FIFTY-EIGHTH YEAR

800 Children Will Get Tests For TB

Estimated 800 Callahan school children will be given skin tests for tuberculosis between now and Christmas.

The testing will be done by Mrs. Ault of Baird, county health officer, under the direction of Counseling Officer Dr. M. L. Sheffield. Parent Teacher

Associations will provide volunteer help at each of the five Callahan County schools.

Senate Urges Check
The Texas senate recently enacted a strongly-worded resolution supporting the testing program as a means of eradicating the dreaded disease and

pointing out how suffering and deaths had been reduced by the work already done.

Mrs. Ault announces the following schedule for testing:

Students of the first, third, fifth, seventh, ninth and twelfth grades are to be tested this year. Cooperation of Callahan County TB Association, which aids in financing through the annual sale of Christmas seals, makes possible the checking of students in six grades rather than only two, which would have otherwise been the program.

Parents Aid Asked
It is pointed out that the tests are virtually painless and offer an important safeguard in the health of children. Parents are being urged to complete "Request for Test" forms and see that they are returned to school officials promptly.

Mrs. Ault pointed out that the long-range program called for testing of students in other grades next year.

"We alternate among the grades, taking half of the schools each year," she declared.

Yule Seals Help
Callahan TB Association, described by health officials as being one of the state's most active and aggressive local health units, has for years been a strong supporter of the testing program. Citizens of this county, in appreciation of this leadership, have given the organization support by overwhelming response to Christmas Seals sale each Yuletide.

Band Gets Top Rating

Band director E. J. (Ed) Burt telephoned the Review from Brady early Tuesday night and reported that Cross Plains High School Band had scored top rating in University Interscholastic League marching contests at Brady.

The local aggregation, which Burt had been putting through twice-daily drills, took the field at 3 p.m., competing against standards along with bands from Albany, Eldorado, De Leon, Ranger, Junction, Santa Anna, Menard, Sonora, Marble Falls, Goldthwaite and Early of Brownwood. Results were not announced, however, until 5 p.m.

Only two other bands won the top rating classification. They were Albany and Eldorado. Burt said of the win, "We're all thrilled to death. I am real proud of the kids; they did a real good job." He explained that judging was especially rough this year.

Three Cross Plains twirlers won first division medals in solo competition. They are Terry Baum, Vanda Anderson and Norma Merrill.

Tuesday's top rating marks the sixth straight year Cross Plains has earned the distinction.

Court Abolishes Voting Boxes At Atwell, Rowden, Admiral And Dudley Monday

Four Callahan County voting boxes were abolished by the Commissioners Court in session Monday and consolidated with other near by voting precincts.

Closed were the boxes at Atwell, Admiral, Rowden and Dudley.

Atwell: Has Choice
Voters of the Atwell box were given the choice of poll-

ing either at Cross Plains or Cottonwood.

Admiral balloting was consolidated with Putnam.

Rowden and Dudley locality voters may go to either Denton Valley or Oplin.

Will Save Money

It was pointed out that consolidation of the boxes will result in savings of around \$400

per election, part of which was necessitated by duplication in supplies, notice postings and the high-cost per capita in isolated voting. Difficulty in isolating skilled workers at election time had caused residents of some of the areas to ask the merger. The Review was told.

Eight Boxes Left

Elimination of the four boxes will reduce the total number for Callahan from 12 to eight voting precincts.

Hamby Gets Permit

Other action taken by the Commissioners Court Monday included the granting of a permit to the Hamby Water Dis-

trict to cross county roads with water mains going to rural homes, and affiliating with the Council of Governments, an organization recently formed to give West Texas a stronger voice in legislative halls at Washington. Each county pays three cents per person of its 1960 population.

Seen Any Bears Lately? Callahan Opens Season

Seen any bears lately?

Texas game laws reveal that the hunting season on bears opened in Callahan County Wednesday, Nov. 16, and will continue through Dec. 31. The bag limit is one bear per hunter per season, the statutes say.

In all counties adjoining Callahan there is no closed season or bag limit on bears. The difference comes about because Callahan County is governed by the General Hunting Laws of Texas, whereas all its neighbors are in special regulatory districts.

