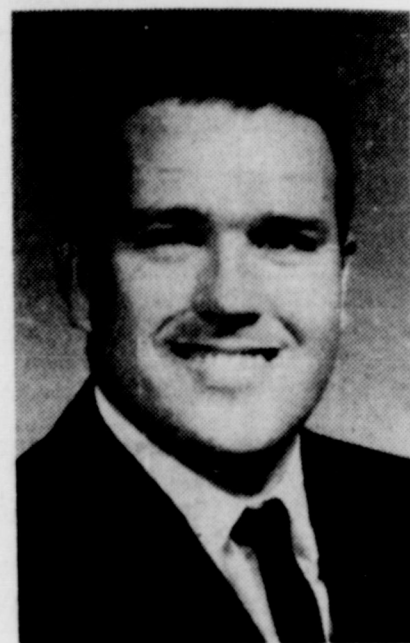

Wayne Ford Named Local Schools Head

A new superintendent and high school principal were chosen for Cross Plains schools at a special meeting of the board of trustees Saturday night.

Wayne Ford, who taught in the local system the past six years and served three as high school principal, was elevated to the superintendency. He was chosen from a field of 12 applicants and succeeds Paul L. Whitton, who recently resigned after 14 years.

Ford assumes responsibilities of his new position July 1, however, Whitton will remain in an advisory capacity until close of the current fiscal year Aug. 31.

Succeeding Ford as high school principal is Scot Edington, who has been a member of the faculty here five years.

Both Ford and Edington will have classroom assignments in addition to their executive responsibilities.

"I plan to teach at least one class and Mr. Edington will have possibly two," the new superintendent said. He pointed out, though, that definite assignments for next year's faculty of 23 instructors was yet to be worked out.

Ford received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Howard Payne College in Brownwood in 1960 and his M. A. in 1964. Special administrative certificate was taken at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Taking M. A.

Edington, a native of this locality, finished high school at Burkett, took his bachelor's degree from Texas Tech in Lubbock and is currently completing work on his M. A. at Hardin-Simmons.

Promotions of Ford and Edington and the recent resignation of Wayne McDonald leaves

two vacancies on the faculty for the upcoming school term. They are that of a high school science teacher and that of band director.

It is not yet definite whether or not three special teachers and three teacher's aides, who worked in the local system the last semester will again be employed.

They were utilized under a federal grant and the program was originally set-up for three years. It is pointed out, though, that government funds have not yet been appropriated for the upcoming term. This action is expected by mid-July.

The new superintendent's family consists of his wife and their 12-year-old daughter, a seventh grade student. They own their home which is located one block east of the school campus.

The new principal's family consists of his wife, the former Linda Tyler, and their two children, the oldest of whom will enter the first grade at the beginning of the new term. They own their own home in the Tom Bryant addition.

Whitton Set Record

Whitton, who is leaving here to become assistant of the president of Columbia Investment Corporation, a firm with worldwide holdings, enjoys the distinction of having headed Cross Plains Schools longer than any other person. He came here from Comanche in 1952. He will move his family to Fort Worth, where he has bought a home in Ridglea Hills.

Bill Vineyard Resigns From Highway Patrol

Cross Plains is losing its highway patrolman but not its station.

Lt. Homer Bailey of Abilene told this newspaper Monday afternoon that Bill Vineyard was being transferred to Abilene, but that the station here would definitely not be closed.

"We will have to serve the Cross Plains area out of Eastland and Baird for a while," he said, "but another patrolman will be assigned to the one-man station here as soon as one is available."

Vineyard, who is currently taking the second week of his annual vacation, came to Cross Plains in August 1963. He told the Review later Monday that he had tendered his resignation to the Department of Public Safety and that he would continue to make his home here. He will begin work for Cal Long's Refrigeration and Electrical Service next week. Vineyard and his wife and three children own their home in the north part of town.

The highway patrol station in Cross Plains was established five years ago and Vineyard and Jerry Mathews, now of Baird, are the only patrolmen to be assigned here.

