## Baptists Look To Historic Event Sunday

First Baptist Church of Cross Plains, which was organized 80 years ago this month, will dedicate a \$50,000 wing to the building at an anniversary-homecoming Sunday. The gathering is expected to be one of the most eventful in the congregation's history.

At least three former pastors will attend and have parts on the program. They are: the Rev. V. D. Walters of San Antonio, the Rev. Don Turner of Mineral Wells and the Rev. Roger Butler of Knox City. There is a possibility that the Rev. Joe Miller of May, who pastored the church in the late 1940's, may also be present.

Sunday's program will get underway at the regular 11 o'clock worship hour. The morning service will include reading of the church history by Wayne Ford, a dedicatory pledge led by the pastor, the Rev. E. V. Brooks, special music by the Rev. Mr. Turner and sermon by the Rev. Mr. Walters.

Basket luncheon will be served in Fellowship Hall immediately following the morning service.

The afternoon program resumes at 1:30 and will continue for approximately an hour. Highlights of the building program will be reviewed, and the Rev. Mr. Butler will preach.

Cross Plains First Baptist Church was organized in June 1890. Among charter members were: P. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Eldridge, Dan Ford, Steele Ford, Fred Price and N. C. Gaultney. First pastor was the Rev. Major R. Surles.

Other pastors in order of their tenures here were: A. T. Ford, who remained about a year; Rev. R. D. Carter 1892 and 1893; a Rev. Mr. Powers in 1895; the Rev. Dan Mathews (known as the cowboy preacher) filled in here for a while as also did the Rev. W. C. Williams, however, neither was actually pastor. In the late sum-

mer of 1897, the Rev. Ben Richbourg came here as pastor and stayed five years. In 1903 the pastor was W. J. Cooper. He was followed by Rev. W. D. Vinson, during whose tenure in 1904 the Board Flat church con-

solidated with Cross Plains.

During 1905 the Rev. John Helms preached at the church on numerous occasions, but was not pastor. The Rev. W. J. Rodgers became pastor in 1906 and remained two years. The Rev. R. H. Williams was pastor for the next three years, and in 1911 the Rev. L. S. Smith was called. While he was pastor the church was moved to its present site on North Main Street. Trustees at that time were R. B. Forbes, P. Smith, Charlie Barr and John Atwood.

In 1915 the Rev. G. W. Thomas of Anson was called to the local pulpit. He was followed in 1917 by Rev. D. M. Strickland and in 1918 by Rev. S. A. Rodgers.

**Church Strikes Oil**  
The Rev. Mr. Richbourg returned as pastor in 1923, and in 1924 the Rev. J. H. Littleton came here. It was during his pastorate that a \$1,000 tabernacle was built and a new \$11,000 church building was

erected.  
In 1925, while without a pastor, the church leased its lots for oil and gas. What was often said to be the best well in the Townsite Field was drilled on the property and the church's portion of the one-eighth royalty brought the congregation approximately \$4,000.

In 1926 the Rev. J. H. Hunt came to pastorate of the church and it was during his stay that a \$3,000 parsonage was built. The Rev. A. E. Hill became pastor in 1928 and remained for about three years. The Rev. Graves Darby pastored the congregation from 1930 until 1933, being the nineteenth pastor in the first 40 years of the church's existence.

The Rev. C. A. Voyles was pastor from August 1933 to November 1934. Rev. V. W. Tatum became pastor in December 1935 and remained until Nov. 1, 1937. The Rev. C. E. Poe came in February of 1938 and remained until 1944. The Rev. D. E. Simpson came as

pastor in July 1944 and stayed until May 27, 1945.

The Rev. Joe Miller became pastor in August 1945 and remained until November 1948. The Rev. W. J. Chapman was next on the scene coming here late in 1948 and remaining until Dec. 31, 1954. The Rev. D. R. Philley was then pastor for 17 months, leaving here Aug. 1, 1956.

The Rev. V. D. Walters became pastor in 1956 and remained until November of 1960. The new church building was begun during this time.

