Jackson, Spencer Lead Old Settlers

One thermometer in Cross Plains, consistently close to official weather bureau readings, registered 98 degrees Friday afternoon, hottest reading thus far this summer.

Yearly Meeting

Callahan pioneers voted to hold the gathering yearly in a business meeting that afternoon. One suggestion was to have the affair every two years. The pioneers approved a

slate of officers selected by the nominating committee.

J. Rupert Jackson, Jr. of Baird was named president for the ensuing year. Frank Spencer of Cross Plains was elected vice-president, and Mrs. B. L. Boydston of Baird was reelected secretary and treasurer. I. G. Mobley of Putnam is the outgoing president. Jackson was advanced from vice-president.

375 Register

Days activities began with registration at 9:30 a.m., and 375 old settlers signed and were presented ribbons. Master of ceremonies duties during the day were shared by B. H. Freeland and James Paul Shanks of Baird and Randall Jackson of Abilene.

Following usual opening ceremonies, Freeland led a silent tribute to deceased pioneers. Rupert Jackson introduced Dale King of Anson, administrative assistant to Cong. Omar Burleson, who made a political talk. An address was also given by Jim Ashlock, regional official for Eastern Airlines in Washington, D. C., who was born and raised in Baird. He reminisced of bygone days, and historical Callahan County events. He was originally invited to be the principal speaker, but declined stating conflicting interests at that time.

Basket lunches were spread at noon under the shady oaks at the park.

Award Winners

Shortly after beginning of the afternoon session, at 2 o'clock, masters of ceremonies recognized pioneers winning personal awards.

Cross Plains and area residents claimed the bulk of "earliest" presentations. B. D. (Barry) Bell of this city was noted in two divisions, earliest cowboy in county and earliest pioneer man. The 88-year-old has lived in and around Cross Plains and this county almost all his life.

M. P. Wilcoxon of Cottonwood, who came here in 1888, was recognized as the oldest man with continuous residence in the county.

Mrs. Louella (Cox) Childress Knox of Houston, who came to Callahan in 1885, won the earliest pioneer woman title and came the greatest distance of any other lady attending the reunion.

Presented as the oldest native born man was John A. Burks of Girard, who was born in May 1886, and oldest native born woman, in 1883, was Mrs. Martha Holley of Merkel, formerly of Cottonwood.

Oldest native born man with continuous residence in county went to J. P. (Perry) Purvis of Cross Plains, who was born in 1888.

Wyatt Robinson of Los Angeles, Calif., was the man coming greatest distance to attend the reunion.

Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams of Cross Plains took both couple married longest with continuous residence in county and couple married longest awards. They repeated marriage vows in Cross Plains Dec. 25, 1913.

The day's activities were rounded out with an old fiddler's contest, and square dancing for pioneers.

Cross Plains Riding Club presented a show for the old settlers that night at the arena just west of the park.

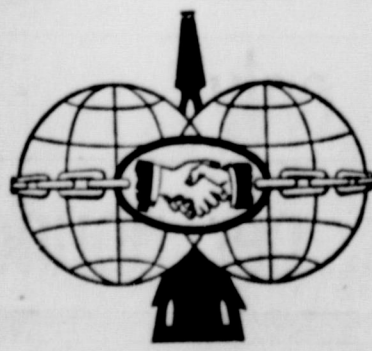

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation of any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to such families and individuals who are unable to obtain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation of other services for: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall be residing within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years; (4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children. The Legislature may define

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include in any one year of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows: "Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law. (b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas." BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVII, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in this subsection authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state. "There is hereby created as
