> Measles vaccine will be offered in about tour weeks, and is to be given to all children nine months of age who have not had the measles vaccine or regular (red) measles. Present plans are for measles vaccine to be given at the office of City Health Officer, Dr. Carl J. Sohns on Aug. 20 and 21.
