## Contracts Awarded For 8 Dams On Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed

Apparent low bidders for the first eight floodwater retaining structures in the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed have been announced from state headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service at Temple. Contracts totaled \$627,988.90.

Sites 3, 4A and 5 were grouped for one contract with the low bidder being Roy L. Reese Construction Co. of Hasse. The bid was \$149,783.90. Other bidders on the contract were W. E. Davis and Lyles Construction Co. of Turkey, Lyles and Davis Construction Co. of Childress, O. M. Baker Construction Co. of Burnet, Easements for building the structures were granted by Virginia Mullins Estate, Dr. Joe McFarlane, Maura Mae Yarborough, and Frank Windham. Apparent low bid of \$231,557 by Baker was followed by four other bidders including Ford Allen, Lyles and Davis, Roy L. Reese and W. E. Davis and Lyles. Each of the contracts

call for construction to begin within 20 days and are to be finished within 230 days. Contract for building site 12, located about 14 miles south of Baird, on the Frank Windham and Owen estate lands, was awarded to Ford Allen Construction Company of Coleman on a low bid of \$148,787. Other contractors bidding on the job were: Roy L. Reese, Lyles and Davis of Childress, Roland Sherer of Weatherford, Davis

& Lyles of Turkey and Baker. Contracts involving sites 22 and 23, located on lands owned by John D. and L. L. (Doc) Montgomery, about five miles west of Cross Plains, went to Ben McBroom Co., Inc. of Crescent, Okla., on a bid of \$97,891. The jobs are due to begin within 20 days from final award of contracts and are to be finished within 221 days. M. W. McNeese, Project Construction Engineer with the SCS in Brownwood will supervise construction of the work, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist.

**Other Lettings Due**  
Additional bids were to be opened on three more sites in the Bayou Watershed Program Wednesday, involving Sites 1, 2, and 6, James Herring, Work Unit Conservationist at Baird, stated.

## Fire Marshal Post Is Not Yet Filled

Want to be fire marshal? Cross Plains city councilmen are seeking a replacement for T. Y. Woody, who recently resigned after eight years service.

When the matter of Woody's replacement came up for consideration at a meeting of city fathers Tuesday night, it was decided to procure a list of persons willing to accept the responsibility and then make a choice at a later date.

The fire marshal job has in the past paid \$2.50 monthly, however, a raise was talked as being a possible necessity.

Qualified persons interested in serving as fire marshal may make their desire known to any member of the council. All names will be placed on the list to be later considered.

## Phone Rates Fuss Headed For Court

An impasse between Kizer Telephone Co., Inc. and Cross Plains and Rising Star city councils on a requested telephone rental increase appeared headed for the courts Tuesday night.

Cross Plains aldermen rejected the newest proposal by Kizer officials in a two and one-half hour session. Rising Star vetoed the two-step proposition two weeks ago.

**Court Suggested**  
E. O. Kizer, president of the telephone company, spoke to local aldermen during the time allotted to the 'phone rate question.

Kizer stated, "I came here tonight to make one last effort to get things straight." He added, "If we can't find some way to settle this thing, we may have to go to court."

**Briefs Made**  
Kizer continued, "Preparatory briefs have already been made, but names of the towns have been left vacant. I am making no threat, but just making a statement of facts," he declared.

The telephone executive explained that they were asking only for a 4.4 per cent rate of return on investment, although allowed a 6 per cent return. He also pointed out that he could not accept half of the increase as had been proposed to him by several parties.

Kizer said, "Court proceedings are steps I don't want to take."

**Unanimous Vote**  
Cross Plains council voted unanimously, 5-0, in favor of the rejection. J. P. McCord made the motion "to reject the telephone increase of rates as it is presented by the Kizer Telephone Company."

The rate requested was in a two-step raise. Approximately one-half of the increase would have become effective July 1,

and the second half would have gone into effect Jan. 1, 1967. That proposal was a compromise from the initial tender made late last year. Business 'phones would have gone up \$3.25 monthly and residence rental \$1.25 for private lines after first of the year.

**Not Honor Bound**  
Kizer pointed out to aldermen that if the question went into court that the company would not feel bound to ask for 4.4 per cent return rates. He said, "We will feel free to ask the 6 per cent rate of return."

Kizer briefly outlined two improvements if increase granted. One was to convert present 8-party service to 4-party lines, and second was the elimination of aerial wires by converting to underground cables.

