SIXTY-SECOND YEAR

Heavy Rain Falls Monday Morning

Newton's weather records reveal that Cross Plains received a total of 12.80 inches of rain during the first 152 days of 1970. January yielded only .06, but other months were wetter: February 2.68, March 3.35, April 1.65, May 3.08, and first day of June 1.98.

Most all streams in the Cross Plains area were running Monday morning, ponds and lakes were full and many being lowered through draw-down tubes. Farmers are now hoping for dry weather to permit grain harvesting and to wind-up peanut planting.

Methodist Ministers Exchanging Pulpits

Methodist pastors are exchanging stations this week, preparatory to first appearance in new pulpits Sunday.

The Rev. and Mrs. W. C. (Bill) Crawford and daughter, Gwendolyn, were moving from Cross Plains Tuesday. They were going to Taylor, where he is the new pastor for the 10th Street Methodist Church, the denomination's largest congregation in that city.

Coming to Cross Plains to replace the Rev. Mr. Crawford is the Rev. Rollo J. Herrington, who coincidentally followed the outgoing Cross Plains minister at his last assignment. He will also pastor the Burkett church, going there early each Sabbath and then returning here for the 11 a.m. service.

Of interest here was also the assignment of the Rev. David Wells, who was reared here, to the St. Paul Circuit in Breckenridge. He goes there from Loving.

The Rev. Jay Beavers was moved from Rising Star to Colleyville and going to Rising Star from Palo Pinto is the Rev. Lloyd T. Coker.

25 Per Cent Raise Set For School Tax

Rising cost of education and complying with minimum state standards will result in increased taxes for property owners within Cross Plains Independent School District.

A "blanket" 25 per cent increase in renditions has been authorized by unanimous action of members of the board of trustees.

Asked why it is necessary to

collect more taxes, Superintendent of Schools Wayne Ford, speaking for the board, said provisions of House Bill 240 which were enacted into law by the last Legislature allow no alternative.

"Trustees carefully planned the 1970-71 school year, cutting every possible corner," Ford declared, "and came up with a \$289,591 budget. This is

\$45,591 more than the total for the current year."

Teacher Pay High

Over one-half of the budget increase comes from a higher salary schedule for teachers and administrators. Whereas \$152,067 was paid the instructional and administrative staff this year, the same number of people will receive \$175,519 during the year ahead. This item amounts to an increase of \$23,512. Higher wages will also be paid lunchroom personnel and others on the school's payroll. These raises, it is pointed out, are to comply with recently-enacted minimum wage laws, which specify an hourly rate of \$1.45 or more.

At the present rate of school tax collections, the 25 per cent hike in renditions is expected to lift local tax payments approximately \$15,000 annually, from \$60,000 to \$75,000. The

remaining \$214,000 of the new budget will come from state and federal sources.

Where Money Goes

Explaining the locally-raised portion of the school budget, Ford said the district's share of minimum foundation assessment is \$40,799, annual payments for bonded debt retirement \$14,130, additional funds for maintenance and operation of the school plant (including such items as utilities, supplies, repairs and contracted services) \$16,000, amounting to a total of \$70,909 for which the district is directly and immediately responsible. Trustees express the hope that a surplus of nearly \$5,000 which is expected to accrue in the 25 per cent rendition boost, will be adequate to make overdue repairs and enlargements on the local campus. For example it is explained that such items as these — not yet budgeted — are in the immediate offing: new laboratory equipment for the science department, additional reference material for the school library, modernization of plumbing in rest rooms, replacement of rotting poles at football field (said to pose a hazard), hygienic changes recommended for dressing rooms in gymnasium and a number of other demands being repeatedly made by inspectors from Texas Education Agency in official visits on the local campus.

No Permanent Cure

Asked if the 25 per cent increase would preclude other tax boosts within the foreseeable future, Ford stressed that there is no certainty that it will. H. B. 240 guarantees teachers salary increases for 10 straight years, he reminded.

"A beginner will earn \$6,000 next year and 10 years from now will be making \$9,000," he said, this coupled with soaring costs of most everything the schools must buy does not point to an easing in tax requirements.

The burdensome problem of school financing is not peculiar to Cross Plains. Every neighboring district is facing the same dilemma. Baird Independent School District is said to have increased levies 29 per cent last year. One board member who owns a piece of property bisected by Cross Plains and Coleman school districts, said that his tax bill here is less than one-half that assessed by the adjoining district.

Can't Cut Costs

Asked if any economies were possible in teacher salaries for the year ahead, Ford emphasized that every classroom instructor here works for the minimum amount prescribed by the state.

Recent board meetings have devoted study to collection of delinquent taxes and negotiations are currently underway to possibly employ an attorney to institute legal action in cases where tax payments are delinquent three years.

"We feel that if patrons and property owners understand the problems confronting small schools — particularly those in districts such as ours, where old renditions have dropped drastically in recent years — they will rally behind us," Ford concluded, "and help to provide the educational opportunities to which our boys and girls are entitled."

'We Need Home Support' Writes Soldier In Cambodia

Pfc. Larry W. Barnett has experienced great change since that night three years ago this Spring when he walked across the stage to accept a diploma from Cross Plains High School.

Today he's an American G.I. fighting for his life in the Indo-China conflict, which includes combat both in Cambodia and Vietnam.

