A (Toad) Baucom had a turkey hunt interrupted by a rattler last Thursday and vowed to get revenge. He did so Sunday. Taking along Cross Cut

Baptist pastor Cecil Dunning. Bransford Eubank and Raymond Markham, he led the group to where he had seen a large rattlesnake three days before. It was at a spot in the Merlin Garrett pasture, about two miles northeast of Cross Cut.

Twenty-five large snakes were flushed from a rocky hillside. All were captured alive by Eubank, who had fashioned a loop on the end of a stiff wire. As the deadly reptiles were hooked they were dropped into a sack and

He explained, however, that the 26th snake got a full blast from a shotgun, not a trip to Eubank's cellar.

Baucom says that in the past three years he and friends have killed 105 snakes in the same general locality.
