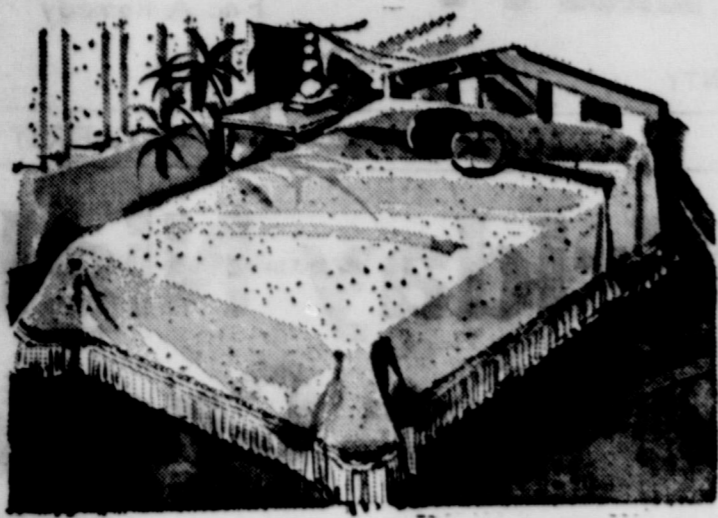

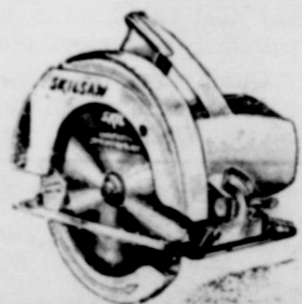

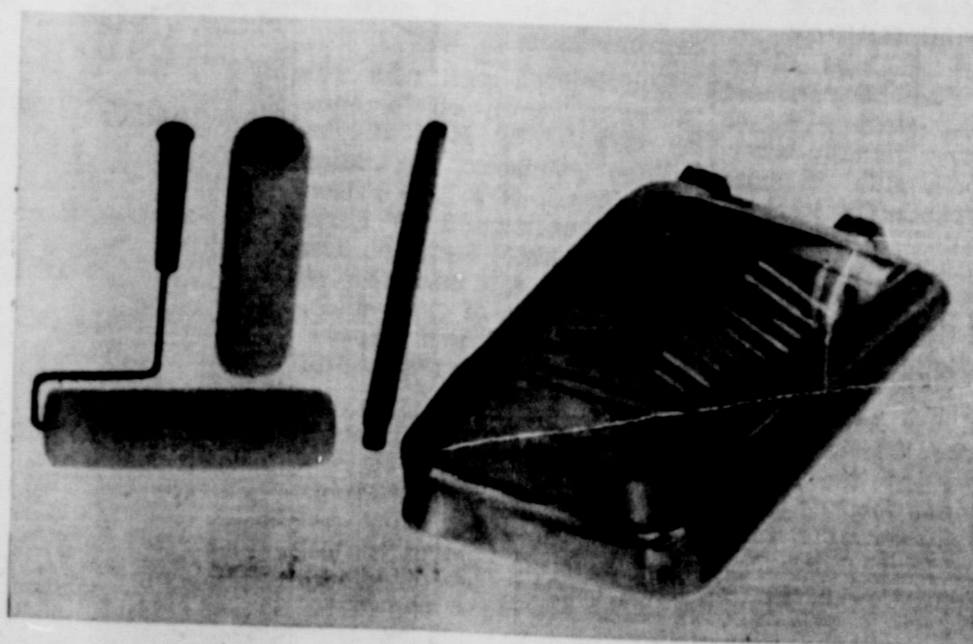

Herd Belts Santa Anna 28-7 For First Victory

Cross Plains Buffaloes used a crushing ground attack in claiming their first football victory of the season Friday night. The Herd amassed 332 net yards rushing in whipping Santa Anna 28-7 in the District 9-A opener for both teams.

