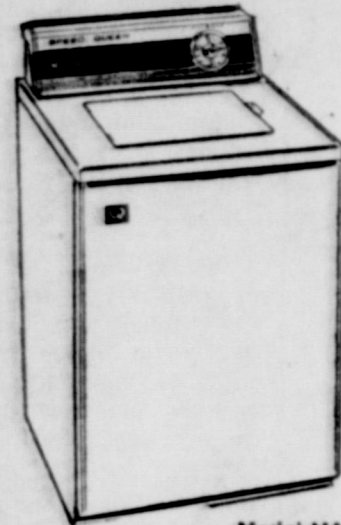

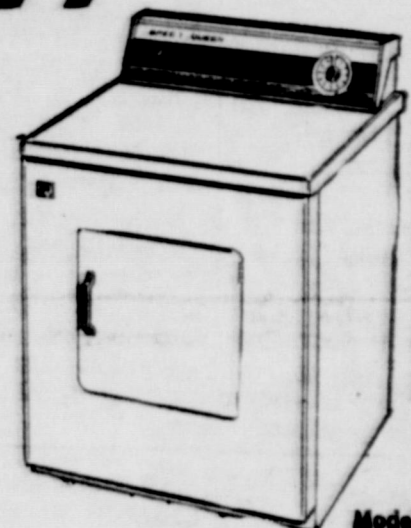

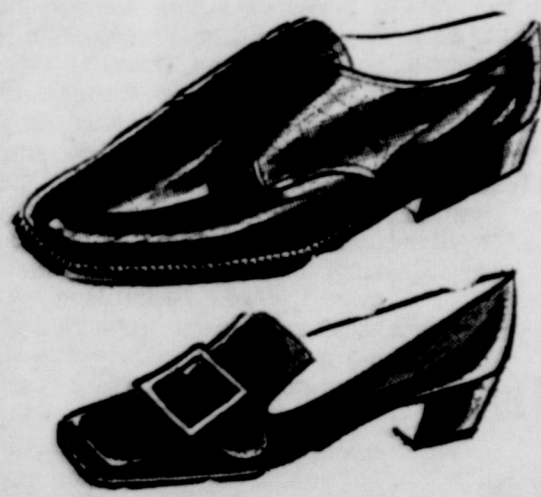

NEWS NOTES CONCERNING FORMER AREA RESIDENTS

From Billy Parker Baum, a Cross Plains native, comes an interesting letter describing oil production in the Arabian Gulf region, where he is employed by Santa Fe Drilling Company.

Excerpts from his letter follows: "We are drilling for the Dhabhi Petroleum Company as well as operating all transportation of the drilling equipment. The rigs we are using are diesel electric with 1,320 National draw-works, mounted on Lee C. Moore substructures, with one million pound jack-knife derricks. The rigs are powered by Cat (4) 345 series engines pulling 500 horse power generators. Everything is up-to-date with the exception of computerized panels. Each rig is equipped with two 1,000 Emeco pumps. We are now drilling about 50 kilometers from Abu Dhabi, offsetting an offshore location which produces in excess of 10,000 barrels of pipeline oil daily. These wells will flow through casing with very little gas. We drill a 26-inch hole to 400 feet, then set 20-inch casing going to a 17 1/2-inch hole to 4,500, where we set 13 3/8 casing and then carry a 12 1/4-inch hole to 9,000 feet. From there we drill a reduced hole or set 9 5/8 casing. The production comes in about 12,000 feet. They have about 90 of these wells in production and we are still exploring. We live in a camp some 1,000 feet from the rig, have house servants to clean rooms and do our laundry. Our cooks are imported and our mess halls feature the finest food. Say hello to my friends around Cross Plains."

Area South Of Cross Cut Gets New Oiler

What promises to be one of the better oil strikes made in this section of Texas is now being developed in the area west of May and six miles southeast of Cross Cut.

An outpost to the field was completed last week by O. P. Leonard of Fort Worth on the Henry Orr acreage. The well which potentialed 50 barrels of 40 gravity oil daily is 2,700 feet from the south and 1,450 feet from the west lines of J. F. Roberts Survey 479 in Brown County. Production is from the Caddo limestone, through perforations at 1,925-35 feet.

The well is located two miles north of comparatively new Marble Falls production and is 2,000 feet south of gas production in the Jones & Lewis field.