Vineyard, a native of Comanche County, began with the Department of Public Safety Jan. 3, 1957. He served at San Angelo until being transferred

here. He was a member of the DPS pistol marksmanship team. His wife is the former Billie Ruth Lackey, who was reared in Cross Plains.

Byron Newton, 56, Buried At Burkett

Newton was found dead in his parked car shortly after noon Saturday.

Haying, Grazing Not Allowed In This And Near By Counties

Contrary to existing reports, haying and grazing of diverted acreage is not permitted in Callahan or adjoining counties.

J. C. Earp, office manager for Callahan County ASCS, issued the following statement yesterday:

"Only three counties in the state (Deaf Smith, Oldham and Randall) have been approved for emergency haying and grazing due to drought conditions. Haying or grazing diverted acres under annual programs, Conservation Reserve Program or Cropland Adjustment Program, without prior approval of the county ASCS office will subject producers to the penalties provided in the program regulations. If additional counties are approved for haying and grazing, county ASCS offices will be officially notified

by the state office and they will, in turn, notify producers. Information on emergency haying and grazing received from any other source should be disregarded."

FIREWORKS PROHIBITED IN CITY LIMITS, MAYOR

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reminded yesterday that the shooting of fireworks within the city limits of Cross Plains is unlawful. He said, "It is in violation of city ordinances to shoot fireworks in the city."

"We do not want to hinder in celebration of July 4, but the added danger of fire from the fireworks has prompted the city council to advise citizens of the ordinance," Burchfield explained.

Contracts Let For Two More Floodwater Dams

Contracts for three more flood prevention dams on Upper Pecan Bayou watershed have been let by headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, it was announced yesterday by James Herring of Baird, local work unit conservationist.

The new grants total \$448,281.60 and bring to \$1,096,270.50 the amount to be spent on 11 structures.

York Construction Company of Houston submitted low bids to build Sites 1 and 2, west of Denton Valley. The dams will be on the Ira Crawford, Von W. Loven, John and Roy Armor, Tom Fowler and Mrs. Dorcas Crawford Wilkerson places. The bid was \$232,127.62.

However, Mrs. Gene Rhodes, executive secretary, said that a deed of trust had been received and the local board of directors were presently in process of completing that legal form. The trust deed became necessary when difficulties arose over mineral rights to proposed building sites.

Mrs. Rhodes continued, "They tell me that as soon as the deed of trust is completed and returned to the Fort Worth office (Federal Housing office which supervises this district) the architect can advertise for construction bids."

2 Local Men Work With Archeologists

D. J. Smelly, Jr., and Bransford Eubank recently spent a week near Horsehead Crossing on the Pecos River, where they sifted middens and caves for Indian artifacts. They were part of a team from Texas Archeological Society, directed by the University of Texas.

Discoveries of the excavation and shiftings included flint knives and scrapers, darts and arrow points, awls made of bone and numerous other small articles of interest.

Roland Sheerers bid of \$216,153.98 on Site 6 was low. This structure is on the W. L. Cutbirth, Sr., W. L. Cutbirth, Jr. and Mrs. Robbie Seale Click land some eight miles northeast of Denton Valley.

Awarding of the contracts concluded the current fiscal year construction schedule of 11 structures in the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed, E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist at Brownwood, stated. Other flood control structures in the work plan containing a total of 35 flood control dams will be scheduled for succeeding years as land rights are granted to Soil and Water Conservation Districts or County Commissioners Courts as sponsoring local organizations.

M. W. McNeese, Project Engineer with SCS in Brownwood will supervise construction of these jobs. Work is due to begin on each contract within 20 days after final award and are scheduled for completion within 367 days.

Callahan County Hospital at Baird has been approved for Medicare, it was announced by the Bureau of Health Insurance of the Social Security Office in Dallas.

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Texas' New Commercial Code Changes Way Of Doing Business

A complete new set of laws covering loans and business activity takes effect in Texas Friday morning, as this state becomes the 44th to adopt the uniform commercial code.