Although the running attack was by far the Bisons best this season, it took a long run on a screen pass in the waning seconds of the first half to break the host Mountaineer defense. Cross Plains moved the ball well in major portion of the first half, but four lost fumbles blunted promising drives.

The season's first triumph in five starts, was the Herd's first win on the road since Oct. 14, 1967, when the Herd nipped Bangs 16-15.

Buff's third play from scrimmage the fumble bug bit, and Mountaineer Tackle Perry Nolan recovered. Hosts moved to the Buff 24 where Larry Bishop pounced on a loose ball for the Herd. Following an exchange of punts, Cross Plains moved just over 40 yards to the Santa Anna 25 where Mountie Raymond Valdez smothered another one, and later Buffaloes marched 42 yards to the Mountaineer 25 where another miscue foiled the drive. A few seconds later Bisons lost another on the Mountie 33.

Santa Anna then cranked up its longest drive of the night, 71 yards, to the Buff six. Bison defense stiffened and forced Mountaineer Danny Williams to attempt a field goal which was blocked.

Buffaloes Score

Cross Plains then mounted a passing attack, completing three, two to Lef End James McMillan for 17 and one to Wingback Leslie Cowan for 10. With just a few seconds remaining, Quarterback Ronnie Pancke flipped a screen pass to McMillan. He eluded a trio of defenders and then outran pursuers remainder of the 68 yards, crossing the double stripe with seven seconds left in the first half. A pass fell incomplete on the conversion try.

Cross Plains came back from intermission with renewed aggression and rung up 14 more points in the third quarter. The period started like the first, though, as Buffs lost a fumble on first play from scrimmage, but an almost blocked punt put Bisons in possession at the Herd's 42.

In 13 plays Buffaloes had another touchdown with 4:48 left in the third canto. Leslie Cowan got the final yard of the ground attack over left guard, but Bobby Cowan was stopped on a two-point conversion try.

McMillan's blocking of a Santa Anna punt set the third scoring drive in motion at the Herd's 48. Bobby Cowan culminated the four-play blitzkrieg with a 30-yard gallop which he started up the middle and then slanted right. Pancake then threw a strike to Leslie Cowan for two bonus points and a 20-0 lead with 58 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Santa Anna took a short punt for possession at the Bison 25 early in the fourth quarter. Seven plays later Quarterback Ricky Beal skirted right end from four yards out for the tally. Williams kicked the point bringing the score to 20-7 with 7:3 remaining in the game.

A Santa Anna on-side kick failed, and Cross Plains took the pigskin on its 42. Nine plays later Tailback Steve Fortune cracked up the middle for the final three yards of the ground-oriented drive. Pancake again found Leslie Cowan with an aerial for the two-point conversion with 4:35 left.

Santa Anna mounted a brief drive, but Buffs held for downs at the Herd's 35. Buffs were again driving as the last second ticked away.

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

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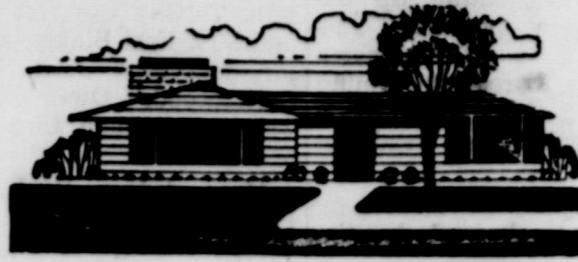
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Field Rats Invade Rowden Gardens

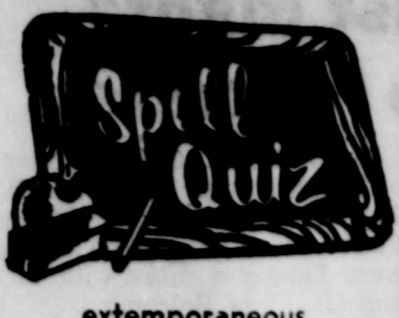
