### **Chief Leads Local Fire Company** In Answering 60 Alerts In 1968

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department answered 60 alarms in 1968, and J. T. (Travis) Foster, chief of the company, reported 41 times, more than any other fireman. Jack W. Tunnell, chief of the rural truck, was close behind with 40.

Excessively wet weather in the early part of the year kept the usually minor grass fires at a minimum. Only 11 alerts were heeded during the first six months of 1968, but as the year progressed business picked up. Firemen anwered 49 alarms during the last half-year with 17 of those coming in December. Not one siren was sounded in April, and only one was reported in May and June.

The 60 sirens in 1968 was a drop of three under the previous year, reversing the trend of more yearly which had begun in 1965 after 81 runs were made in 1963.

An almost even division of city and rural fires was recorded last year. Thirty-one blazes were extinguished within corporate limits of Cross Plains, and 29 calls came from surrounding coutryside.


### Cross Plains Finds **Odd Years Wettest**

Despite the fact that 1968 was the second wettest year in the past two decades there is reason to believe that 1969 may bring even greater rainfall.

Going back to 1948, the odd numbered years have seen more rain at Cross Plains than the even numbered years. In fact the 21-year recordings show about an average of 21.50 inches for the even numbered years and 26.16 for the odd ones.