Local bankers and some businessmen have been studying provisions of the recently-enacted statutes for several weeks.

Some predict the impact on Texas businessmen, banks and customers will be as great as that of the far-reaching revision of the state criminal code on courts and police.

It even introduces a new language to the state's business community.

Much of the application will

be felt at once by persons involved with chattle mortgages, business contracts and bank deposits.

Unchanged

Generally, real estate and auto sales will be unchanged.

Ivon Lee III, head of a new division created in the secretary of state's office, expects to be flooded by July 5 with more than 10,000 new documents giving statewide notice of business deals secured by something of significant financial value.

County clerks throughout the state expect a similar deluge of paper covering purchases made on installment payment plans where the ar-

ticles purchased are secured to guarantee the purchase price will be paid.

"The code attempts to cover every phase of commercial activity," Sam Kimberlin, Jr., executive vice president of the Texas Bankers Association, told association members. "It will be the framework of legal rules for business transactions throughout the decades to come."

Year For Change

Pennsylvania was the first state to adopt a uniform commercial code in 1954, and other states slowly joined the march of uniformity. The code was debated in the 1963 and 1965 Texas Legislatures and finally

adopted the provision that merchants and businessmen would be given at least a year to prepare for the changes.

Of the ten articles of the code, five deal directly with banking business — secured transactions, bank deposits, commercial paper, letters of credit, and bulk transfers.

Other sections deal with general provisions, sales, warehouse receipts and bills of lading, and investment securities.

Two of the new phases businessmen will lean on are "security agreement" and "security interest" — instead of "chattel mortgage or conditional sales contract" and "lien."

Presently, if a bank customer wants to borrow money to buy a piece of machinery he signs a chattel mortgage saying the machinery belongs to the bank until the debt is paid. Or the seller of the equipment may allow the buyer to buy "on time," and they execute a "conditional sales contract" where the seller retains ownership of the equipment until the full purchase price is paid. These mortgages or contracts are presently filed with the county clerk.

Under the new code there would be a "security agreement" with the lender or the seller. The type of collateral involved will determine where

the "financing statements" are filed. Generally most businesses and commercial loans will be recorded in the secretary of state's office, and most transactions with farmers and individual consumers will be filed in the county clerk's office.

Loan Check

Lee expects the secretary of state's office to handle about 50,000 "financing statements" a year. A bank about to make a loan on a piece of equipment could find out easily if the customer had outstanding loans in other parts of the state.

If a loan involves "consumer goods" — used primarily for personal, family or household (Continued On Page 8)

