## CLYDE HAS FIVE ON 8-AA DISTRICT BASKETBALL TEAMS

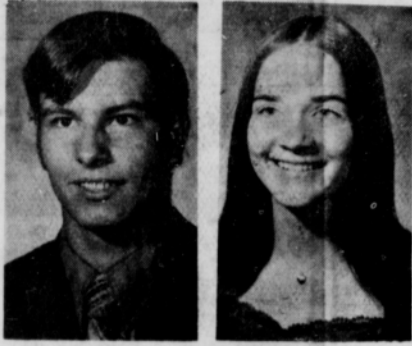

## SMALL SCHOOLS ORGANIZED NEW DISTRICT WEDNESDAY

**PUTNAM** — In a meeting at Cisco Junior College on Wednesday morning, R. W. Reynolds, superintendent of the Putnam Schools, was elected to

serve as chairman of a newly organized district of the Texas Small Schools Project.

Superintendents from Gorman, Carbon and Moran were also present, along with Dale Carmichael from the Texas Education Agency and Bob Manless from the Region XIV Education Service Center.

All schools represented are members of the Region XIV Small Schools Project which has been meeting at Rule in Haskell County. The new district was organized as a convenience to the schools in the southeast part of Region XIV.

The Putnam School was one of the 17 original pilot schools of the Texas Small Schools Project which was organized in 1960 to help the small schools of Texas keep pace with modern trends in education.

Reynolds is a firm believer in the project and feels that without it, many small schools still operating would not exist today.

## Cross Plains School District Supports Board Almost 10-1

**CROSS PLAINS** — First hurdle in rebuilding Cross Plains Elementary School was cleared Feb. 15, when voters of the district overwhelmingly approved issuance of bonds up to \$180,000 and an assessment of a 30 cent maintenance tax to retire the bonds.

Both propositions passed by a margin of almost 10 to 1.

Alton E. Hornsby, election judge, reported the following results:

Issue on the levying of a maintenance tax, thought to be about 30 cents per \$100 valuation, to pay off the bonds, was okayed by taxpayers, those with property duly rendered in the district, 397 for to 46 against. Non-taxpaying qualified electors approved the proposition 9 for and 1 against.

Proposition calling for issuance of bonds up to \$180,000 was passed by the taxpaying electorate on a count of 404 for and 37 against. Other qualified voters okayed the bond proposition by 11 for and 1 against. Total vote was 458.

Cross Plains Board of Trustees has set up remaining work to be done in an orderly, step-by-step manner.

Two of those steps are already underway. George Buescher of Abilene, bondsman for the district, will be in New York this week to have bonds rated. That, according to Wayne Ford, superintendent, will make the bonds more saleable and should have money on interest.

The other step currently being done is the drawing up of complete blueprints by the district's architect, Don Hampton.

## Brother, Nephew of Putnam Man Receives Severe Burns

**BURKETT** — Bill Hunter and son, Ken Hunter, of the Burkett community, suffered severe burns in a tractor fire Sunday afternoon about 3 o'clock. Mishap occurred at the family farm home about seven miles northwest of Burkett.

Ken, 12-year-old Cross Plains school seventh grader, was apparently the most seriously burned in the accident. It was learned Monday afternoon that he had been airlifted to Brooke Army Medical Center for treatment in the burn center there. A helicopter reportedly picked him up in Coleman about 2 p. m. Monday.

It was reported that Ken suffered first, second and third degree burns over 80 per cent of his body.

The father was still in Coleman Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital late Monday with at least third degree burns on his hands and arms. His face and stomach were also badly burned.

It was not clear as to exactly how the fire or explosion occurred. It was believed that father and son were spraying a tractor with highly flammable fuel to clean it, when a spark touched off the flash.

Three formerly active members, who now are residents of the Home, were recognized: Mmes. Al Young, F. E. Mitchell and Corrie Driskill Davis.

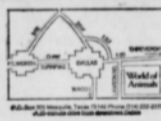

## HORSEOWNERS URGED TO GET JUMP ON VEE IN TEXAS

COLLEGE STATION — Horse owners throughout Texas are urged to "get the jump" on VEE, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, that deadly sleeping sickness of horses. All horses that were not vaccinated last year should be vaccinated as soon as possible.

It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path.

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules and donkeys) not vaccinated last year, joints out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In addition to Texas, the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated high risk states by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Armstrong lists four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now - 1. unvaccinated horses that have recently moved to the state; 2. foals born since last year's vaccination drive; 3. foals vaccinated under six months of age, and 4. horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes, which transmit the disease, emerge in the warm days ahead, emphasizes Armstrong.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer, notes Armstrong. If there is some doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, it is best to vaccinate them again, he adds.

Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE. Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

Armstrong encourage all horse owners to report any sickness in horses suspected of being encephalitis to local veterinarians.

A surveillance program is underway to check for possible infection in a variety of wild and domestic animals in the critical Gulf Coast and Mexican border states.
