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School Teachers Get \$1,050 Per Year Raise In Salary

AUSTIN: Texas public school teachers — those on the state minimum salary schedule — will receive pay raises averaging about \$1,050 per year in 1970-71.

Students will go to school — and teachers will teach — an extra five days (180 instead of 175). In addition, teachers will be on duty for 10 more days of non-teaching work during the year, and will be paid on a 10-months basis, instead of nine.

School Year Change

These changes in the school year and the basis for figuring teacher pay result from amendments to the minimum founda-

tion program law passed in 1969 by the Legislature.

Under the minimum program, a beginning bachelor's degree teacher in 1969-70 was paid \$593 per month for nine months, or \$5,337 for the year.

In 1970-71, a beginning bachelor's degree teacher will receive \$600 per month for 10 months, or \$6,000 for the year.

Many Texas school systems pay their teachers more than the state-required minimum salaries.

Two former Pioneer men who played the old Philpeco golf course innumerable times in by-gone days, William Gibson who now lives in San Antonio and Paul Huntington who now makes his home in Brady, teamed to capture championship of Lakewood Recreation Center's partnership golf tournament last week end.

The two set a blistering pace on opening day, Friday, on the little-changed nine-hole course with a 10 under par 62 on rounds of 33 and a red hot 29 back nine. They added Saturday's best round of 64 and had a closing 68 for a 194 total, 22 strokes below par, on the 54 holes, winning the diadem by five strokes.

Duo of Jim McAnally of Burkett and Don Needham of Cross Plains carded a 65 (34-31) Sunday to go with Friday's 66 and Saturday's 68 to take runner-up spot with a 199 aggregate in

the championship flight. They shared best round limelight on Sunday with Bill Sikes and Gene Gibson, Brownwood golfers who posted a 32-33, and finished third with a 201 total.

Art Fisher and John Lee of Rising Star won championship of first flight by seven strokes with a 214 total on rounds of 74-69-71. Frazier Low and Dwayne McDaniel of Brownwood was runner-up team with a 221 on cards of 78-71-72.

Brownwood golfers also claimed both places in the second flight. Duo of Jim Smith and Jerry Head won the flight by two strokes with a 54-hole score of 234 on rounds of 83-74-77. Runner-up twosome was Vandal Weathers and Wilbert Simmel who had a 236 aggregate.

Winning team in each flight was presented seven dozen golf balls, and the second place duo got three and a half dozen balls.

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435 Now Receive Free Commodities In County

Four hundred and thirty-five persons are now on the rolls for free commodities in Callahan County.

Mrs. Karon Huckabee, authorized representative for distribution of the federal government foodstuffs, said Monday that the number of recipients had increased approximately 100 since the program first went into operation in this county in May 1966.

"There have been few changes in recent months," Mrs. Huckabee declared, "however, one innovation is that we are now able to supply milk,

cereal and some other baby foods to infants under one year of age."

Of the 435 on commodity rolls, it is reported that approximately one-half the families are supplied from a distribution point in Cross Plains and the remainder from the courthouse at Baird. Commodities are issued once each month.

VANDALS HIT DOWNTOWN AREA ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Record Number Of Local People Head For College

This Fall a greater proportion of Callahan County's young people than ever before will be heading for college.

And, for the parents of most of them, it presents a bigger financial problem than before because college costs have been zooming skyward.

The result is that funds they had set aside for the purpose are no longer adequate. Added to this is the fact that bank loans are harder to get, interest rates are high and federal aid to needy students has been reduced.

Hardest hit by the mounting costs and the tight money conditions are those families that have more than one child going to college at the same time. They have to dig even deeper.

Based upon the number of Callahan County students heading for college and upon the

new tuition rates, local families will be carrying a \$565,000 load for the coming academic year, it is estimated.

Data on college enrollments for the coming semester and in the costs involved were compiled by the U. S. Office of Education, the Census Bureau and others.

Their figures indicate that 1,840,000 youths will be starting college this year, bringing the total enrollment to a record 7,700,000.

Callahan County's contingent will total 220, it is estimated. This compares with 120 in the local area who were going to college in 1960.

How much they will have to pay will depend upon where they are going. The range is broad.

At state colleges and other publicly-supported institutions the average outlay will be about \$1,250 for tuition, fees, room and board. That is the price for those living in the state. For non-residents it is higher.

Private colleges also vary widely in cost, the average being about \$2,720, the Office of Education states.

But that's not all. Then comes the cost of transportation, books, clothing, recreation and miscellaneous items.

Taking everything into consideration, the total cost of a year in a public college at this time is around \$1,750 and, in a private college, \$3,400.

The \$565,000 price tag for Callahan County parents is on the presumption that the local students will divide equally between public and private colleges.

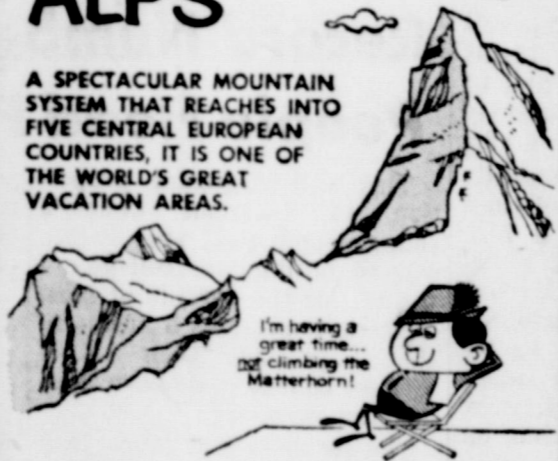

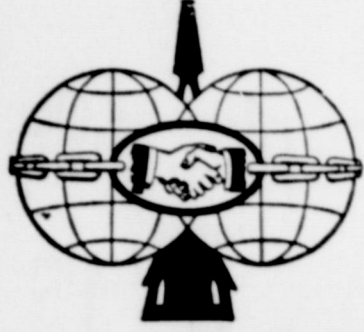

Cross Plains collected just five hits, but managed eight walks. Several fielding errors also aided the win. Drillers committed just one error afield.

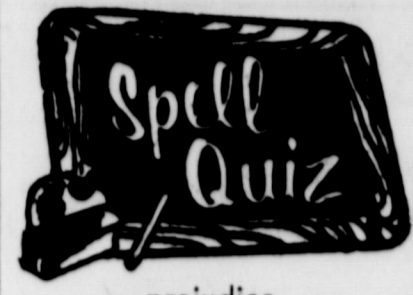
Cross Plains belted Hamilton 11-1 in the regular season finale Tuesday of last week, insuring the deadlock for the loop lead.
