as he did so the animal bit viciously and had to be knocked away.

Realizing the pet had acted strangely, John Purvis locked it up for the night. The following morning the cat was dead. It's head was rushed to Austin and reports reaching here Friday night said that the animal had been rabid.

Questioning of the Purvis children revealed that Kathy, 11, had also been bitten by the

pet but less severely. Both she and the Zephyr school executive, her uncle, are undergoing necessary inoculations to prevent dreaded hydrophobia.

Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox recently received instructions for the packing of animal heads to be shipped to the State Health Department for examination of rabies. He advises that the head should be securely sealed in a can, using generous amounts of tape, and that the first can should be placed within another, also taped air-tight. The package should be labeled and addressed to State Health Department, Division of Laboratories, 1100 West 49th Street, Austin, Texas.

Cox cautions that the return address should be included, whereby health authorities will know whom to contact regarding their findings.

Atwell Men Have Tall Sudan Crop

Roy and Roy Neil Tatam at Atwell have a 15-acre field of Sudan Grass which is producing stalks up to 12 feet tall. This phenomenal growth has been attained despite the fact that 23 cows and 19 calves are being summered there.

The Sudan, a variety of Sweet Sue, was planted the first week in May and fertilized with 100 pounds to the acre. The Tatams plan to graze the field two or three weeks more and then cut the remaining stand and let the stalks sucker for another crop in the fall.

"We should have cut the crop earlier," said Roy Tatam Monday, "but it just seemed to get away from us."

Summer Improvement Underway At Schools

Cross Plains school system has begun the first of a two-part building improvement program this summer.

Superintendent Paul L. Whitton said yesterday that painting of all interior walls of the high school and elementary school buildings started Tuesday afternoon. Work will be done by the two custodians of the local system, J. B. (Bart) Thomas and Sam Lane. Whitton estimated the project would require about a month to complete. He stated, "They, Thomas and Lane, will fit the painting in with other regular maintenance duties."

Board of trustees was to have met last night, Wednesday, to discuss letting of a contract for installation of new windows throughout the two classroom buildings. The windows are to be of metal frame construction, and according to Whitton, "Will add much to the appearance of our school."

Whitton said that bids had not yet been opened and that he hesitated to estimate cost of the improvement.

Repair of some windows was suggested recently by the state accreditation committee. "Instead of just repairing some of the units," he said, "It was thought more economical in the long run to replace all of them."

WOMEN FAVOR RIGID OBEDIENCE TO LAWS

The first all-feminine jury in history of Callahan County Court sentenced a member of their sex — the mother of seven — to 60 days in jail and a \$200 fine for first-offense driving while intoxicated.

Schoolboys Sentenced

(An Editorial)

The responsibility of public schools is to educate for well-rounded citizenship. That responsibility should not preclude training in moral precepts and allegiance to Christianity. To do so is to denounce the heritage from heroic patriots, who founded for us the most ideal government and the best way-of-life mankind ever enjoyed.

There are, nevertheless, countless obstacles being thrown before public schools, all of which seem to impede dedicated teachers, administrators and trustees from offering a balanced instructional program. At first it was the Supreme Court of the United States outlawing prayer in the classroom, and now a ruling of the Texas Interscholastic League has struck another blow.

The TIL, which is the high tribunal for inter-mural athletics in this state, has penalized Bonham High School for an act which George Washington, Thomas Jefferson or Abraham Lincoln would have warmly applauded.

Bonham's football team won't be allowed to compete for district honors this year and will be held under the stigma of probation for two years after that. It all came about because players on last Fall's district championship team accepted a book, entitled "Play Ball," from a minister in their home town. The book is a collection of testimonies of outstanding athletes, explaining what Jesus Christ has meant to each of them personally. Its cost of \$2.95 per copy boosted to \$17.95 the amount of gifts received by each boy on the Bonham squad. They had previously been awarded \$15 letter jackets and TIL rules specify that no youth may receive gifts totaling more than \$15 within a given year.

