## Wheat Sells \$1.65 Bushel

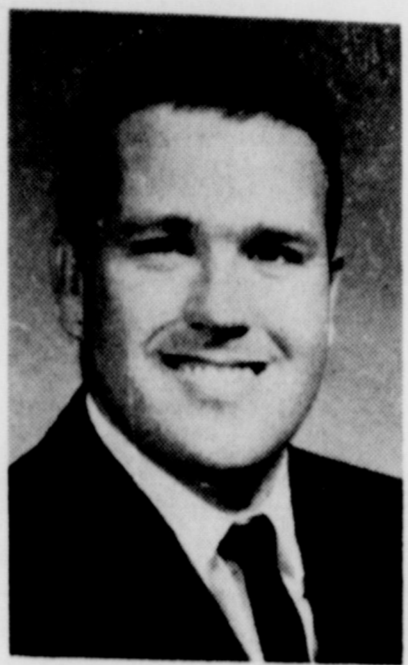
Testing began in the area over the two local buyers Monday. The wheat opened at \$1.65 and buyers about possible in the market. Buyers posted at both morning. Buyers Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company and the Farm & Ranch Supply.

Bill Lawrence, owner of the Farm & Ranch Supply, reported his first load was bought from Jimmy Cauthen, who lives between Cottonwood and Admiral. Cauthen had wheat which tested 62 with 14 per cent moisture. It brought \$1.65 per bushel and the grower received a \$25 bonus for bringing the first load bought by Lawrence.

Glenn Winfrey, partner and manager of Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company, said his first load was bought from Glen Payne. It tested 62 with 14 per cent moisture and brought \$1.65.

Before Payne's load was off the scales B. W. Adams of Burkett pulled up behind him with Winfrey's second load. It tested the same and also brought \$1.65.

Charlie Howard Edington was the next seller at Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company. His wheat, too, was number one and commanded top price. Approximately 1,400 bushels of wheat had been sold in Cross Plains from the new crop Tuesday at noon. Reports are that yields are better than had been expected and that this year's crop will likely be above normal, despite dry weather during early Spring.

## County May Poll 2,000 In Run-Off Vote Saturday

Despite a short ballot, with only two races to be decided, 2,000 Callahan Countians are expected to vote in the Democratic Run-Off Primary Saturday.

Keen interest which has developed in the campaign being waged for state representative from the 63rd Legislative Dis-

trict is expected to send voters to the polls to choose between John Musselman, Jr. of Albany and Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge.

Only other contest due for settlement Saturday is that in which Crawford C. Martin of Hill County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County are pitted for the Attorney Generalship.

Twelve Callahan County voting boxes will be open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. It is expected that results from all the polling places will be announced within 15 minutes after closing time.

The same presiding officials will hold Saturday's election as worked the first primary May 7. Polls will function at Cross

Plains, Baird, Clyde, Putnam, Eula, Cottonwood, Denton Valley, Oplin, Atwell, Admiral, Rowden and Dudley.

Should 2,000 Callahan Countians turn out to vote Saturday the number would be approximately 80 per cent of the ballots counted in the first primary. Election officials reported that 2,522 voted at that time.

## Local Man Tells Of New Texas Cavern

**Editor's Note:** The following interesting and descriptive article, written by B. K. Eubank, local geologist and petroleum engineer, relates hitherto unknown data concerning Texas caves.

Georgetown Cave, the second major cave discovered in this decade, is located 24 miles north of Austin. It is estimated to be 100,000 years old. Bones of mammoths, pre-historic camels and horses found therein are said to be from 10,000 to 20,000 years old and are similar to bones found on Pecan Bayou in Callahan County.

It is expected that a 3,600 foot tour into Georgetown Cave will

be opened this summer. The depth will be reached by a cable car operating 300 feet from the surface.

All caves of this character exist within an eight county Central Texas area around Austin, except the one at Sonora. Georgetown Cavern is only about one mile southwest of the city of the same name.

The Texas caves are inner space phenomenon and most of them occur along the major geological structure called the Balcones Fault Zone. No oil or gas production has yet been discovered in Williamson or Travler Counties in the Balcones Fault structures proper. The Balcones Fault Zone extends from Hunt County to Bexar County. Commercial production has been discovered in Navarro from the Taylor and Woodbine sands. Waterbearing formations are also found along the fault zone. Georgetown obtains fresh, potable water from the Hickory sandstone, encountered at 1,700 feet. Near Cross Plains the Hickory is thought to be the deepest horizon for possible oil, gas or water production. The strata comes in here at a depth of between 5,000 and 6,000 feet. The so-called Murphy well, northwest of Cross Plains, is reported to have penetrated the Hickory but found it barren.

Contract calls for work to begin at the stop light where Highways 36 and 279 intersect to progress southward to the Brown County line.

## Annual Audit Shows City In Sound Shape

How does your town stand financially?

