



Prew House At Clyd Gets Historical Meda

Callahan County has been awarded another historical 24.18 marker by the Texas State His-15.14 torical Committee. It is the 19.46 Prew House in Clyde.

Dedication of the marker will 18.01 be announced by B. C. Chris-38.58 man of Baird, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee.

The designation of the Prew House as a Recorded Texas Historical Landmark, was announced by Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president the the state historical committee, who heralded the building "significant to the history of community and state, and worthy of preservation".

As a result of meeting TSHSC requirements for the high offical designation, the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate giving a capsule of history of the structure will be affixed to it. The inscription on the marker reads as follows.
