



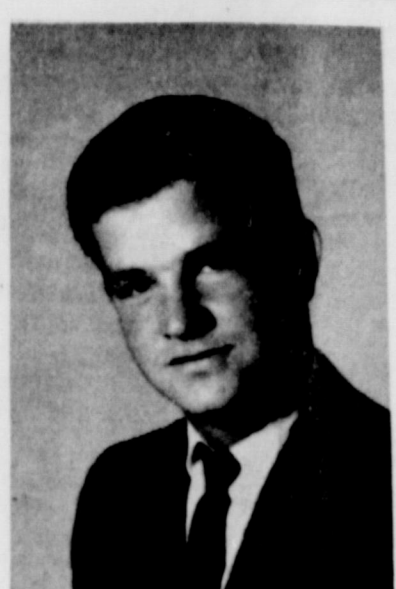

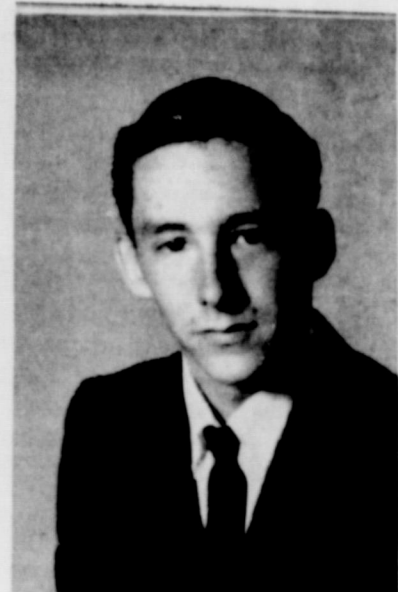

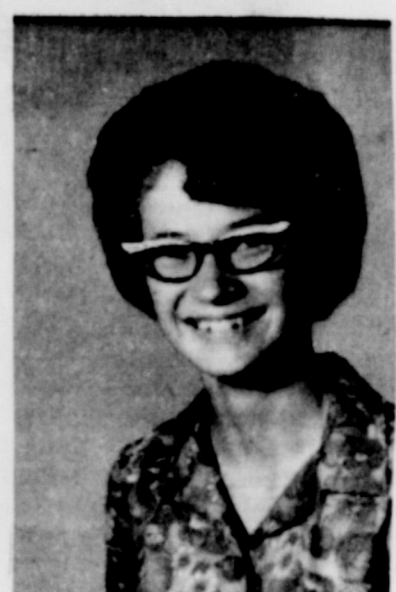

The commencement address will be made by Dr. Joe B. Rushing, president of Tarrant County Junior College. He is a

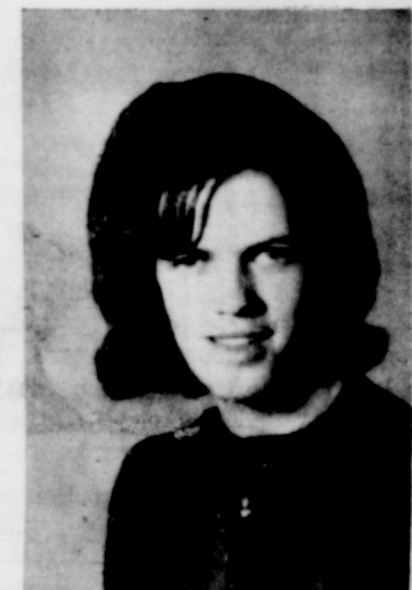

## City Councils Veto Kizer Phone Rental Rate Hike

City councils in both Cross Plains and Rising Star voted in marathon sessions Tuesday night to reject a rate increase on telephone rentals which had been requested by Kizer Telephone Co., Inc. late last year.

Cross Plains City Council vetoed the asked increase by a 5-0 unanimous vote with all council members voting. Rising Star split 3-2, but also turned down the telephone company's request.

The resolution adopted by Cross Plains City Council read, "The City Council of Cross Plains votes to refuse the proposed rate increase as asked by Kizer Telephone Company."

Mayors of both cities were to have notified officials of the Kizer concern immediately after decisions had been reached by both councils Tuesday. Rising Star Mayor W. G. Reed conferred with Doyle Burchfield, Cross Plains Mayor, after session at both cities had adjourned. According to Burchfield a preliminary report on the results would be telephoned to Kizer officers Tuesday night, and a formal notification of the refusal would be mailed Wednesday.

Councilmen here discussed various aspects of the proposed increase for approximately two and one-half hours Tuesday night before a decision was reached.

Mayor Burchfield called for a decision and motion on the question. Councilman J. P. McCord made the motion that City Council of Cross Plains vote to refuse the proposed rate increase as asked by Kizer Telephone Company. The motion was seconded by T. T. Nichols, and the motion carried five for approval and none against.

Shortly after the initial request by the telephone company, councils of both townships agreed to refuse the rate hike in a joint session held in Cross Plains on Dec. 10, 1965. The statement issued at that time read in part, "to go on record as rejecting the Kizer Telephone increased rates as presented at this time."

However, early in 1966 an agreement was reached between the councils of Cross Plains and

Rising Star that a certified public accountant be hired to make a thorough audit of books of Kizer's firm. R. B. Sloan of Abilene was hired to make the check, and further action was delayed until the report was made available to both councils, about two weeks ago.

In another joint meeting here Monday night, Kizer officials heard Sloan give his report. Kizer offered rebuttal by a company employed CPA, George W. Culler of Dallas.

The local telephone company based its request on increasing costs of operation and material. In a release dated Dec. 7, 1965, the following figures were revealed "Earnings of the telephone company were 2.8 per cent in 1964, 2.4 per cent in 1965, and 0.7 per cent for the first part of 1965. Rates requested would give the company 4.4 per cent on its investment in telephone plant and equipment."

Sloan's report stated that from each dollar received by the company 1.12 cents was profit. New rates requested by Kizer were as follows: business, one-party \$12.50, two-party \$10.50, extensions \$2.00, residence, one party \$6.50, two-party \$5.80, four-party \$4.80, extensions \$1.50; rural business multi-party \$8.30, residence \$5.80.

According to records in Cross Plains City Hall the last rate increase granted to Kizer Telephone Company was in 1958, and Cross Plains voted approval on Aug. 11, 1958.

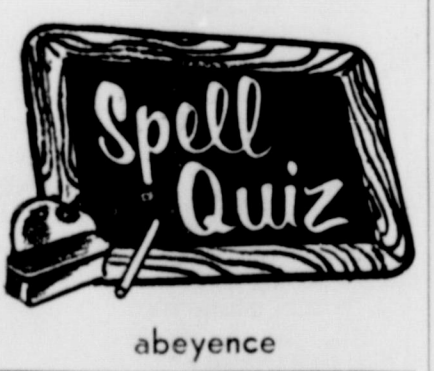
