

Bufs, Cats Gain Opening LL Wins

Defending champion Bufs and 1967 runners-up Cats took opening game victories in a rain-shortened first week of Cross Plains Little League competition.

A parade and opening ceremonies preceded the first game of the season Tuesday of last week, but Thursday night's scheduled double-header was washed out in early stages of the first game.

Cats won a scoring duel over the Beadels, 17-12, in the curtain raiser. The victors jumped off to a one-run lead in the top of the first, but Beadels tied the score in the home half of the second. Cat Roger Crawford hit the first home run of the season, a three-run clout, for a 4-1 advantage.

Beadels, however, again knot-

ted the score in the third. Cats retaliated with 11 in the fourth which was highlighted by Tim Bishop's three-run homer to left-center field. Beadels countered, but Cats put the game out of reach with three more in the sixth. Beadel Ricky Purvis led his unit at the plate with three singles and two walks in five at bats.

In the nightcap Bufs pushed seven runs across in first half-inning, and had built an 11-run margin before Kilowatts broke the ice for seven runs in the fourth frame. Game was called at that point because of time limit rule.

Buff Jerry Lewis hurled the first three innings of shut-out ball, allowing only two hits along the way. He was the winner, and Calvin Corley and

Royce Lawrence worked in the fourth. Buff Bruce Lawrence poled the night's third home run, a solo blast in the second inning. Brad Bowden paced Kilowatt hitters with two singles and a double in three appearances at the plate.
