## United Fund Goal Passed First Day

People of the Cross Plains area gave overwhelming response to 45 ladies Friday as they conducted an annual solicitation to raise the United Fund's \$2,000 quota.

"We're over the top," said Mrs. J. Peyton Smith, who served as campaign chairman, as she tallied reports from community workers Monday morning.

Actual money counting revealed that a total of \$1,987.82 had been paid in, however, it was pointed out that two communities were unreported and that two corporations have promised to mail checks.

Indications were that when all donations are totaled the goal will be over-subscribed by about 10 per cent.

A check of some 60 newspapers received regularly at the Cross Plains Review office revealed that no other city, either larger or smaller than Cross Plains, had attained its goal so quickly.

Nathan Foster, president of the local U. F. Fund organization, yesterday expressed keen appreciation to not only those who supported the fund-raising endeavor but also to the ladies who did the actual solicitation.

"Nowhere could you find a more loyal group of civic workers than those who devoted last Friday to this humanitarian undertaking," he said, "and

they deserve warmest congratulations from all of us for what they accomplished to help charitable institutions and persons in need."

It was pointed out that donations will continue to be accepted by any of the 45 ladies who worked on the drive or by Jack Tunnell, U. F. treasurer, at the Citizens State Bank.

## Reuben McCowen Receives Citation

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Reuben C. McCowen, formerly of Cross Plains, who is currently serving as water and sewer superintendent for the city of Coahoma.

## Commissioners Court May Re-Do 4 County Precincts

Redistricting of four commissioners precincts is presently being considered by Callahan County Commissioners Court and a special meeting may be called soon to take official action in the matter.

A plan being advocated with reported support from both Baird and Clyde, would place Clyde alone in Precinct one; put Baird, Putnam and Admiral in Precinct 3; leave Eula, Oplin, Denton Valley and Rowden in Precinct 2; and not change Precinct 4 which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood and Atwell.

## Recreation Center Gets 2nd Loan OK

Lakewood Recreation Center, which started out to become a \$112,000 playground, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, has received approval for \$49,500 worth of enlargements, incorporating a

number of facilities which were not a part of the original planning.

A supplemental loan for that amount has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, a federal agency which

made the first extension of credit.

The new money will be used in building the following additional facilities: a \$13,500 miniature golf course, fences about the property to cost \$1,000, reunion pavilions at a cost of \$4,256.50, three golf tee-box shelters at \$351.90, four picnic shelters \$5,558, a floating boat dock at \$3,560, boat-landing ramp \$660, children's playground equipment at a cost of \$1,750 and \$825 worth of improvements to waterworks.

Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains, general contractor for the first project which ran \$106,008, is reported to have 95 per cent of the work completed. On a recent tour of inspection by FHA officials and the consulting architect, genuine satisfaction was expressed of the progress thus far.

Debt requirement schedule for the recreational facility will now call for monthly payments of \$812 to take care of the two loans. Operating budget of the club has been tentatively set at \$426 monthly. It was pointed out that \$14,860 annually should operate the club and retire the debt on schedule. Income from 200 memberships would run \$12,000 and additional revenues have been estimated as follows: green fees from non-members \$1,200, fishing and boating fees from non-members \$300, the miniature golf course \$1,200 and rental of the clubhouse and pavilion \$160, making the total based on 200 members \$14,860 annually.

Members of the club's board of directors are: R. D. (Bob) Needham, president; J. A. Rutherford, secretary, and W. E. Tyler, Dave Lee, L. B. Forbes, Jack Jackson, A. A. White and Charles Rutherford, directors. Under ideal grass-growing conditions the club's golf course is expected to be ready for use within two months, the Review was told.

## Edwin Schaefer Harvests Spectacular Peanut Yield

There's a new breed of farmers tilling much of the sandy soil of the Cross Plains area and they're incorporating proven practices of the past with agriculture's most modern methods. They're accomplishing spectacular results.

