SIXTIETH YEAR

1,500 Votes Forecast In County For Runoff

Although the ballot will be short for the Democratic runoff primary scheduled June 1, interest is not lagging in Callahan County.

A spirited contest between Preston Smith and Don Yarborough for the governorship promises to be the dominant factor in bringing Democratic voters back to the polls four weeks after first primary. There is also much local interest, though, in a race between Grayson Miller, who led the first primary by 262 votes, and Homer Price, incumbent, for the Callahan County sheriff's post.

Two other run-offs are scheduled in the county. In com-

missioner's precinct one C. Lee Smith and Irvin Corn are in a run-off after beating five other candidates in the first primary. Another run-off is carded in Baird for constable. In that contest Glen Curtis, who polled 323 votes in the first primary, is pitted against Glen Boyd, who tallied 243.

Total vote in Callahan County at the first primary was just over 2,500, including absentees. Well-informed sources expect about 60 per cent of that number, or 1,500, to be tallied in the June 1 run-off.

There will be no run-off election for Callahan County Republicans.

Rising Living Costs Hit Budgets Of All Callahan County Families

How much is the average family in Callahan County spending these days for the basic necessities of living — food, clothing and shelter? Approximately \$2,500 per year.

How much does it have left, after those outlays and after taxes, for other spending? About \$1,890.

These estimates are based upon national surveys by the Labor Department and other agencies to determine what changes, if any, have been taking place in family budgeting.

Although prices have gone up considerably in the local area in recent years, as they have elsewhere, it appears that Callahan County families have more money at their disposal today, after providing for the necessities, than they ever had.

This is the case despite the fact that they have upgraded their tastes and standards of living and are, therefore, spending more for these necessities.

Oil Pours \$6 Million Yearly Into Callahan

Oil and gas wells provide approximately \$6 million a year of Callahan County's economic output, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Based on most recent U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, the Association compilation showed that Callahan County produced crude oil valued at \$5.8 million in 1966 and natural gas worth \$227,000.

Texas oil production in 1967, responding to demands for more domestic crude as a result of the Israeli-Arab conflict, totaled 1,050,000,000 barrels, a statewide increase over 1966 of about 5 percent. Production last year varied widely among state Railroad Commission districts, however, ranging from 3.5 percent below 1966 to 15 percent above.

"Production from Callahan County last summer helped prevent any oil scarcity for U. S. consumers at a time when one-third of the world's supply was cut off," said Corbin J. Robertson, Houston, Association president. "We must keep in mind, however, that it may be difficult for Texas fields to sustain production in future emergencies if the discovery of new re-

serves lag, due to lack of exploratory drilling."

The annual study showed that Callahan County ranked 118th among Texas counties in total value of its production of some 1.9 million barrels of oil and 1.7 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas oil men, according to Rinehart's yearbook, drilled 91 wells in the county risking some \$1.6 million. Sixty-two per cent of them were dry holes, costing about \$900,000.

County landowners and others with mineral interests cashed royalty checks totaling about \$751,000 during the year. Likewise, the county's flow of oil and gas generates \$282,000 a year in production taxes paid by producers and royalty owners to the state treasury.

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 69 persons directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county, with an annual payroll of \$226,000.

Plants which convert crude oil and natural gas into useful products also add to the value of a county's output. The Oil and Gas Journal lists two gas processing plants, with a total capacity of 9 million cubic feet a day for the county.

Strickland, a senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strickland, was active in three school-sponsored sports during the 1967-68 year. He was an all-district performer in both football and basketball, and was the best broad jumper in District 9-A. He placed seventh in state competition in that event, and ran second in the 100 and 200-yard dashes in the league meet. He also anchored the 440-yard relay team.

Miss Renfro and Miss Edington, both seniors, shared the "Outstanding Girl Athlete of the Year" laurel.

Miss Edington, daughter of

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Edington, was named to the all-district basketball team and all-tournament team at Comanche. She led Buffette scoring last season with 623 points. She was also an outstanding track performer, specializing in relays.

Miss Renfro, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Renfro, won several high places in district track, and was honorable mention all-district eager. She was second high Buffette scorer with 547 points.

Names of the specially honored athletes will be engraved on a trophy which is kept permanently in the high school.

The Rev. Wm. (Bill) Tolar of Fort Worth was speaker for the event, and James Paul Shanks, Callahan County attorney, was master of ceremonies.

In addition to her FHA activities, she is a member of the National Honor Society and Ski Club. She enjoys sewing and home decoration.

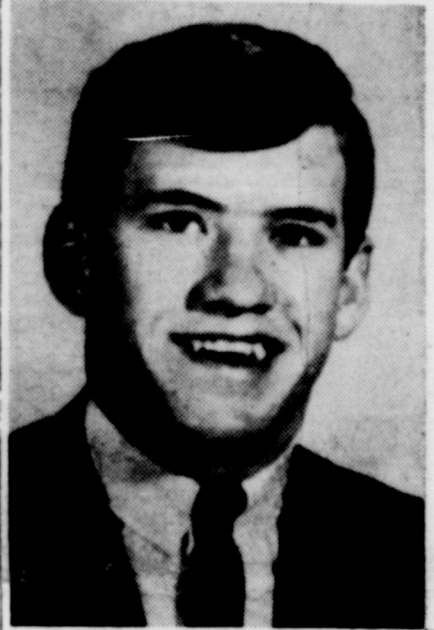

Sidelight On Schooldays

(An Editorial)

So much stress is placed on athletics in American schools that one sometimes wonders if the true function of the educational system is not relegated to secondary importance.