If one wonders what a young man from home, engaged in such a bitter struggle, thinks of happenings back in the States, a recent letter from Private Barnett should provide an answer. Published hereunder is a

letter received from him by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Barnett, and brought to the home town newspaper office this week:

Acts of Anarchy

"Anarchists and socialists are trying to undermine the power of America and cause larger numbers of G.I. casualties.

"They protest America's move into Cambodia with strikes, rallies, riots and political blackmail. From their strongholds in Cambodia the Communists have launched offensives for years, inflicting casualties and then escaping back across the border.

They were secure in the assurance that American troops would not pursue into that sanctuary.

Move Was Right

"America's move into Cambodia was a great morale builder for frustrated troops,

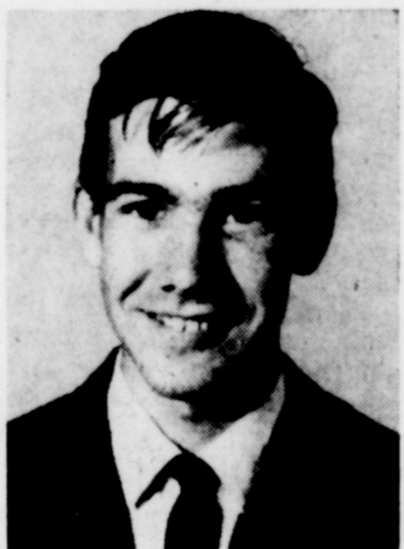
who have had to sit back and watch the murder of friends and buddies go unavenged. The militant left, those pro-Communists who have degraded America and fine places such as Cross Plains for years, sit back in their safe homes and colleges and destroy this morale.

"I know the people of Cross Plains and how patriotic they are. They are the silent people, who have to endure the insolent protesters. I feel, and I am sure most of the people of Cross Plains feel, that something should be done to counteract this sort

Show Your Colors

"I would like to put forth the idea that Cross Plains should have a day set in which all the patriotic people, those who love America as I do, should show their love. It could be done as simply as everyone wearing a red, white and blue ribbon arm band on a designated day.

"I wish Cross Plains would declare such a day and show such support for America and her fighting men now locked in struggles unto death."

Many Seem Unaware Of Housing Benefits

"Many families seem unaware of the fact that they are eligible to buy a new three or four-bedroom home with a down payment of only \$200," says Gerald Bowden, local contractor, who advises that the provisions of Section 325 of the National Housing Act make low-income families eligible for such benefits.

The program offers assistance in the form of monthly payments by the Department of Housing and Urban Development to the lending institutions to reduce interest cost on a market rate home mortgage insured by FHA if a homeowner cannot afford to make a conventional loan.

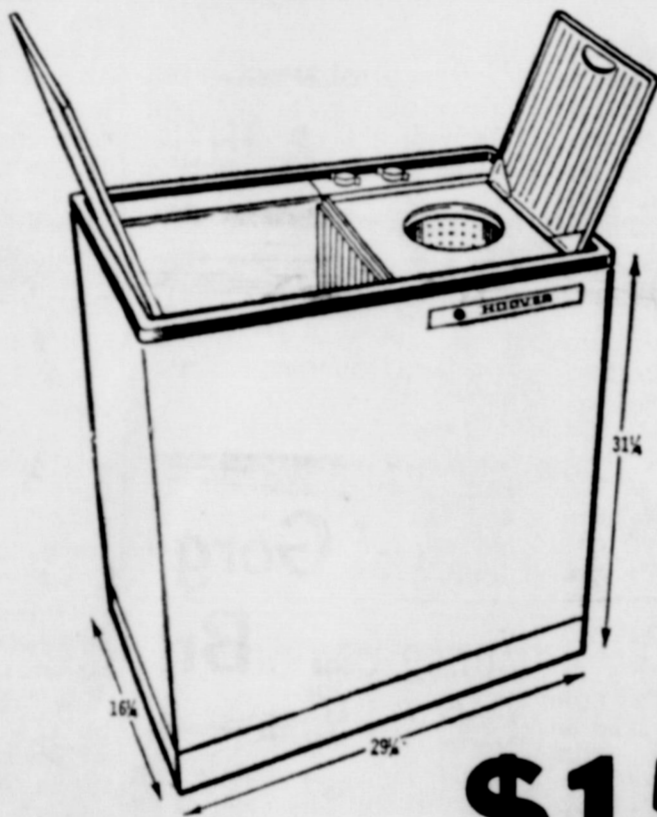

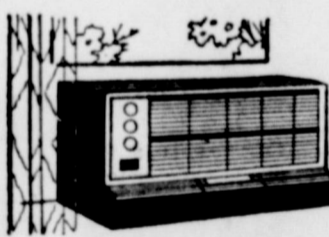

Peanut Pest Said Prevalent In Area

John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, reports lesser cornstalk borer moths are being caught in record number this year.

Based on the light trapping program conducted by the De Leon Research Laboratory, the lesser cornstalk borer moth, Texas' most serious peanut insect pest, is abundant in the area. Commissioner White noted that the second cycle of the corn borer began May 15 which is approximately 30 days from the date of the beginning of the first cycle. Departmental entomologists have predicted that the third cycle will begin on approximately June 10.

Peanut farmers are cautioned to be on the lookout for this moth. Anyone finding moths can have them definitely identified at the Texas Department of Agriculture Research Lab, 301 West Navarro Street, De Leon.