Undeniably, the TIL has been a potent force in preventing professionalism among schoolboy athletics and most of its services have been good and useful. The latest ruling, though, is not in keeping with the main objective of public schools and is certainly not within the spirit of an acceptable code intended only to promote fair play among competing Texas schools. If it is, some drastic changes should be made rapidly. Unless, however, there is strong, vigorous protest from parents and patrons nothing will be done. Corrective action cannot be left entirely within the hands of school executives. Most of them were opposed to sanctions against Bonham in the beginning and obviously their voice is too faint and influence too weak to bear sufficient weight with TIL heads in Austin.

County Lines Trial Goes To Hamilton

One of the rarest trials for this section of Texas in years will come for hearing in 52nd District Court at Hamilton Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

Callahan and Taylor Counties are being sued by Coleman County, which claims encroachment on its northern boundary. The case was originally set to be heard in Comanche but due to the fact that District Judge Truman Roberts will be in Comanche on the designated date the litigation site was shifted.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks, who will represent Callahan County, said Tuesday afternoon that he did not expect Judge Roberts to reach a decision Friday.

Delayed Verdict

"In all probability he will take the matter under advisement and hand down a ruling two or three weeks later," he said.

In dispute is a strip of land along the southern lines of Callahan and Taylor Counties and the northern limits of Coleman. The "no man's land" varies in width from 850 feet to less than 400 feet along 20.5 miles of Callahan-Coleman border and about four and one-half miles along the mutual dividing line of Coleman and Taylor.

Land Owners Included

Among persons known locally

who own land involved in the litigation are: the Clarence B. Edington heirs, Billy Mac Copinger, Oral B. Joy, Roy Arrowood, Lester Barr, Carlos McDermott and possibly many others, whose names were not revealed.

According to Shanks, Callahan would lose less than \$100 in taxation should the case be won by Coleman, however, the question of jurisdiction and possible complications at a later date in abstracts of property owners in the affected area make it necessary to settle the matter.

Clyde Found Overlap

Boundary discrepancy was discovered when Clyde Independent School District, which extends to the southern boundary of this county, levied taxes against property which was also being assessed by a Coleman district.

Coleman County contends that its line should be recog-

nized because it out-dates the Callahan survey. On the other hand Callahan's line is the one most used and is used by the Texas General Land Office. Taylor County points out that its survey was made three years prior to Coleman's.

Local Officials Going

Coleman County will be represented in the hearing by State Highway Commissioner Hal Woodward, who practices law in Coleman. Taylor County will be represented by its county attorney Jim Jeffery.

Accompanying Shanks to Hamilton for the trial will be these officials from Callahan County: County Judge Byron Richardson, Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell, County Clerk Mrs. Beatrice Deal or a deputy from her office, School Superintendent Ferrell Newton of Clyde and possibly others.

The Cross Plains Review will have a staff writer at the hearing.

Have you ever wondered what the other towns in the United States named Cross Plains are like? Recently the Review editor contacted William F. Dehman of Cross Plains, Wisconsin, and received the following information letter in reply:

As you state there are Cross Plains post offices in Texas, Indiana, Tennessee and Wisconsin. There are also other villages which bear the name Cross Plains. From data I have been able to gather, the Cross Plains in Indiana in the oldest village to use that name. A post office was there in 1850.

Another post office was in Cross Plains, Alabama, many years ago. It was in Denton County, but I believe during the Civil War the name of the County was changed to Calhoun in honor of the celebrated statesman from the south, John C. Calhoun. In the 1880's there was a Cross Plains, Arkansas.

There was a small settlement in Sangmon County, Illinois, in the early days named Cross Plains. It has long ceased to exist or the name has been changed. There is a small village in South Dakota by the name of Cross Plains today. If you address a letter to Parkinson, S. D., I think it will be delivered to this village. There are also one or two other places named Cross Plains, all too small to have post offices."

Explanation Given Of 27 Proposed Amendments

Qualified voters in Cross Plains and Callahan County will go to the polls three times in approximately the next year and a half to approve or veto 27 amendments to the Texas Constitution.

The 11 propositions sought this fall will cost Texas taxpayers about \$1 million. Sixteen more proposed amendments will be put before the public on Nov. 8, 1966.

A short explanation of each amendment follows:

The Texas legislature is asking the people to let it do 27 things it wants to do, but which are impossible without changes in the constitution.

