Students Receive On-Job Training

Cross Plains High School began a pilot program Monday offering trades and industry training to senior students who have expressed a desire for the work experience.

Fourteen students, to be closely supervised by school counselors and administrators, will pioneer the project. It is being instituted here without the benefit of federal subsidy. Superintendent of Schools Wayne Ford said yesterday that purpose of the undertaking is to help youngsters get and hold jobs. The trades and industry training is being offered to students who have no immediate plans for college.

"We would like to graduate boys and girls a little better equipped to fit into the busi-

ness community," Ford said.

Students assigned this week and the concerns where they will train are as follow: Larry Campbell and Stanley Goble, Cox Super-Market; Janice Pittman, Neal's Drug Store; Mary Dominguez, JRB Supermarket; Jean Falkner, Settle's Cleaners; Billy King, Lane's Variety Store; Danny McGowen, Cross Plains Review; Tommy Burks, Higginbothams; Richard Lee, Souder Grocery.

Students to be assigned later this week include Benny Free, Andy Johnson, Kathy Payne and Rosalea Grider.

Students will devote two class periods daily to their on-the-job training sites, subject to periodic adjustments of school officials.

Peanut And Cotton Quota Votes Slated

As Cross Plains area producers enter final days of the greatest peanut harvest on record, announcement is made by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that acreage allotments are now being established for 1969.

Notice of the farm allotment, together with a ballot for a referendum on marketing quotas, will be mailed to each local producer prior to the Dec. 26 voting time.

This is the first time that a peanut marketing quota refer-

endum has been held by mail. Ballots must be returned to the ASCS office in the county in which the farm is located no later than Dec. 6.

These are the same dates as for the cotton referendum. Farmers who have both peanut and cotton programs will receive three ballots. Marketing quotas are to be balloted on for upland cotton and extra-long staple cotton as well as for peanuts. Farmers are cautioned to be sure to place the correct ballot in the particular envelope designated for delivery to the counting office. Producers may deliver their ballots to their county ASCS office in person if they desire.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve quotas,

the quotas will go into effect for the next three crops of peanuts, marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" peanuts produced on the farm (in instances where a farmer exceeds his acreage allotment), and price support on the crop will be available at the full announced level.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers voting oppose quotas, the quotas and marketing penalties will not be in effect for the 1969 crop, but allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support — which will then be available at 50 per cent of parity. In this event, another referendum would be held next year for the following three peanut crops.

Winford Gardner of Eula will again head Callahan County Farm Bureau. He was reelected president of the organization at a meeting of the board of directors Thursday night of last week.

Other officers chosen for the ensuing year include: Joe Ingram of Cross Plains, first vice-president; Wendell Smith of Baird, second vice-president; and W. J. Hanaford of Clyde, secretary-treasurer.

spot for growth in District VII. In recognition of the achievement a set of automobile tires was presented to Callahan FB by the state organization. A trophy, denoting a significant five-year gain, was also presented to the Callahan FB.

Postmaster Urges Early Mailings For Christmas

"More mail than ever before for a like period in all history will be mailed between now and Christmas," said R. C. (Dick) Brown, Cross Plains postmaster, Saturday.

He urged local postal patrons to become "Early Birds" by mailing holiday packages now.

"The postal service can handle the unusually heavy load of mail," Brown continued, "if parcels, cards and other pieces are deposited early and plainly addressed with ZIP codes."

Packages should be wrapped without rattles," Brown cautioned.

New postal rates have eliminated the lower rate for greeting cards weighing an ounce or

less. All regular Christmas cards, therefore, now require the 5-cent rate.