Total receipts of the City of Cross Plains during the fiscal year which ended April 1, amounted to \$82,119.73, according to an annual audit just completed by Chas. F. Hemphill, Albany accountant.

Indictive of the steady growth of the municipality's revenues is the comparison with 1964, which reveals an increase for the year just ended of \$2,505.31.

The \$82,119.73 was derived mainly from gas, water and sewer services in the amount of \$66,705 and taxes of \$13,249.06. Remainder of the city's revenues came from nine miscellaneous sources.

Hemphill's audit showed the municipality's bonded debt at \$57,000, a figure \$5,000 less than at the beginning of last fiscal year.

Total assets of the city are currently \$311,606.98, a figure which is approximately 550 per cent greater than the amount owed.

**Do You Remember?...**

From Files of 1911

Monday night, Jan. 9, S. T. Morris and Co. Dry Goods was destroyed by fire. Mr. Morris reported that he had been reading and had started to get up from a table when his arm struck a kerosene lamp, knocking it to the floor and breaking it. The fire spread quickly and soon the entire building was ablaze. A bucket brigade composed of citizens of the town was credited with saving other nearby establishments.

Thursday, Jan. 12, was an historic day in Cross Plains. On that day, real estate located in the new townsite of the little railroad town went on sale and many local investors recorded purchases.

A carload of six-inch water mains has arrived in Cross Plains. The 20,000 feet of water-works system is already being distributed over the townsite and contract for laying the mains is ready to be let in the near future. Cross Plains will soon boast of one of the best water systems in the state.

February 10: The telephone company received their new, modern switchboard here last week. It is presently equipped to handle 400 conversations and is arranged in such a manner that another 150 can be accommodated if the occasion demands.

March 17: The big tower and storage tanks for the water system here has arrived. The tower is 70 feet tall and the tank is about 25 feet tall. Its full storage capacity is rated at 60,000 gallons.

May 12: Thursday evening, about 5:00 p.m., 200 men from the Young Men's Business League of Waco arrived in Cross Plains by special train and were met at the depot by members of the Cross Plains Commercial Club and quite a crowd of others. They marched from the depot up Main Street led by a 35-piece band from Baylor University. The crowd stopped at the corner of Main and 8th, and J. A. Hollers delivered the welcome address. All the visitors were greatly surprised at the wonderful growth of the "terminal city" and said they expected to hear of greater things being done in Cross Plains in the future.

Oct. 27, the first "trade day" in Cross Plains, has been heralded a complete success. Every business establishment in town operated at full capacity during the day, and a number of people elected to relinquish their dinner hours in pursuit of commerce. 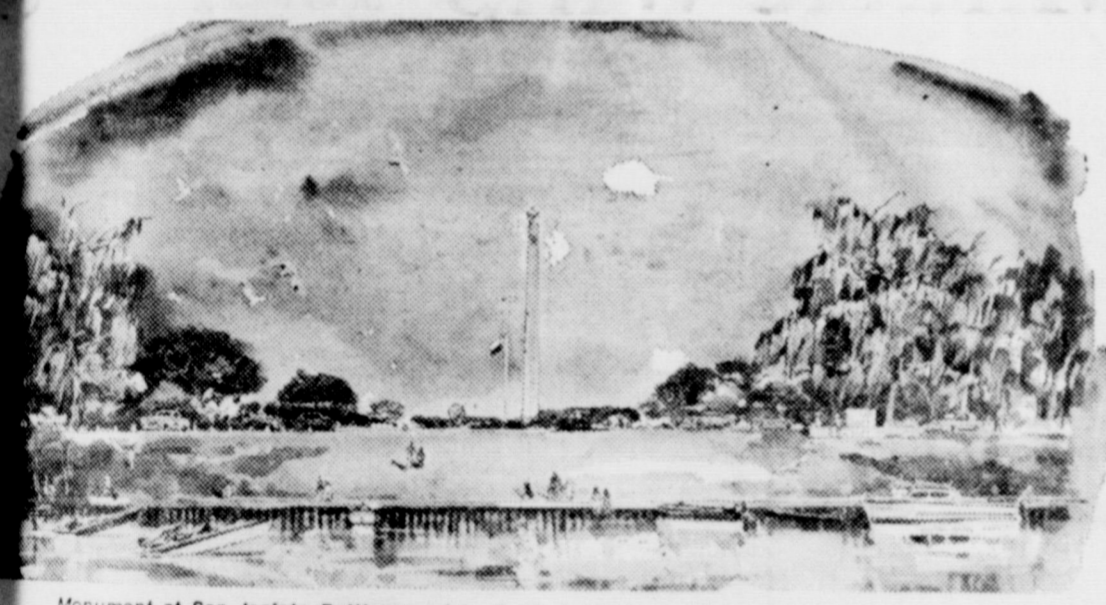
