Larry Campbell Quits As Manager At Co-Op

Larry Campbell, who has served 16 months as manager of Pioneer Farmers Cooperative, has resigned the place as of the last of this month, and will accept a position with the Peanut Administration Committee of Atlanta, Ga.

He will be stationed in Gorman, but will travel throughout the Southwestern Region of the United States which includes Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and California. He will actually be employed by shellers and growers, but will work in marketing and quality control under direction of the Department of Agriculture.

Campbell, his wife, Joy, and their three children, Neal 3, Tammy 2 and Scott, four months, will move to Gorman early next month. They have been making their home at the residence just west of Lakewood Recreation Center on State Highway 36.

Campbell's successor at the co-op is expected to be named in the next two or three weeks.

Drunks Pay \$2,329 In Fines This Week

Drunk driving doesn't pay in Callahan County.

A total of \$2,329 in fines and two jail terms were assessed in district and county court at Baird this week.

The two jail sentences and a \$500 fine were imposed by District Judge Raleigh Brown in

42nd District Court Monday. The other levies were handed down by County Judge A. E. (Col.) Dyer, Jr. in county court sessions Monday and Tuesday.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks estimated yesterday that Callahan justices of the peace collected another \$900 in fines for traffic violations over the long holiday week end.

The jail terms were handed down on guilty pleas of second offense DWI.

William Butler Cooper, 50, of Midland was fined \$500 and given six months in jail, as the result of a May 8, 1969, arrest seven miles east of Baird on IH 20 by Patrolman Harold Hambrick.

Testimony showed that Cooper was clocked at 97 miles per hour in a radar zone. Judge Brown credited him for the time he has spent in jail since Jan. 28.

Dave Anderson, 54, of Al-

bany received 30 days in jail as result of a Dec. 22 arrest six miles north of Baird by Hambrick.

Criminal Dist. Atty. Ed Paynter prosecuted both cases with stipulated evidence. Attorney Bill Thomas of Abilene represented both men.

Monday's docket in county court included five counts of DWI, one of driving while license suspended and one of aggravated assault of a female on a 14-year-old child. Tuesday's proceedings included a DWI case. Shanks conducted the prosecutions.

BAIRD JAILER HAS HOUSING PROBLEMS

County jail at Baird, intended to accommodate 14 persons, had 21 confined there Sunday morning.

Deputy Sheriff C. S. (Hoot) McGowen, who serves as jailer, hastily notified Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones and several cases were immediately tried. Fines were collected and prisoners released to make room for new arrivals.




