





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Agent Cautions Of Pecan Casebearer

Callahan County and pecan producers in near by couties should be on the look - out for the emergence of the pecan nut casebearer moth, advises Gregory Gerngross, county agricultural agent. Moth emerindicate spraying dates from May 29 - June 2 for this county.

Female adults deposit eggs on tips of young nuts. They are greenish - white when depositel, but later assume a reddish appearance. First generation larvae hatch from eggs in four to five days and migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two they enter the nuts, usually at the base, and fed, each larva frequently destroying an entire cluster. Upon reaching maturity, larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults in June and early July.