There is also an open hunting season on javelinas in Callahan County, but like the bears, none have been seen here during memory of the present generation.

Noted Historian Lauds Book On Callahan

B. C. Chrisman's book, *Early Days in Callahan County*, has received another favorable and valuable comment.

It came from Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, professor of history at Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene and nationally recognized author and historian of the Southwest, in a published review of the historical novel written by the Baird man.

Richardson's writings follow. Excitement and adventure marked many early days in Callahan County. When the Comanches still claimed the land it was crossed by old military roads traveled by such immortals as Albert Sidney Johnston (who owned land in the county) and Robert E. Lee.

In the late 1850's several cattlemen defied the Indians and turned their herds into the grassy prairie and creek bottoms that make up much of the county's surface.

Soon the intrepid John Hittson was setting up his camp headquarters on Battle Creek

(named for a battle); and Captain Curston even ventured across unpeopled Callahan County into Taylor County, where for awhile he maintained headquarters on the bluff overlooking Cedar Creek, just west of the site of A.C.C.

Clabe Merchant, who named Abilene, and his brother John D., were linked equally with Callahan and Taylor counties.

Still later the Western or Dodge City Cattle Trail crossed Callahan County. Fittingly four of the 360 pages that make this book are covered with cattle brands. Before the Kansas-bound herds quit coming, the Texas and Pacific Railroad crossed their trail and changed the pattern of the county. The railroad "ruined" Belle Plaine and Callahan City and founded Baird, a lusty infant from the day of its birth.

For a time it seemed that the Callahan County metropolis, with its round house and scores of railroad employees, would surpass Abilene, another husky child of the railroad, 20 miles

or more to the west, which cattlemen joined railroad men in calling "The Future Great".

County history is difficult to write. The facts must be gleaned from myriads of sources — old newspapers, public records, letters and diaries, and personal interviews. The author must be diligent enough to search out the facts, patient enough to record them, skilled enough to shape them into a unified, coherent account, and talented enough to write the story interestingly. The author of a county history must live with his subject, for history has to be a labor of love.

B. C. Chrisman meets these requirements well. He has lived in Callahan County for three quarters of a century, and he has studied and written about its history for decades.

The author has not neglected any community, any group or any phase of the county's history. Besides the story of the main course of county affairs and the history of the county of Baird, there is informa-

tion about Cross Plains, Oplin, Tecumseh, Denton, Dudley and other communities. There are sketches of pioneer families and brief biographies of such distinguished sons of the county as Captain Jeff Maltby, the ranger Indian fighter; Judge Meade F. Griffin; the author, Lewis Nordyke; J. H. Burkett, the peccan specialist; and Andrew Jackson Berry, who fought with Sam Houston.

There is an exciting incident related about two well-known English-born cattlemen of the county, G. O. Cresswell and Dick Cordwint.

There are recorded lists and rosters of various groups, making useful and prosaic information. These are offset, however, by such dramatic stories as the trial and hanging of A. Vargas for the murder of a young woman with whom he was madly in love. Thirty-two pages of illustrations make the story graphic and real. Into this interesting book Mr. Chrisman has put many enduring values and it merits a wide audience.

This column almost had another perfect week in predicting winners of county and area football games last week end. Only hitch was that it was almost 100 per cent wrong.

Just two correct choices were made in six attempts, the worst week ever to hit Ben's Grid Picks. The .333 percentage dropped the season average by 45 points to .788, 52 of 66 correct forecasts.

Mail Carriers Help In Livestock Survey

Rural mail carriers from the Cross Plains post office will leave livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 20.

Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on "Texas farms," postmaster L. L. Bryan explained. Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," Bryan said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that United States Department of Agriculture can get a true sample of the state's livestock holdings," he continued.