Rev. Don Turner became pastor Dec. 12, 1960, and led in completion and equipping of the new building. He remained here until March 21, 1965. The Rev. Roger Butler became pastor April 24, 1965, and remained until Nov. 3, 1968. Dr. L. O. Harris of Hardin Simmons University filled in as interim-pastor for the next four and one-half months. The present pastor, the Rev. E. V. Brooks, came March 7, 1969.

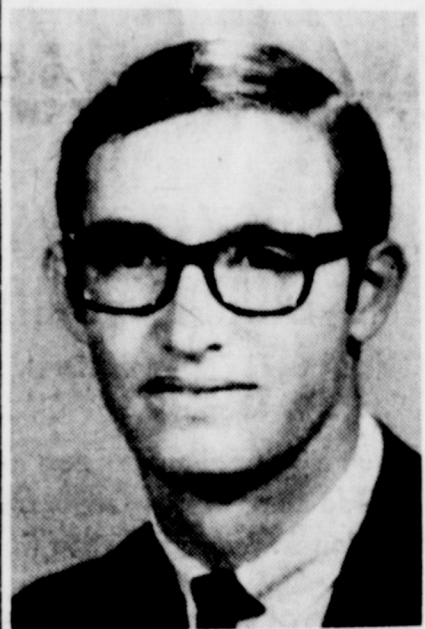
### Mike Montgomery To Enter Medical School

### 5-COUNTY SOCIAL SECURITY INCREASES

Social Security has become an increasingly important economic factor in Callahan and four near by counties during the past 10 years. Recipients of monthly benefits almost doubled in the five-county area, Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche and Eastland, in the decade from December 1959 to December 1969, and amount paid increased nearly three fold, according to figures released by R. R. Tuley, district Social Security manager in Abilene.

### Charles Kunkel Heads Secret Service Office

Secret Service Director James J. Rowley has announced promotion of Charles E. Kunkel, formerly Resident Agent at Fort Worth, to the position of Assistant Special Agent in Charge of the Houston Secret Service Office.

Kunkel, 38, was born in Hamilton, and attended Cross Plains High School, where he was an outstanding athlete. From 1950 to 1953, he served with the United States Coast

Guard, in the Far East. Subsequently, he attended Arlington State College.

He was graduated from North Texas State College in 1959. While attending college Kunkel served with the Arlington Police Department. ### Election Contest Likely In Commissioner's Race

In a run-off election primary Saturday Lowell Johnson received 122 votes for county commissioner of Precinct 2 as compared with 120 for the incumbent Glen Swor.

The County Democratic Executive Committee met in the courthouse at Baird Tuesday morning and after canvassing returns reported that no errors were found. Johnson was certified as the party's nominee.

It was indicated at the committee meeting that a contest of the election would probably be made, resulting in district court action. Returns from the Eula box are reportedly being questioned.

At the first primary Swor polled 66 votes to Johnson's 65. There were, however, three others in the race at that time.

The vote by boxes Saturday was as follows: Eula gave Johnson 11 and Swor 1, Denton Valley went for Johnson 63 to 58 for Swor, Oplin gave Johnson 45 and Swor 59, and absentees favored Johnson 3 to 2.

Members of the Democratic Executive Committee who sat in on Tuesday morning's session were: Hugh Ross of Baird, chairman; Alton E. Hornsby of

Cross Plains, Allen Johnson of Clyde, Hilton Tarrant of Eula, Mrs. Emma Poindexter of Oplin, J. C. Dyer, Jr. of Putnam and Frank Carpenter of Denton Valley.

Swor is presently in his third four-year term, having been first elected in 1958 and took office Jan. 1, 1959. He is the oldest member of the Commissioners' Court, from standpoint of service, and Duke Mitchell, commissioner from this precinct is next.

## History Of Atwell Read At Recent Gathering In That Community

Editor's Note: The following history of Atwell was read by B. C. Chrisman at the recent Cemetery Memorial gathering in that community, at which time efforts were launched to build an endowment fund for permanent maintenance of the burial plot.

Before the organization of Callahan County, July 3, 1877, a number of permanent settlers had established their homes in the eastern part of the county. Among these were John and Jim Heyser who settled in Callahan County prior to its organization over 90 years ago.

Probably the first settler to locate his home in the immediate vicinity of Atwell was Toby Bell who came in the early 1870's and settled on what is now known as the Andrews place.

