Schools Close Friday For 2 Weeks Recess

Cross Plains schools will dismiss Friday afternoon at 2:30 for two full weeks of Christmas vacation. Wayne Ford, superintendent, said yesterday that classes will resume the morning of Jan. 5, 1970. Students will return to school that Monday and mid-term examinations are slated for the following Thursday and Friday.

Enrollment Monday stood at 459. School administrators expect no significant change after Christmas. "We know we will lose one family with two students and that another with five school-age youngsters is moving in," Ford said.

Present plans call for the 1969-70 school year to close with graduation exercises on the night of May 19. Ford pointed out, though, that the date will be delayed if there are interruptions because of bad weather.

Most local teachers plan to spend the majority of the yuletide recess in Cross Plains. Several, though, plan to take Christmas dinner elsewhere.

Appointment of Jim Fleming of Pioneer as assistant agricultural agent for Brown County was unanimously approved by the Brown County Commissioners Court in weekly session Monday.

Fleming, a former assistant agent at Guadalupe County from November of 1968 to August of 1969, is at present employed by Mooreman's Manufacturing Co. at Comanche.

He is a 1968 graduate of Tarleton State College, where he received a BS degree in general agriculture. A native of Pioneer, he graduated from Cross Plains High School.

Fleming will assume the Brown County post Jan. 1. He was introduced to the commissioners court Monday morning by John Burleson, district agent for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. Fleming will fill the spot vacated by Dwight Harkey, who left for a tour of duty with the armed forces Nov. 30.

Fleming is married to the former Charlene Vermillion formerly of Rising Star, and the couple has a son, Alan, five months old.

Sabanno Watershed Gets U. S. Approval

Congressman Omar Burleson advised by telegram this week that approval had been secured in Washington for the Soil Conservation Service to provide technical assistance for a work plan covering 202,000 acres in the Sabanno River watershed, covering parts of this and two other counties.

Burleson's telegram to this newspaper read as follows: "Pleased to announce Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service planning authorization just approved to give technical and financial assistance to organized groups of farmers living in Sabanno River watershed where drought and serious soil erosion causing damage. Project embraces 202,000 acres located in Comanche, Eastland and Callahan Counties, sponsored by Comanche County Commissioners Court, Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District, Eastland County Commissioners Court and Lower Clear Fork of the Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District. Soil Conservation Service will provide technical assistance to sponsors in developing work plan to cover solution to problems this area. When work plan completed will be submitted through regular channels for an authorization for operations."

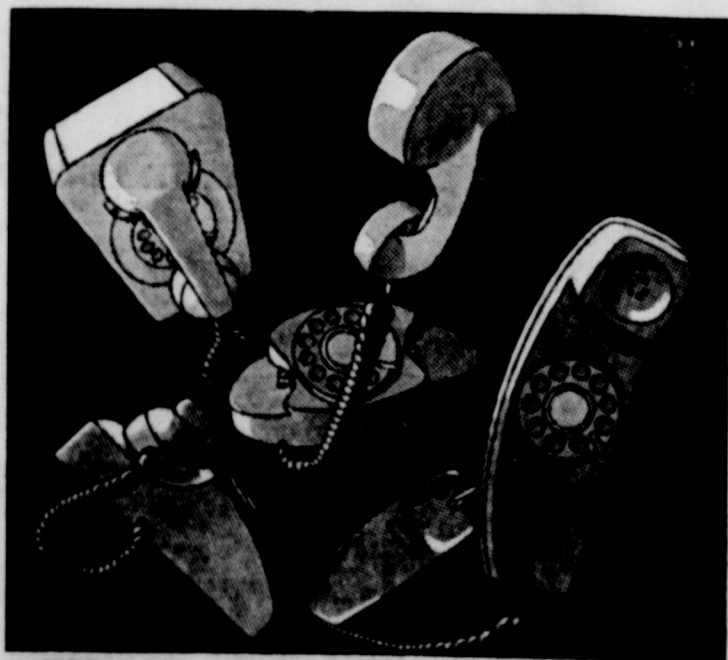

Cotton farms with allotments of 10 acres or less, or those in which the yield times the allotment does not exceed 3,600 pounds, are classified as small farms. Special provisions in next year's Department of Agriculture cotton program provides for a subsidy to be made these producers. It is based on 11.95 cents per pound times yield times 35 per cent of the allotment. The payment is in addition to that which will be earned on planted acreage. In order to take advantage of this provision, producers must sign up and participate in next year's cotton program.

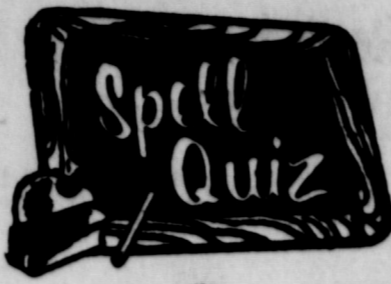

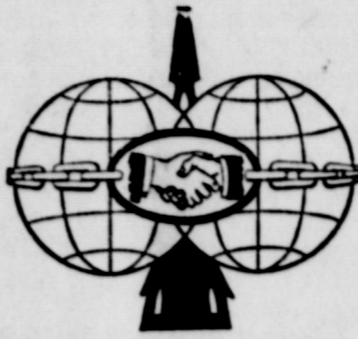