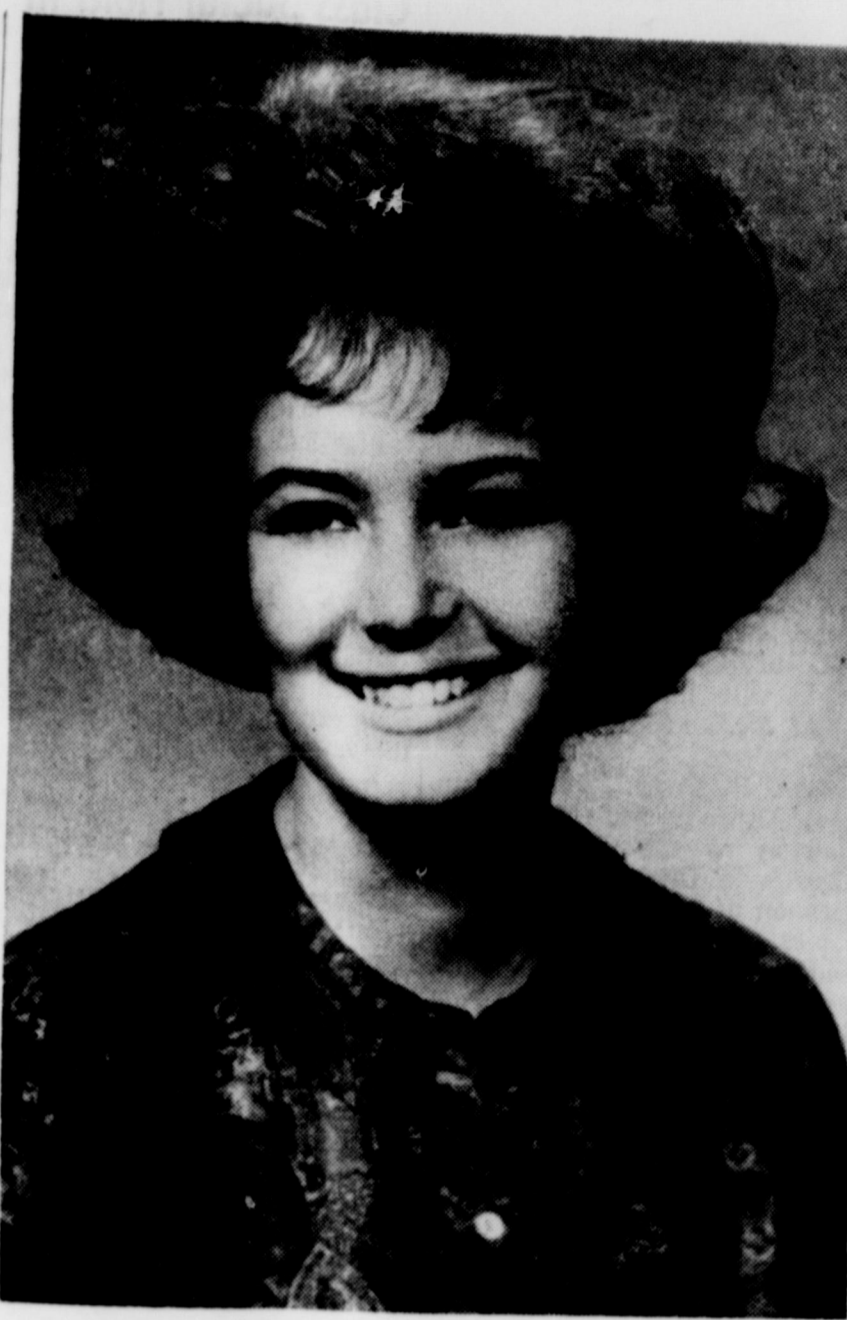
they swamped the Scouts with a 9-5 defeat.

Booster Club Approves Athletic Field Housing

Cross Plains Athletic Booster Club went on record in a called meeting Wednesday night of last week as favoring the construction of a field house on the local school campus.
The proposal was approved by the club and passed on to the Board of Trustees for consideration. Booster president Harry Dodds said that sketch plans and preliminary estimates had been presented the board. Present plans call for a return of the plans to the athletic organization for cooperative participation.
Need for the structure was accentuated on several points. Primary point was that the field house would "relieve strain on inadequate dressing facilities, and would provide more sanitary and better dressing facilities for athletes."
Also stressed was that incorporated within the building would be public rest rooms. Other features would include storage facilities for football equipment and ample space for weight programs.
The structure would be built of concrete blocks and complement present architecture.
Other projects adopted by the boosters last week were the extending of the press box atop the grandstands on the west side of the football field. Plans call for approximately doubling the present size.
Other objectives approved were the buying of scales to assist coaches in accurate record keeping in weight programs, and selling of advertising space on vinyl covered foam cushions carrying the Buffalo emblem which will be sold later this year by the organization.
It is explained that the word field house in this sense does not mean a large gymnasium — a common application of the term — but only an adjunct to existing gymnasium facilities.