This is not a peculiarity, or fault, of any particular school. The practice is nationwide and patrons and adult leaders are more responsible than are teachers and trustees. Nearly any football fan can remember the name and number of the gridiron gladiator who scored the winning touchdown in an all-important game 30 years ago. But who can recall the names of valedictorians and salutatorians of only a few years back? Have not these students excelled equally as much?

Scholarship is the primary function of an educational institution and the sooner its rewards are accompanied by the awe and admiration heaped upon star athletes, the sooner will investments in education bear proper dividends.

By all standards of measurement there is little difference in the intelligence of boys and girls. Yet only 27 percent of the top students the past 30 years have been boys. Is the big stress on boys athletics responsible for this imbalance?

Only twice in 30 years have both the valedictorian and salutatorian at Cross Plains High School been boys, whereas girls claimed both distinctions in 15 of the years. Is there that much difference in the I. Q. and general attitude of the sexes?

Newspaper chronicle columns upon columns about the doings on the basketball courts, football gridirons and other playing fields, but make scant mention of the academic stalwarts. It seems therefore fitting, that tribute be paid to Cross Plains "stars of the classrooms" over the last 37 years.

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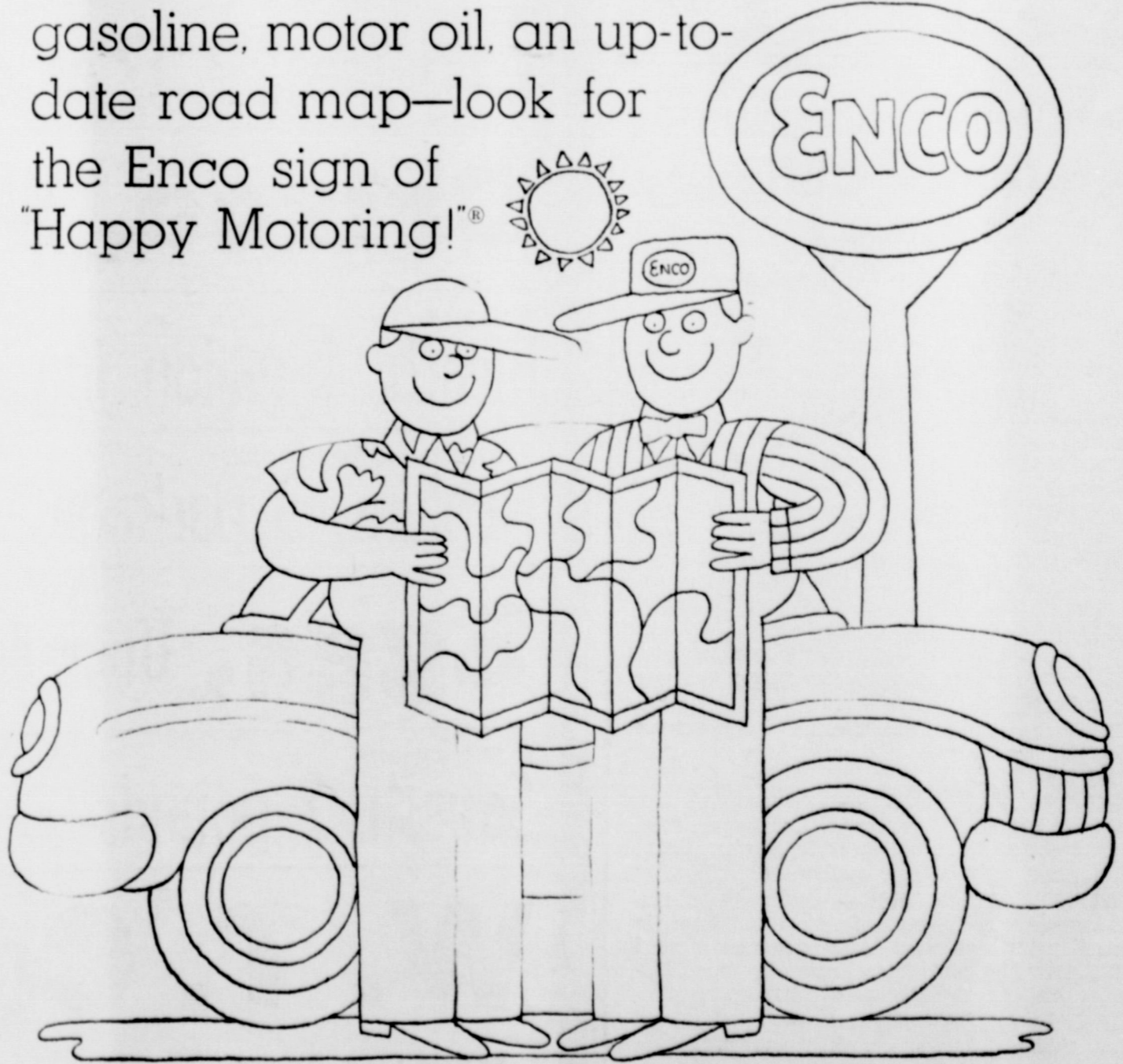

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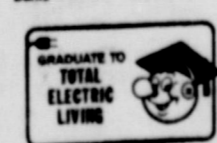

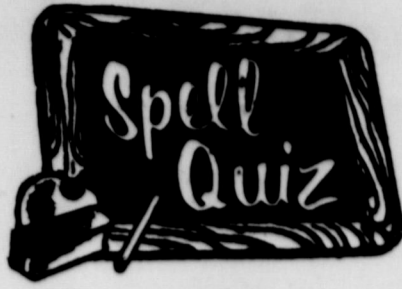