Just one issue will be up for a vote Sept. 7, whether the Texas Senate should be increased from 31 to 39 members to make court-ordered redistricting less painful.

10 More

Nov. 2 voters will go back to the polls again to have their say on 10 amendments. The Nov. 2 lineup will be on these proposals:

—Allowing Hermann Hospital in Houston an exemption from ad valorem taxes because it does \$1.5 million worth of charity work a year.

—Increasing from two to four years the terms of office of the governor, lieutenant governor, land commissioner, agriculture commissioner, state treasurer, state comptroller, and attorney general, starting with terms beginning in 1967.

—Increasing the statewide ad valorem tax for providing college buildings from 5 to 10 cents per \$100 of value, and adding San Angelo State, Pan American, Arlington State Colleges and the University of Houston and Midwestern University to the list of 12 state colleges which share in the proceeds of the tax.

—Broadening the fields in which the school teacher retirement fund may be invested.

—Increasing the terms of members of the Texas House of Representatives from two to four years, beginning with the terms starting in 1967.

—Increasing from \$200 million to \$400 million the bonds which can be issued for the Veterans land program.

Higher Salaries

—Allowing the legislature to set the salaries of the lieutenant governor and speaker of the House of Representatives. They are now paid \$4,800 a year, the same as members of the Legislature. This proposal will also increase expense allowances of members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$20 a day during the 140 days of each odd numbered year they are in session.

—Setting up an \$85 million self-retiring bond issue to be used to make loans to needy students so they can attend col-

lege, with their payments and interest paying the principal and interest on the bonds.

—Setting up mandatory retirement of judges at age 75, and allowing the Legislature to set it as low as 70; also providing machinery for removal of judges when they become unable to carry on their duties.

—Authorized expansion of the welfare medical care programs in order to qualify for federal aid for medical care for the needy aged, blind, children and disabled.

16 Next Year

When voters have made their decisions for or against those proposals, they can begin to think about how to vote on 16 propositions, Nov. 8, 1966:

—To allow cities or counties to join in setting up regional airport authorities.

—To allow the Legislature to set a statewide retirement disability and death benefit system for officials and employees of all local units of government, but into which the state itself will not put any money.

—To expand from \$200 million to \$400 million the state loan fund for water development loans to cities and voter agencies.

—To enlarge the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals from three to five members.

—To allow the state to accept private grants and federal matching money to be used in rehabilitating the physically and mentally handicapped.

—To remove Arlington State College from the list of those sharing income from the University Permanent Fund as a branch of Texas A&M University, now that Arlington is a branch of the University of Texas and, if the voters said "yes" on Nov. 2, 1965, is sharing from the statewide ad valorem tax for college buildings.

—To set the date for legislators' terms to begin at the

second Tuesday after the first Monday in odd-numbered years. (At present, senators' terms start on that date, but representatives' terms start in November as soon as general election returns are canvassed).

—To repeal the poll tax as a requirement for voting and to set up a voter registration system.

—To allow directors of conservation and reclamation districts to serve six-year terms instead of two-year terms.

—To allow persons who have moved into Texas too late to register, to vote for president and vice-president on the theory that they are U. S. citizens even if they have not yet established Texas citizenship for voting purposes.

—To allow the Legislature

to set up a system of payments to widows and children of firemen and law enforcement officials killed in the line of duty.

—To allow the Legislature to set up a method for dissolving hospital districts when they are now longer needed or wanted.

—To provide that annexations by school districts shall not invalidate previously-voted taxes.

—To allow Harris County local units of government to consolidate some of their functions.

—To set up a plan for continuing to tax agricultural land near cities at the agricultural value, and not at subdivision values, as long as it is used for agriculture.

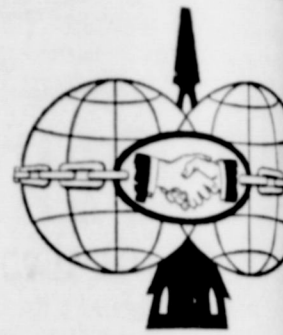

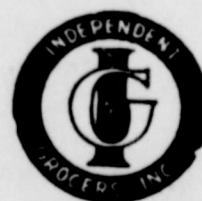