Forming the vanguard of permanent settlers was "Uncle" Johnny Surles and family, coming from Lamar County. Mr. Surles first inspected the prairie land in the vicinity of Scranton and passed it up for a location where wood and water were more abundant.

Mr. Surles moved to the Atwell community in 1880, his children, John, Major, Moreland, Julia and Kate, attending the school at Zion Hill, and on many occasions in good weather, walking the distance of approximately four miles, prior

to the construction of a schoolhouse in the Atwell community. After the construction of the Texas & Pacific Railroad in 1880, we find W. C. Black, who soon became a citizen of the community.

W. C. Black was father of

Gus and Noel Black and a number of daughters. In the middle of 1880, the following families had made locations in the Atwell community for their permanent home: J. T. Purvis, the Rouses, J. P. Hutchins, Frank Abbott, Mrs. Pillans and

Buck Houston, and these were followed shortly by J. R. Jones, J. L. Haley, R. P. Mitchell, Gid Howell, the Gattis family and the Sessionses. Uncle Jimmie Tatom moved his residence from Cottonwood to the Atwell community in 1892. By the

beginning of the new century, the Maddux brothers, Ed and Jess, had arrived from Coryell County. W. R. Ezzell, who had been a resident of the Sabanno community purchased the property belonging to the Sessions family and moved into the Atwell community in 1903.

Soon after, the Callahans, Caves, Penters, Minors, Busbys, Wilsons and Brsbears arrived. The Clarks, John and Jim, arrived from Collin County in about 1897, accompanied by Jim Edgeworth. Collin County also furnished the Atwell community the Milt Jones and Charlie Bradley families.

With the arrival of so many families in the years 1885 and 1886, the need of a public school became apparent and through the combined efforts of the new citizenship, headed by "Uncle" Johnny Surles, the community established its first school. For some time the school went by the name of Bell Branch, but the name was soon changed to Flag Springs. This school was constructed in 1885 or 1886 by private subscription. The first teacher at this school was a (Continued on Page 8.)

Cross Plains got the most of two hits here Saturday in edging Goldthwaite 2-1 in senior teenage baseball action. Cross Plains now owns a 3-0 league record, two games in front of the Eagles and De Leon, with five games left on the slate.

All Chief runs scored in the first inning on a homer by Larry Bishop, said to be one of the longest ever hit out of Illingworth Field. James McMillan, who had singled, scored in front of Bishop.