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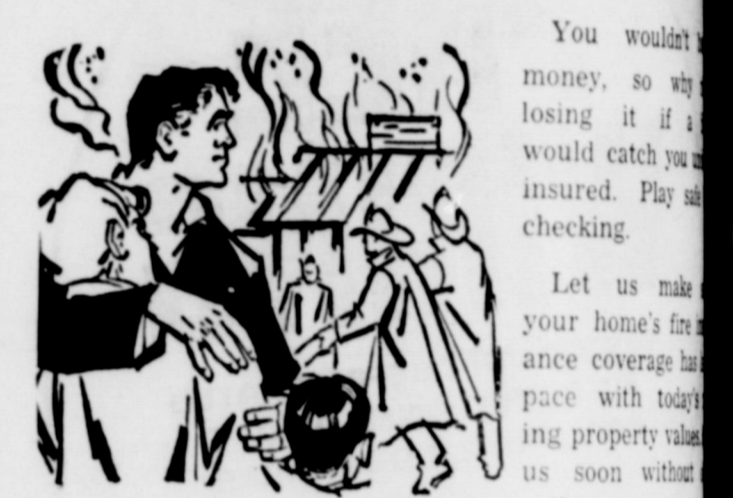

New Commercial Code Alters Business Ways

use — the county clerk could check for other loans outstanding in that county. If the debtor and/or the consumer goods moves to another county the original filing is good for four months. After that the lender or seller must file another financing statement in the county of the new location in order to protect his security interest.

Examples of financing statements that would be filed with the secretary of state include office equipment of a merchant to be used in business, stock of goods of a wholesaler bought for resale and accounts receivable of a retail merchant.

Financing statements that would be filed with a county clerk include: farm-connected collateral such as equipment used in farming operations, farm products or accounts relating to the sale of farm products by a farmer; consumer-goods used or bought primarily for personal, family or household purposes; crops, and fixtures permanently attached and used in connection with land or structures.

Filings with the secretary of state and with county clerks are on a standard form that can be used interchangeably. The standard fee is \$1 for each statement.

The longest part of the new code concerns sales and actually makes few changes in present business operations, says Leonard Passmore, lawyer for the Texas Bankers Association. The uniform sales act generally adopts opinions made by Texas courts in the past when the state had no such act.

One important change in sales, said Passmore, concerns verbal contracts. In previous years, a verbal contract on personal property not concerning real estate, generally was enforceable if the provisions could be proved. Under the new code,

personal property contracts for more than \$500 must be in some form of writing to be enforceable.

Other sections of the new code change the rules for writing checks on bank deposits.

"State check" is another new phrase added by the code. A bank would be under no obligation to cash a check if it was offered for collection six months or more after written.

"Of course this doesn't mean a lot of banks won't go ahead and cash these old checks," Passmore said. "But they are not under any legal obligations. Before, there was no such thing as a 'state check.'"

Death, Forgery

A 1937 court decision said a bank was relieved of obligation to cash a check after the death of the writer of the check. The new code says a bank will honor a check within 10 days after the writer of the check dies or is judged mentally incompetent unless given proper notice not to cash the check.

The code places more responsibility on the check writer in detecting forged or altered checks. It says a bank depositor must examine his cancelled checks for any possible forgeries or alterations and cannot collect from the bank if a forgery or alteration is not reported at least within a year.

Another part of the code says a check writer must use reasonable care in signing and writing checks. If a depositor signs a blank check and it later is illegally filled in and cashed, then the depositor is liable, not the bank. The bank continues to be responsible for any forged signatures on checks. However, if a check writer carelessly leaves the blank spaces on a check so it can later be illegally increased in collection value, then the depositor is liable.

CATTLEMAN EXPECTS GOOD RAIN IN JULY

Raymond DeBusk, local cattleman, doesn't profess to be a weather forecaster but he is predicting more rain in July than has fallen here since 1962.

"We occasionally get good rains in July and I think it is about time again," he says.

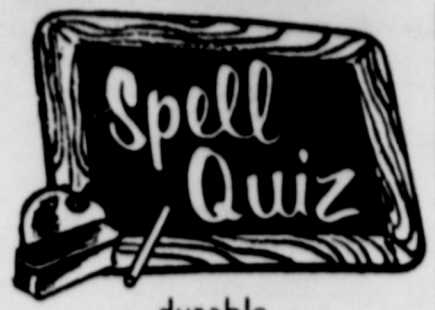