Characteristic of the new generation is Edwin Schaefer of the Sabanno locality. He is the son of one of Eastland County's most successful farmers but a young man with definite ideas of his own.

Edwin is presently gathering a peanut crop worthy of public attention. A small irrigated patch, which he planted as an experimental project is grossing well over \$400

per acre. While he's definitely pleased with the cash return, he's equally as enthusiastic with knowledge gained and how it may be applied in years ahead.

The six-acre irrigated patch produced \$2,392.04 worth of salable peanuts and the hay crop is yet to be marketed or utilized. The nuts graded from 68 to 71. The yield was 120 bushels to the acre.

Schaefer has 35 more acres in peanuts, about 25 and one-half of which are on unirrigated land. He expects an average yield of 80-bushels to the acre from the dryland field. Another irrigated patch is believed capable of producing a 110 pound bushel average.

## Combined Effort For Federal Aid Spawns Big, New Organization

Action has been taken by Callahan County Commissioners Court to affiliate this county with a Council of Governments organization, now being formulated by Jones and Taylor counties.

Purpose of the organization is to present a united front in behalf of all political subdivisions of the 17th Congressional District in securing an equitable share of federal aid for various programs.

Two Callahan cities — Baird and Clyde — have also affiliated with the organization. Cross Plains and Putnam City Councils have taken no action in the matter.

A fee of three cents per capita — based on 1960 census — is assessed subdivisions which join the set-up. An exception, though, is that of school districts which may join for \$25.

The workings and purpose of the organization was recently explained at a meeting in Abilene, to which leaders of all political subdivisions of this congressional district were invited.

The Heath string of bucking stock is said to be exceptionally good and is expected to pose a real challenge to local cowpokes and cowgirls. Deadline for entries in any of the five events is 6 p.m. October 14.

Admission charge for the rodeo will be \$1 for adults an 50 cents for students. Cross Plains Riding Club will share in the net proceeds.

## Bisons To Tangle With Strong Bangs Dragons

Cross Plains Buffaloes will take on a second straight 17-B opponent in Buffalo Stadium Friday as the Bangs Dragons invade Bison territory. Kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

The clash is the final non-conference clash for both elevens. Cross Plains will bring a 1-4 record into the encounter, and Bangs sports a 5-0 season record, therefore, rating Friday's visitors as heavy favorites.

Although the two teams have not met a mutual opponent, offensive and defensive performances of the two clubs again leave the Buffaloes on the short end. Bangs, defending district champs, has rung the register for 99 points, the same amount that the Bison have allowed five foes. While Cross Plains has tallied only 14 points, Bangs has allowed only one touchdown, that to Santa Anna of District 9-A. The Dragons have held two other 9-A schools

scoreless, Early and Rising Star, the latter falling 40-0 last week end.

Sixteen lettermen return from Bangs' 11-1 team last year, and three of those were all-district performers of 1965. They are tailback Clinton White, 140 senior, center Charles Gravell, 150 junior, and guard Ken Fitzgerald, 170 senior. Six seniors lead the experienced Dragon squad.

All backfield positions are manned by monogram winners. Among the top returnees joining White are wingback Billy Weed, quarterback Travis Hallford, fullback Brad Mullen, quarterback Bruce Mullen, and tailback Ronnie Horton.

The Buffaloes were reported in good shape physically first of the week. The thundering herd has not beaten a Dragon team in the past few years, although Friday's contest marks resumption of the series after a two-year lay-off.