Carriers assisting with the survey are Morris S. Thomas, route 1, and Lee Hanke, Jr., route 2. Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and national pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

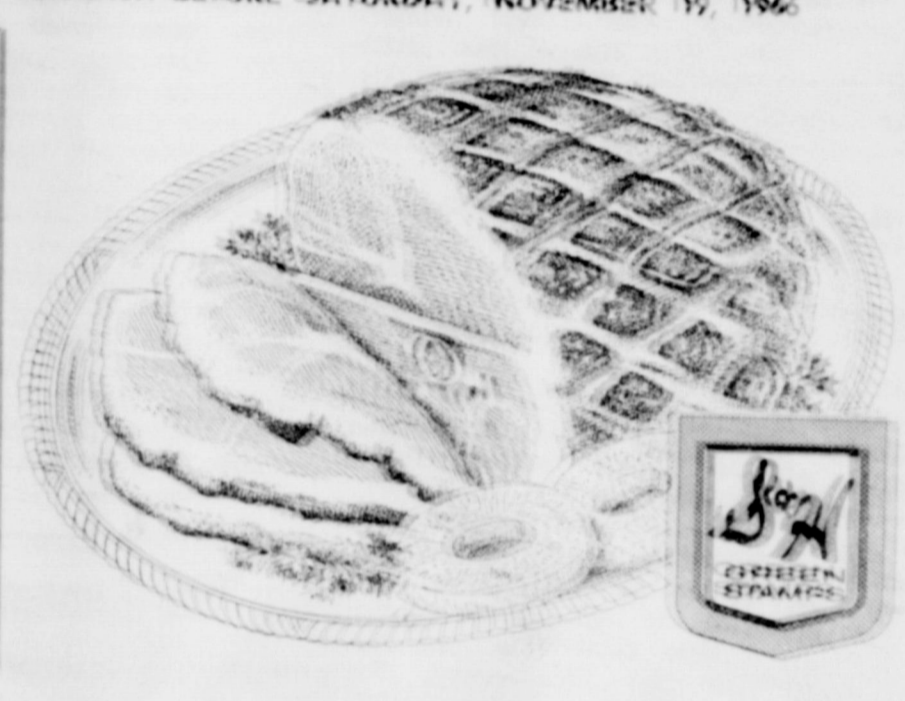

\$775,000 Loan Okayed For City Lake At Clyde

City of Clyde has received final approval on a loan to help finance a municipal water supply project which calls for adding additional storage space on a flood retention dam being constructed six miles south of the city.

Total cost to the Callahan County city will approximate \$775,000, after engineers trimmed the total cost of the project from an original \$905,000. The Texas Water Development gave its final approval Friday after the cost reduction.

First part of the project loan is set for \$297,000. The lake will be incorporated into a U. S. Soil Conservation Service dam on the Pecan Bayou Watershed.

Last month approval was withheld by the state board because it was thought that the pay-out schedule might be more than Clyde could afford. However, after the cost was reduced, the board found it financially feasible and okayed the development. Loan will be

made from state bonds issued to make loans to local subdivisions.

Military Mail Being Given Airlift Speed

Mail service from the United States to military personnel in South Viet Nam is now improved due to the incorporation of airlift facilities.

Cross Plains postmaster L. L. Bryan announced this week that all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing not more than five pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be airlifted on space available basis, to all military post offices overseas.

Under a newly-enacted statute all second class publications such as newspapers and magazines featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to armed forces in Viet Nam.

Bryan explained, however, that mail meeting the specifications heretofore stated, would be moved by surface means within the United States to the point of embarkation. All parcels falling into the category will be marked with the letters SAM, surface airlift mail, at post office acceptance.

Postmaster Bryan also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing five pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

Burkett Area Gets Oiler, Wildcat Test

An oiler has been completed in the regular field and a shallow wildcat has been staked in the Burkett area.

No. 4 B. W. Adams was finalized as a producer by J. O. Bradford of McCamey. Daily potential was five barrels of 33 gravity oil, plus 65 per cent water, pumping from open hole with four and one-half inch casing set at 350 feet. Total depth is 362 feet.

It spots 450 feet from north and 5,416 feet from the east lines of Asa Wickson Survey 168.

Ernest Cloutier of Fort Worth has staked a wildcat, No. 1 Salome H. Stevens, four miles south of Burkett. Proposed depth is 700 feet with cable tools, and it is on a 328 acre lease.

Rising Star Jinx Holds Sixth Straight Year

Luck, fate destiny or will of the supernatural smiled upon the host Rising Star Wildcats Friday night as they shellacked the Cross Plains Buffaloes 26-0.

