District Courts Asked To Up Phone Rate In 2 Cities

Hearings are scheduled Thursday and Friday mornings on temporary injunctions sought by Kizer Telephone Company against the city councils of Rising Star and Cross Plains. The legal action seeks to prevent the two municipalities from enforcing a 1958 telephone rate structure and to allow increases in charges until an existing controversy is settled.

Hearing on the proposed injunction against Rising Star will be in 91st District Court at Eastland Thursday at 10 a.m. and the case against Cross Plains is scheduled in 42nd District Court at Baird at the same hour Friday.

The telephone company will be represented by Bryan Brad-

bury of Abilene and Ralph Curry of Dallas.

Attorneys to represent the City of Cross Plains were scheduled to be named at a meeting of the local council Tuesday night. Mayor Doyle Burchfield told the Review Monday at noon that he had been looking into the matter and that selection would be made by the council as a whole.

Mayor W. G. Reed of Rising Star telephoned this newspaper Monday night to report that his council had just voted three to two to oppose the Kizer litigation and to employ Jackson and Jackson, Baird attorneys, as legal counsel.

The hearing on the proposed Rising Star injunction will be before District Judge Frank

Sparks and the Cross Plains decision will be handed down by District Judge J. R. Black.

Plaintiff's petition to Judge Black alleges that present telephone rates are so low that the corporation is being deprived of its rights under Texas statutes to earn a fair return on the investment. For the fiscal

year ended March 31, 1965, the telephone company asserts that income yielded only a fraction over two per cent.

"Every day that the plaintiff is required to continue to charge no higher than the present unlawful rates, plaintiff is suffering confiscation of its property," the petition states.

Grazing To Be Stopped On 10 SCS Dams Here

As a result of an annual inspection made of 10 Soil Conservation structures in Callahan County, land owners will receive letters within the near future advising that livestock grazing on dams must be withheld until further notice.

A. J. Young of Coleman, vice-chairman of the board of supervisors for Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District, and James Herring, Baird work unit conservationist, completed the inspection this week and reported findings to Callahan County Commissioners Court and the parent SCS districts involved.

"We found many dams in an excellent state of repair," Young said, "however, this was not true in all cases and further grazing must be curtailed to prevent erosion and permanent damage."

It was pointed out that in at least one case, immediate repairs to the damsite are necessary.

It was explained that in addition to the 11 more flood water retention dams now under construction along the Upper Pecan Bayou that contracts for four more are to be let soon. Two of these will be on land owned by Frank Windham and others will be on the Knox Ranch.

Young and Herring personally visited 10 of the 12 damsites in Turkey Creek Water Control District and closely checked the native cover that is being maintained to prevent erosion. The two sites they did not check in Turkey Creek Water Control District are those which are a part of the Brown-Mills Conservation District. The other 10 are in the jurisdiction of Central Colorado Soil and Water District.

Young explained that when the current drought has passed and stands of grass are again lush and vigorous, grazing of SCS dams will again be allowed.

Everything Now O.K., Say Housing Officials

Cross Plains Housing Authority has been notified that "everything is in order" for the proposed \$256,000 low-rent housing project planned here.

Mrs. Gene Rhodes, local executive secretary, said Monday that Elwin Fitch, architect on the local proposition, had notified the Fort Worth office of the Housing Assistance Administration, the organization which oversees this area, "Everything is in order." Herbert Manning, assistant regional attorney in Fort Worth, in turn notified Mrs. Rhodes.

The Cross Plains secretary would not venture a guess as to when the actual advertising for bids would begin. However, she did say that Manning told her, "You should hear something within the next two or

three days." Neither would she comment on possible date for beginning construction.

Money Available

Mrs. Rhodes said that money for the project here was available "so far as I know." She continued, however, "It is not yet in our hands," and she explained that bonds would have to be issued after estimation of needs is again reported to the Housing Authority.

The local project was estimated to cost approximately \$256,000 at one time. It was noted early in the planning stage that one type of dwelling to be constructed would cost \$8,941, and 14 of those are called for.

20 Units Planned

Current plans still specify 20 units for Cross Plains to be built on two separate sites. Fourteen units are classified as elderly housing and are to be situated in the downtown section. Six other dwellings are classified for general occupancy and site selected and bought is in the northeast part of town just north of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home.

Apparent last step before bids can be asked was taken last week when the Fort Worth office accepted a deed of trust which became necessary when difficulties arose concerning mineral rights on building sites.

Work on securing the housing in Cross Plains began in 1964, although preliminary arrangements were begun about two years prior to that.

Members of the local housing authority are Jimmie Lee Payne, Claude Foster, R. C. (Cliff) Gilmore, H. M. Belew, and Elvin Scott, Mrs. Rhodes and Mayor Doyle Burchfield.