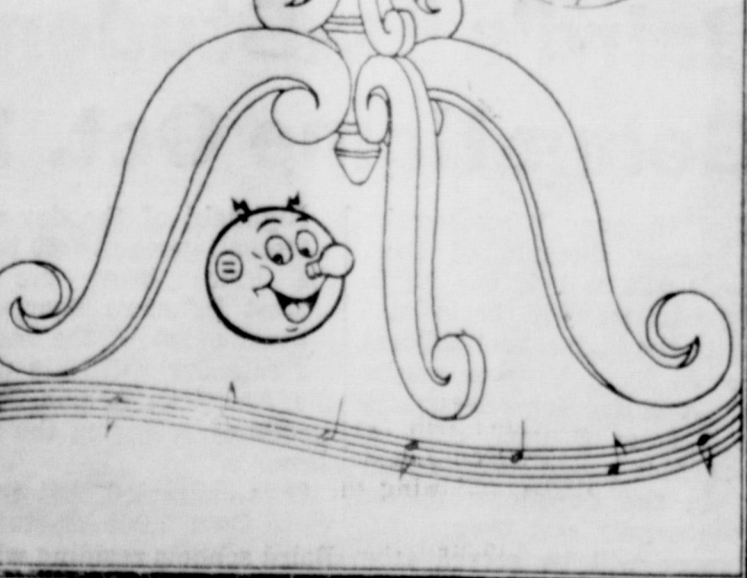

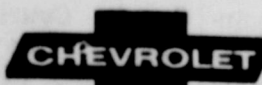

# Gorman's Late Touchdown Axes Buffaloes 8-0 Friday

Lack of a scoring punch doomed Cross Plains Buffaloes to a fourth loss of the season Friday night at Gorman 8-0.

The visiting Buffaloes turned a long drive, a blocked punt and an intercepted pass into three scoring opportunities, but each time Gorman defense manned barricades and rebuffed the threats. After being completely stopped for three quarters, the host Panthers of District 17-B came to life and pushed across the only tally of the night mid-way through the final quarter.

The loss dropped the purple and gold Bison record to 1-4, while the win gained Gorman of District 17-B a 4-1 record.

**Come To Life**  
Gorman gained possession of the hogshead on the third play of the final frame after a Buff fourth down gamble had failed by a yard at the Panther 31.

Suddenly the Gorman offense, which had easily been stopped by Herd defenders previously, was more than equal to the task of methodically penetrating Cross Plains defenses. A fourth down push at the hosts' 40 gained Gorman its first, first down of the game and from there were not even slowed until late in the march. Panther quarterback Daryl Hirst, who accounted for 31 yards of the 69 yard drive, nixed the Herd's bid to blunt the scoring drive with a four yard line plunge on the fourth down and a first on the Bison six. Hirst then circled left end from that point and found pay dirt on the seventeenth play of the drive. Hirst then passed to his right end Robert Hunter in the left flat for the two-point conversion.

**Year's Longest March**  
The first quarter was spent with ineffectual offensive tries by both teams, although both defenses gained a measure of respect. Buffalo center Gregg Williams smothered a Panther fumble on Gorman's 49, but Panther fullback Jackie Harrison immediately countered with a pass interception. Following a bombing 51-yard

punt by Hirst which was killed at the Herd 10, Cross Plains began its longest drive of the season.

The Buffs used 19 plays in covering 82 yards to the Gorman eight before launching a passing attack and being pushed back to the 20 yard line. Halfback Jerry Strickland was the workhorse of the march rushing for 62 yards on nine carries. As time neared nought in the first half, Buff quarterback Joe Pierce elected to try the aerial game, but with no success. In four tries he was spilled for losses three times and had one incompleting.

**Threaten Quickly**  
Cross Plains returned after intermission and quickly mounted two scoring attempts. Defense handed the offensive unit both opportunities.

Gorman took the second half kickoff but on fourth down an attempt to punt was blocked by Bison fullback Vernon Johnson and left end Mike Bright.

Johnson fell on the oval and gave the Buffs possession at the Panther 25. Four line smashes netted the Buffs only nine and one-half yards. Gorman controlled at the 15. On the third play, Buff Randy Montgomery, hero of last week's win over Baird, swiped a Panther aerial and returned it 20 yards to the Gorman 19.

Montgomery got three yards and Strickland added nine for a first on the Panther seven. Four running plays netted the Herd just four yards and Gorman held at the three. Shortly thereafter the hosts began the touchdown push.