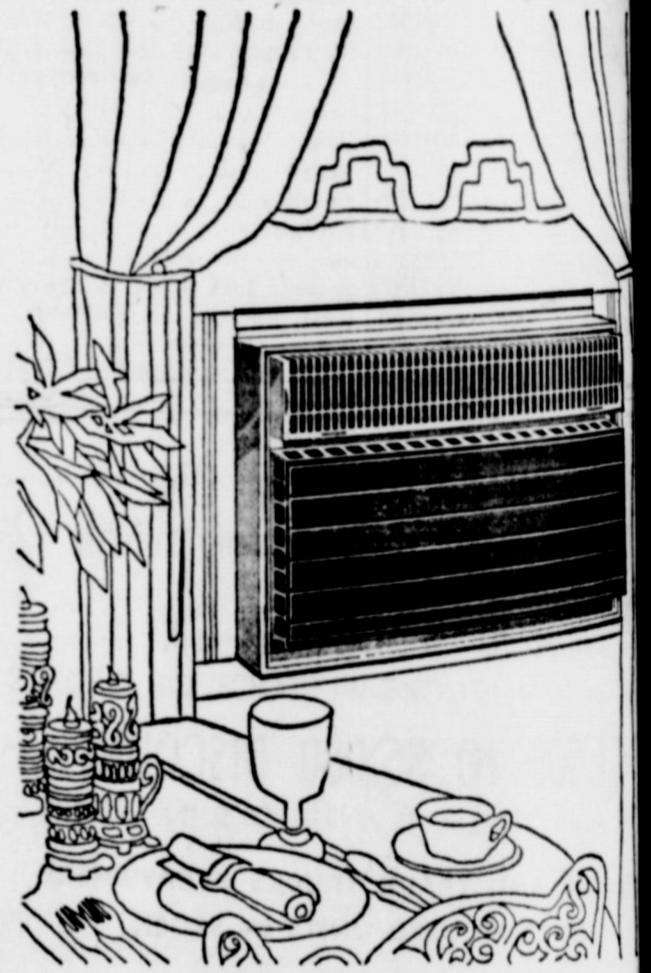

### Atwell History Read At Recent Meeting

Mrs. Darden, sister of Will Abbott. Following Mrs. Darden but necessarily in order were J. R. Kelly, Tom Dawkins, Jesse Norton, Milton Houston, Major Surles, Miss Emmerson, Harry Varner, Mr. Boyd, Mr. Bond and Otis Allen.

An old register kept by Professor Dawkins shows the following were his pupils: Arthur Purvis, Fern Mitchell, Sallie and Mary Pillans, T. Stephens and Mae Jones.

The last school was taught at Flag Springs by B. C. Christian, Sr. and Carroll Surles, assistant. This school was taught in the school year 1905 and 1906. After the close of this term, the citizens of the community raised sufficient funds for the construction of a new building, and by the beginning of the 1906-1907 school year, the new two-story building was ready for school. The new building was located about one mile east of the Flag Springs school site and nearer the village of Atwell.

Soon after the construction of the original Flag Springs school building, a Baptist Church was organized in the community and the spiritual needs of the community were served by J. R. Kelly, also a teacher, I. D. Hull, Charnel Hightower and C. C. Andrews.

All services were held in the school building. In about 1901 or 1902, a new church building was constructed and I. D. Hull, B. F. Richbourg, Rev. Williams, Ivey, Joe Mayes and O'Brian served as pastors.

The first store in the Atwell community was run by John Clark and his brother, Jim, in the year 1898. After a few years the building was sold to Mack Jones, and he established the first and only drug store in the Atwell community. After the sale of the building to Mack Jones, the Clark Brothers erected a two story building a few feet to the west and engaged in the general merchantile business. In 1899, the community had become sufficient in population to justify a post office and a petition was presented to the Post Office Department for the establishment of an office. This petition was met with favorable consideration, and on Feb. 28, 1899, John Clark was appointed the first postmaster.

Up to the time of the establishment of the post office, the community had gone by the name Flag Springs. In honor of

the new District Attorney for the Federal Court of Northern Texas, William H. Atwell, the newly created post office was named Atwell, and the name Flag Springs soon became a name only in memory.

Soon after the Clark Brothers established the first store, others entered other lines of business. Mack Howell and Mr. Doss entered the grocery business.

Jim Reed was probably the first blacksmith in the community. The Clark Brothers sold their merchantile business to W. W. Foster & Sons, A. G. and J. C. who had moved in from Limestone County. This firm continued in business for a number of years until the building was destroyed by fire in the fall of 1908. Around 1910 Guy Brashear and Edd Maddux had the general store.

Mr. McCarver erected a two-story building, using the lower floor as a blacksmith shop and the upper floor as a lodge room for the Woodmen of the World Lodge. Marion Vestil, Mr. Weber, Tod Vaught, Clyde King and Mr. Richardson served as blacksmiths. After a number of years, the lower floor was converted into a store building and was occupied by O. C. Morgan and was followed by S. N. Foster for a number of years.

Following the big cotton crop of 1900, the Clark Brothers constructed a gin in the community. This gin was capable of turning out 25 to 30 bales per day.

Early doctors in the community were Dr. Johnson, Dr. Leach and Dr. Larry Griffin.

Serving the tonsorial needs of the community in the small barber shop on Saturday afternoons were Walter Stewart, Marcellus Tatom, Sam Kellough and Hassie Mitchell.

After the school year 1938-39 in which Mr. and Mrs. Leo Varner taught, the Atwell School District was transferred to the Cross Plains Independent School District by contract and was finally consolidated by election.

Some of the happiest days of my life were spent at Atwell.

My father, my wife, who was Lavada Ezzell, and I all taught in the Atwell School District and in the present days, when we are now like the "old gray mare" of song and legend and we are not physically what we used to be, our thought on many occasions go back to the happy days and the good people of the Atwell community.