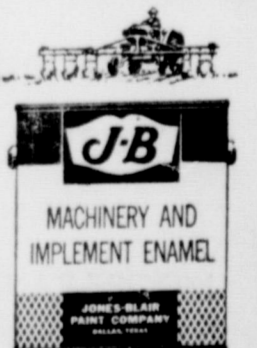

Traffic Halted At Recreation Center

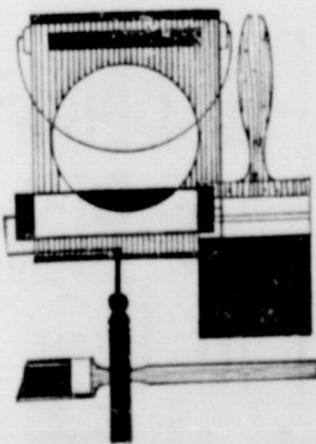
R. W. (Bob) Needham, president of Lakewood Recreational Center, announced late Tuesday that all roads into the property are being closed during the remainder of the construction period.

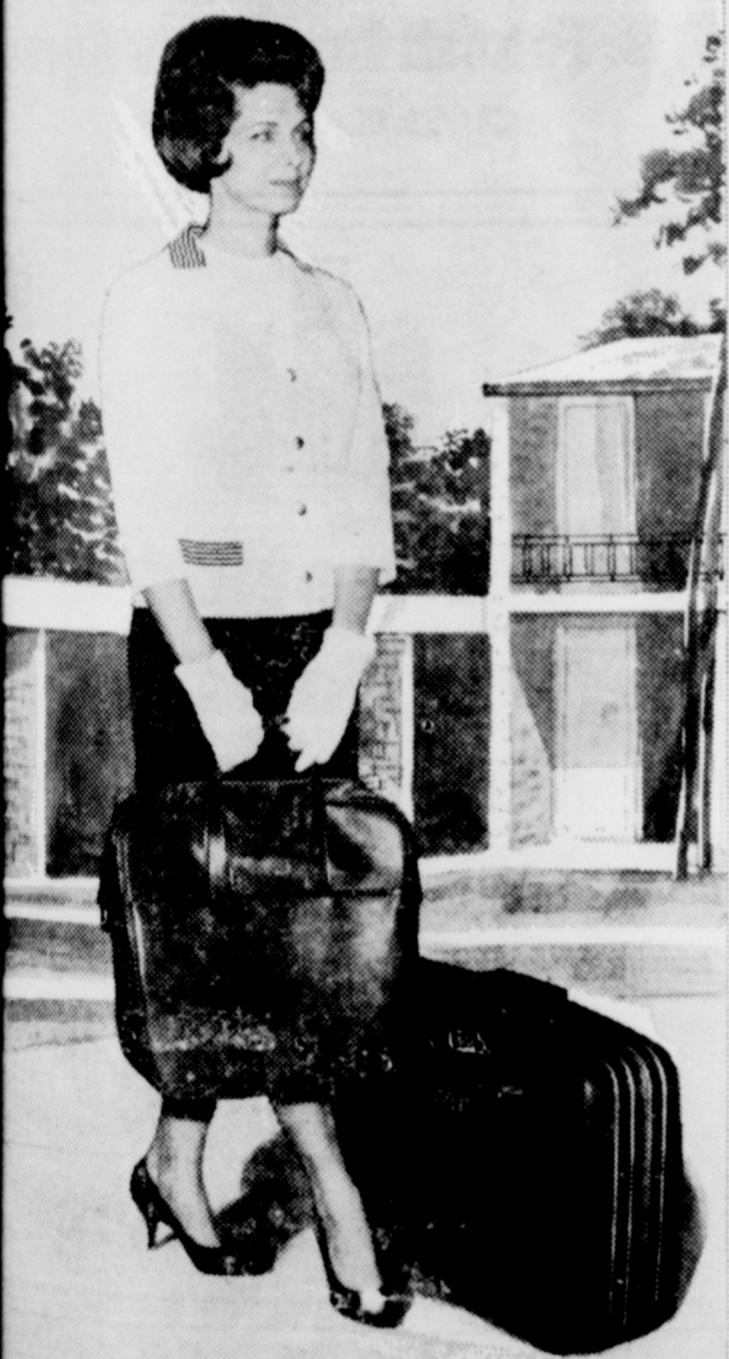

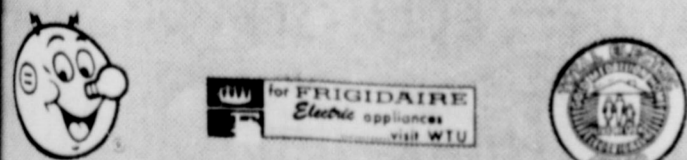

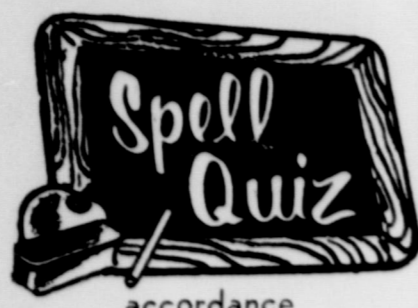