## Saturday Final Day For School Boss Applicants

Board of Trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District has postponed hiring of a new superintendent, according to Edwin Baum, board secretary.

"We decided to extend application filing time until Saturday (June 25)," Baum said Tuesday morning following a called meeting of the trustees held Monday night at the school. He added, "All applications for the position must be in the hands of either Nathan Foster, president, or myself Saturday."

Trustees reviewed the five applications received thus far in Monday night's special meeting, but no formal action was

taken on any of the candidates. Another called session is slated for Saturday night to investigate new applications and further review the five now in hand.

The vacancy occurred last week when Paul L. Whitton resigned to accept a position with Miller Visual Aids, Inc., a subsidiary of Columbia Investment Corporation, a firm with worldwide holdings. His resignation will become effective Aug. 31, which coincides with the end of the fiscal year. Whitton came here in 1952 from Comanche as schools head, and has been in the teaching field virtually all his adult life.

## 3 Callahan Towns May Get TV Cable

Possibilities of television cable service for Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde moved a step nearer reality Tuesday night, as the City Council here voted unanimously to grant a 15-year franchise to Callahan T-V Service, Inc.

Identical action had been previously taken by the City Councils at Baird and Clyde.

John R. Jordan of Abilene, president of the cable service, and Charles Walker of Baird, vice-president, pointed out that success of the project was based on procurement of franchises in all three of the Callahan County towns.

Rates charged by the firm, which would offer five television channels, would be dependent upon the ultimate number of connections obtained, however, discussions Tuesday suggested a \$7.50 installation cost and monthly fee of at least \$5.95 and no more than \$10. Charges for extensions (connections at a second place within a home) would probably be \$5 for installation and \$1.50 monthly, councilmen were told.

The cable firm would be subject to a 2½ per cent gross receipts tax to each municipality, the same as is currently paid by other utility companies.

## 4,543 Pounds Surplus Foods To Be Distributed Here Today

One hundred and fifty-eight Cross Plains area residents of Callahan County will receive 4,543 pounds of surplus commodities free of charge Thursday.

Today marks the first distribution of surplus foods to needy families in the county under the newly instituted Surplus Commodity Program. Each recipient will get approximately 33½ pounds of food month to month hereafter, according to County Judge Byron Richardson.

**Foods At City Hall**  
Distribution point in Cross Plains is the back of the City Hall, and it will be open from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 o'clock. Richardson

stressed that recipients should adhere as closely as possible to the schedule each has received by letter to secure orderly procedure. He continued, "However, if it works a hardship on anyone they should feel free to come by anytime Thursday to pick up their commodities."

First distribution was made in Callahan County Tuesday at Baird when approximately 9,000 pounds of the commodities were out. Richardson said that 136 cases had been certified for the foodstuffs there.

## Gulley Washer Soaks This Area

Heavy rains fell over the Cross Plains area last Friday and Saturday, revitalizing parched pastures and providing moisture for recently-planted peanut and cotton crops.

In Cross Plains S. F. Bond, official weather observer, gauged the rainfall at 4.26. It was the only measurable precipitation here since May 1.

Measurements ranged from around two inches in the area east of Burkett to more than five inches at the J. M. Greenwood place, between Cross Plains and Cross Cut.

The welcomed precipitations, however, were not without damage from accompanying lightning and wind. More than 70 telephones near here were

knocked out by short circuits caused by lightning and repairmen worked around the clock Saturday and Sunday to restore service.

Some fields were badly washed. One at the W. B. (Wes) Holcomb place in the Sabanno community, which had been recently planted to peanuts, suffered extensive damage.

Most all streams in the area ran late Saturday. Neither Pecan Bayou nor Turkey Creek, however, got out of its banks. Nearly all small grain crops had been harvested and marketed before the rains began falling. Farmers pointed out that had the storms come a week earlier damage would have been many times greater.

Total rainfall received in Cross Plains thus far this year now stands at 13.45 inches, about normal for the first six months.

A pre-construction conference, prior to the beginning of road work on State Highway 279 south of Cross Plains, was held at the City Hall here last Thursday morning.

Purpose of the meeting was to secure close cooperation between the contractor and the public in the re-routing of traffic during the construction period.

Present at the conference were Morris Ruby and M. E. Ruby, Jr., contractors; Howard Cox, local deputy sheriff; Doyle Burchfield, mayor of the City of Cross Plains; Paul Whitton, school superintendent; J. P. McCord, city councilman; C. M.
