The new owners have been in Dallas this week buying new Spring apparel and materials preparatory to re-opening the

store Thursday under the new name of Johnson's Dry Goods.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Johnson are natives of Cross Plains and enjoy wide acquaintance with people of this area. She was the former Bobbie Wright. They have two children, Dianna and Bruce, both of whom are high school students. Mrs. Johnson has been employed at Adair's for some time. Mr. Johnson will continue to operate his barber shop on South Main Street, but will aid in bookkeeping and restocking at the dry goods store on an after-hours basis. Mrs. Kate Powell, who was with the Adair store many years, will continue with the new owners.

Over the week end much re-decorating was done inside the store and several shipments received.

"We plan to be ready with a great deal of new merchandise and attractive, comfortable shopping quarters when we re-open Thursday," said Mrs. Johnson yesterday. "and we genuinely hope all our friends and customers of the store will come by and see us whether they wish to buy or not."

Lakewood Members Will Meet Thursday

Annual membership meeting of Lakewood Recreation Center will be held Thursday night at 7 o'clock, in the clubhouse.

J. L. Bonner, president, reports that four directors will be elected and that discussion will be held concerning the possible amending certain articles of the bylaws.

It is reported that Lakewood now has 119 members: 51 from Cross Plains, 47 from Rising Star, seven from Burkett, four from Gorman, five from Brownwood, two from Cisco and one each from Eula, Iowa Park and Midland.

Three of the five members of Callahan County school board will stand for re-election April 4. They are: Ben L. Russell, Jr. of precinct 1; R. L. Clinton of precinct 3, and Howard Cox of precinct 4.

Holdover members of the board are: M. H. Atwood of Opalin and F. A. Bouchette of Clyde. County school trustees are elected for two-year terms.

Cross Cut Will Get Rare Type Industry

Cross Cut will soon have a new industry, one unlike any other in this section of the state. It will be a catfish farm.

Located on the Roy Harding ranch, two miles east of Cross Cut, the fish farm will serve

wholesale markets with an estimated \$30,000 worth of catfish annually.

Hubert Belew of Cross Plains, who has been associated with Harding Brothers for a number of years, is presently revising

blueprints before beginning actual construction. He is contracting with R. D. (Bob) Needham for dirt work.

Plans call for six earthen pits, each covering about one acre and affording four feet of water. Finger-length catfish will be started and rotated from one pit to another until reaching marketing size. They will be fed commercial pellets, something similar to those given cattle.

Each time a group of fish is moved from one pit to another, it will call for complete draining of the pit being cleared, Belew said. He explained that this is to prevent disease and maintain rapid growth.

Roy Harding of Dallas, widely-known oil operator, was in Cross Plains Monday and said that actual construction on the fish farm should be under way within 30 days.

Tommy Merryman Made Top Exhibitor At Houston

Tommy Merryman, junior in Cross Plains High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Merryman, was named top exhibitor among 200 youths from all sections of Texas, who won scramble calves at the Houston Livestock Exhibition's Rodeo last year and brought their prizes back — groomed and fat — for this year's show.

The local Future Farmer of America exhibited his prize Shorthorn heifer to grand championship of the breeding division for her class. The ani-

mal is the same which captured the blue ribbon at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show and competed for reserve championship at the big Fort Worth Livestock Exhibition and Fat Stock Show. The animal, which was fed under direction of O. B. Edmondson, local instructor of vocational agriculture, was acquired from the herd of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Whiteside, who ranch on State Highway 36, eight miles this side of Abilene.

Young Merryman, in addition to being permitted to bring his prize-winning animal home to possibly become the foundation dam in a future herd, picked up \$125 in prize money and a trophy nearly three feet tall.

Agricultural Prospects Bright For Area

The first 69 days of 1970 brought 4.73 inches of rainfall to the Cross Plains area giving farmlands and pastures adequate bottom seasons and better-than-average prospects for agriculture.

Stock ponds are full and all

streams in this vicinity have been running for weeks. Flood control lakes are virtually all being lowered through draw-down tubes.

Outlook for small grains has seldom been better, say local growers. Needed most now is more warm weather of the variety which broke through for the first time Sunday after more than a week of overcast skies.

Area pastures are becoming lush with wild rye and other spring grasses. More than adequate grazing and highest livestock prices in recent years are giving strong boosts to ranching prospects.

Soil Conservation Service executives predict the coming months will see continued root plowing and brush eradication on local ranges.

Direct Dialing To May Now Possible

Patrons of Cross Plains exchange of Texas Telephone and Telegraph Co. can now dial the exchange in May direct. According to J. Moore, local manager, the system which must be used is somewhat different than that ordinarily used in making inter-exchange calls.

Communist Rules For Revolution

(Editor's Note: The following article has been called to the Review's attention. This article, it is said, was first printed in the Bartlesville Examiner-Enterprise in 1919. It was reprinted again in 1946 in The New World News, after the Florida attorney general secured it from a known member of the Communist Party, who acknowledged that it was then still a part of the Communist program. More recently the article appeared in the Texas Freeman in December 1969 and in an Austin, Texas, daily paper in early January.)

In May of 1919, at Dusseldorf, Germany, the Allied Forces obtained a copy of some of the "Communist Rules for Revolution". Nearly 50 years later, the Reds were still following them.

A. Corrupt the young; get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness.

B. Get control of all means of publicity, thereby:

1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays and other trivialities.

2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.

3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and disgrace.

4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.

5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Incite unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorder.