Although statistics resulted in about an even match, Cross Plains held a big advantage through the first three quarters. The Herd had gained 117 yards rushing and seven first downs, but in the fourth had a net loss of four yards. Gorman did not gain a first during the initial three quarters and had only 24 yards on the ground. The fourth stanza rally tacked on 84 yards and six first downs.

No penalties were stepped off and only two red flags were thrown, one against each team, but both were refused.

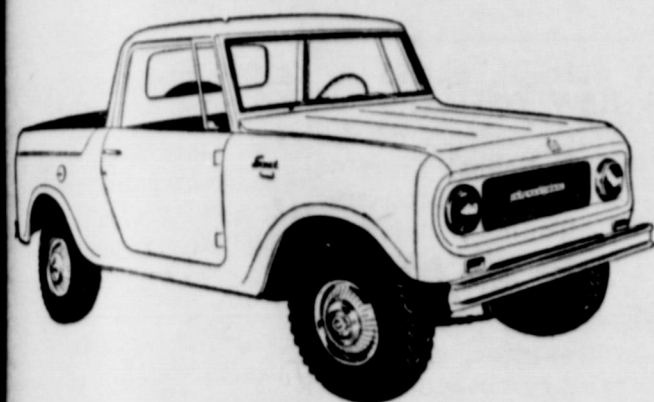

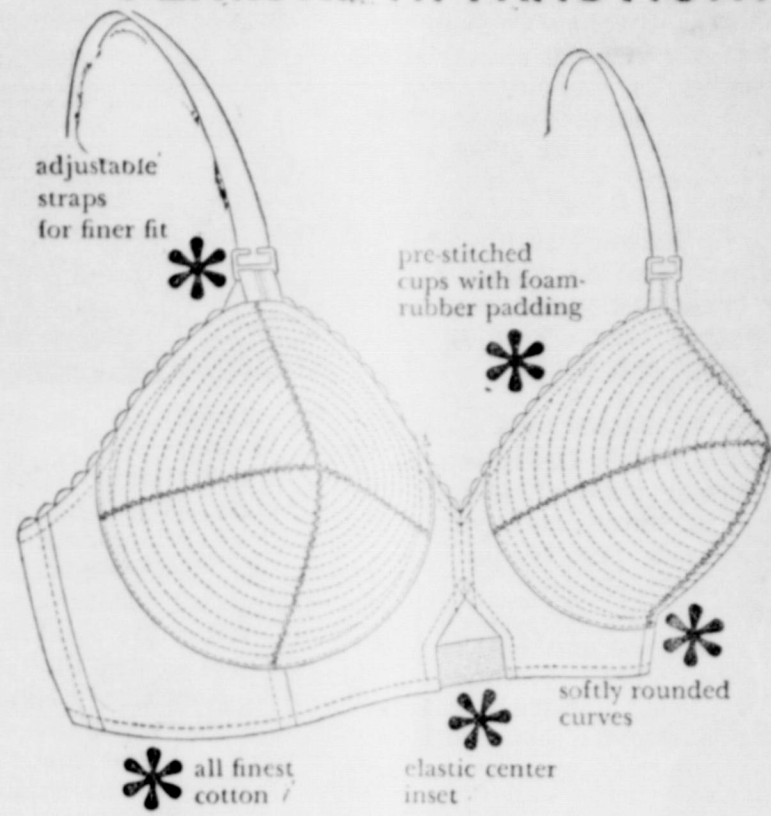

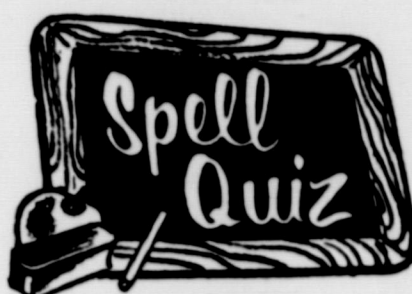