Never in the past six years had the Wildcat jinx over the Bisons been more evident. Four times the Buffaloes threatened the hosts' goaline. The Herd crossed the double stripe three times only to lose the ball two times on fumbles and have another nullified on a penalty. A fourth quarter drive was killed at the three yard line by the clock.

The victory extended Rising Star's consecutive win string over the thundering herd to six years, and Friday's triumph earned the Wildcats third place in District 9-A. Buffs finished fourth in loop competition after the loss in the season finale with a league record of 1-3 and a season mark of 2-8.

Wildcats Dominate

Rising Star allowed Cross Plains just six offensive plays during the initial quarter of the 36th meeting of the two teams. Wildcats used the balance of the period primarily on a 60-yard touchdown drive which took 16 plays. Quarterback Danny White sneaked over the goal from about the half yard line with 3:20 left in the first stanza. A pass from White to wingback Robert Clark fell incomplete on the two-point conversion try.

Buffalo Bobbles

Cross Plains quickly regrouped forces and punctured the Wildcat goal line three times in the second quarter, but to no avail.

First play of the second chukker the Herd began its first goalward thrust. It covered 82 yards in six plays. Buff fullback Joe Pierce crashed over on a 20-yard romp, but the ball was jarred loose in the end zone, and Rising Star's fullback Dalton Hughes recovered for the hosts. Pierce gained 49 of the yards on three carries, and a 27-yard pass from quarterback Picky Jones to halfback Randy Montgomery was a key play in the blitzkrieg.

Rising Star then began to move, but Montgomery stopped the march with an interception. A roughing violation against the Wildcats, who drew 90 yards in penalties, set the Herd's second fruitless tally in motion from the Cats' 49.

Four plays later halfback Jerry Strickland burst loose for 21 yards and a score, but an illegal motion penalty nixed that play. Rising Star safety Don Claborn squashed the effort two plays later with his first of two thefts of Jones passes. Key play of the Cross Plains threat was an exceptionally fine catch of a 28-yard Buff aerial by left end Mike Bright for a first on the hosts' 28.

Buff's Try Again

Buffalo spirits were not yet broken and for a third time in the quarter Buffaloes narrowly missed paydirt. Cross Plains took a Rising Star punt on its own 33, and five plays later a repeat performance was seen of the first Buff near-touchdown. Strickland furnished fuel for the rush with a 36-yard gallop to the Wildcat 31, and a roughing penalty pushed the hoghide to the Wildcat 16. Pierce lunged for seven yards each on two carries, then fumbled at the goal line after a two-yard smash.

Rising Star iced their cake in the third frame with touchdowns on both possessions. The Wildcats took the second half opening kickoff and clawed 69 yards in seven plays. White

again sneaked across the double stripe with 8:12 showing in the third quarter. A two-point conversion failed. A 65-yard pass play from White to right end Danny Schaefer sparked the drive.

Bisons countered with a brief spurt, but Wildcat Claborn stepped in again to blunt the effort at Rising Star's 26. From that point it took 10 plays, fueled by a 43-yard gainer on a reverse by Clark, to crack the horn-of-plenty. Hughes carried in from the three, but again a two-point conversion went awry with 23 seconds left in the stanza.

Final Wildcat tally came with 3:25 left in the game after a desperate Herd failed on a fourth down gamble at the Bisons' 22. A pass form White to Clark covered 15 yards, and two plays following White again sneaked the ball into the end zone. Hughes cracked over right tackle for the two points, and Rising Star had won 26-0.

Future Hopes

Coaching staff then offered fans a look into a hopeful future. The alternate Buffalo unit got the call and promptly picked up four first downs, sustaining a 63-yard march in 11 plays. Keys in the drive were two completed passes, 11 and 15 yards, from quarterback Rusty Beggs to end James McMillan. The final toss was stopped at the Wildcat three as

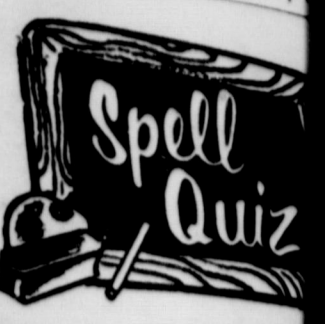