7. By specious argument, cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues — honesty, sobriety, self-restraint, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless.

That is quite a list, isn't it? Now stop to think — how many of these rules are being carried out in this nation today?

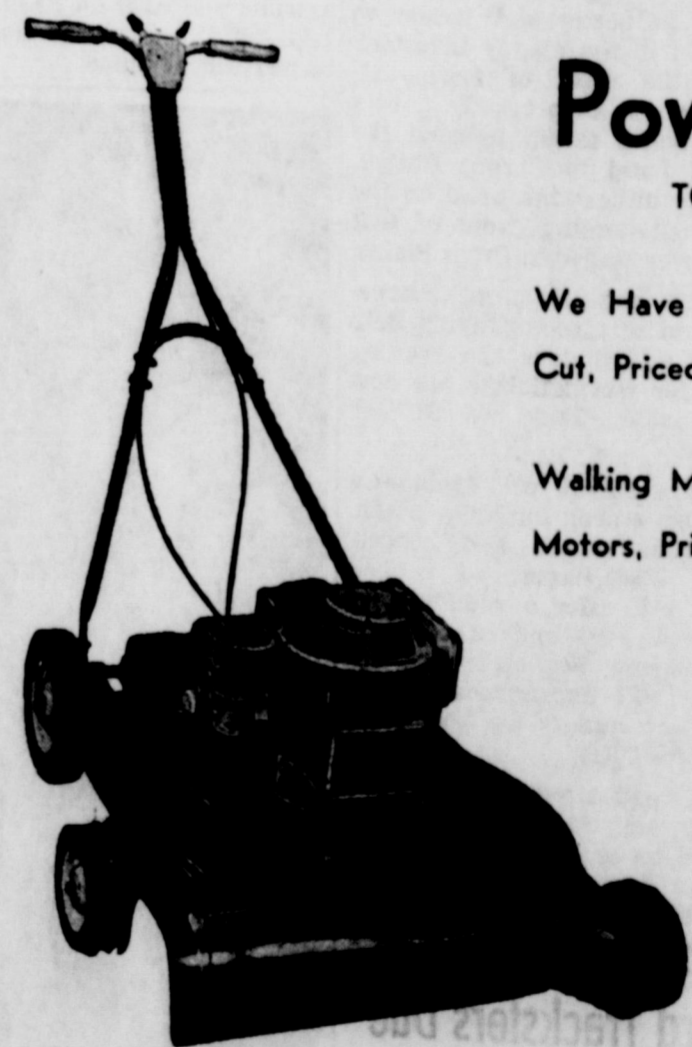

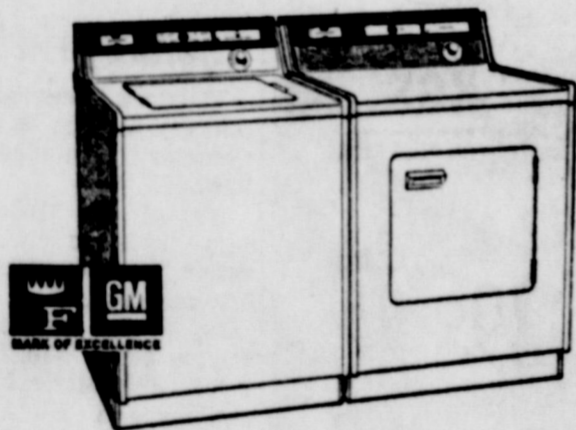

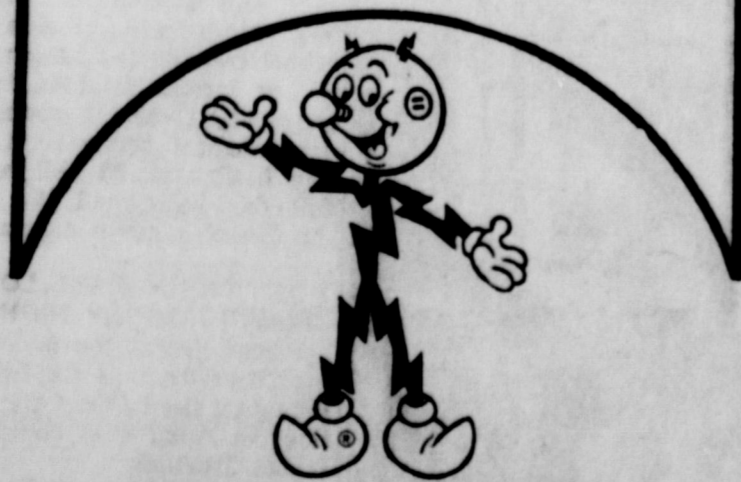

County Agent Gives Fruit Tree Advice

Peaches and plums are beginning to bloom, and this is a critical time, points out County Agent Gregory Gerngross, so far as disease control is concerned.

Chemical sprays must be applied at this time to prevent serious losses later in the year, he explains.

Initial sprays for the control of brown rot should be started at this time. This disease is characterized by a loss of blossoms and the rapid decay of fruit at harvest time. Wettable sulfur — 6 tablespoons to a gallon of water — or Captan — 2 tablespoons to a gallon of water — can be used to control this disease along with peach scab which occurs later in the year. The first spray should be applied when 75 per cent of the petals have fallen after blooming, advises the county agent. Other applications of the spray should be made at 14-21 day intervals until harvest time, he adds.

Insect control is also important to effective control of fruit diseases, says Gerngross, because injury resulting from insect feeding serves as an excellent entrance for the different fruit rots.
