

Over Cent Of All Cross Plains School Taxes Paid By 10 Property Owners

Most property owners within the 400 square miles of Cross Plains School District pay approximately 20 per cent of taxes levied by the political subdivision.

The total valuation of the district was \$4,100,000 for 1967. Estimated population of the area is 2,294. Net bonded debt of \$150,888 is rated as A-1.

Despite fluctuations in oil activities within the Cross Plains area, the district's total renditions have remained uncommonly uniform. Since 1962 the lowest total evaluation was \$4,001,098, and the highest was \$4,102,107. Valuation for 1967 was only \$2,107 below the peak year.

Principal and interest payments on bonded indebtedness have been current since 1943, when the district was refunded at a lower interest rate.

Cross Plains schools levy a \$1.50 tax. Of this amount \$1.15 goes for local maintenance, and the remaining 35 cents for interest and sinking funds. Local officials believe school taxes are lower here than in most adjoining districts.

School Big Business

Evidencing that education is big business the local school's annual budget runs around \$235,581. Based on 176 days instruction in the system, figures reveal that the cost of one day's operation exceeds \$1,330. About 30 per cent of this is paid by local taxation, and the remainder through state and federal grants.

Included within the big local payroll are some 26 instructors and approximately 15 other employees, mostly on a part-time basis. Ten buses make two runs each day in transporting 276 students about 700 miles to and from classes.

Punctual Payments

Property owners of Cross Plains Independent School District have maintained a record for punctuality. More than 80 per cent are paid between October and February each year, leaving less than 10 per cent ever to be entered on delinquent rolls.

Tax assessor-collector for the local school district is Mrs. A. J. McQuin, and annual audits of all funds received and disbursed by the political subdivision are made by the certified public accounting firm of Condeley, Morphew & Company of Abilene.

There are 500 students currently enrolled in the Cross Plains school system. Average daily attendance during January was 483, according to a recent report by Superintendent Wayne Ford.

Guns Stolen As 2 Firms Robbed

Two Cross Plains firms were robbed over the week end. A break-in at the Higginbotham store was discovered Sunday morning, and burglary of the Western Auto Store was found Monday.

Entrance to the Higginbotham building was gained by cutting glass in a door near the southeast corner, permitting robbers to reach inside and activate the night latch. The Western Auto Store was entered through the front door. The lock had been prized with a metal bar.

Deputy Sheriffs Howard Cox of Cross Plains and C. S. (Hoot) McGowen of Baird and Texas

Ranger Sid Merchant of Abilene, who are working on the case, said that three rifles, a shotgun and rifle shells taken at Higginbotham's had a value of approximately \$246, and that "the job bore the earmarks of a professional".

The officers reported four rifles, two shotguns and \$15 in currency taken from Western Auto Store. Total loss there was estimated at \$183.68.

Only one gun stolen in the two break-ins was said to have a serial number, a detail which Merchant attributed to the liking of a professional thief.

Some characteristics of the Cross Plains burglaries were said to have resembled a similar incident at Winters, where a large quantity of guns, mainly rifles, were stolen from a hardware store.

Recent theft of a pistol from a farm home near Cross Plains has also been reported to local officers, however, it was not believed that any connection existed between that theft and the ones of stores here over the week end.

12 Indictments By 42nd Grand Jurors

Twelve true bills were returned by 42nd District Court grand jury in session at Baird Friday.

List of indictments included three for burglary against Cross Plains area men, six counts of felony theft, including five against local residents, and three charges of second offense driving-while-intoxicated.

Court procedure in Baird last week also resulted in conviction of three Cross Plains area minors, two for burglary and one for theft, in county court.

A one-year probated sentence was decreed in each instance.

One Cross Plains area man was no-billed by grand jurors.

Candidates filed in bunches over the week end in a race to beat the shut-off date Monday at midnight.

A. E. Dyer, Jr., of Baird, Callahan Democratic chairman, was probably the county's busiest man Monday as prospective office-seekers came and went, some to file and others to eventually decide against it.

This is the first year in which all prospective voters have been required to pre-register. Heretofore, voters over 60 years of age, who lived in counties of less than 10,000 population were not required to register.

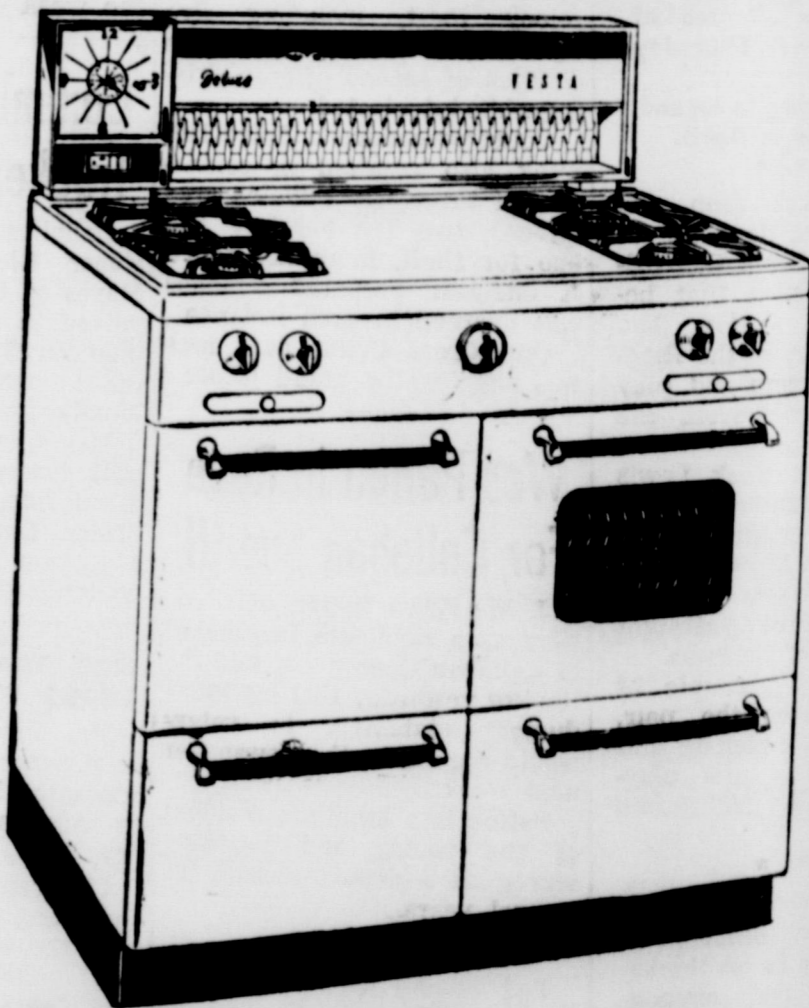
