Old Settlers Gather In Reunion Saturday

A crowd in excess of 500 is expected in Cross Plains Saturday for 32nd annual reunion of old settlers of Callahan County. The gathering will again be held under the oaks at Treadaway Park in the western edge of town.

Registration will begin at

9:30 a.m. followed by the formal program 30 minutes later.

For the first time in history, this year's principal speaker will be a woman. She is Mrs. John Berry, who resides north of Clyde. Mrs. Berry and her late husband were members of Callahan County Historical Survey

Committee and played vital roles in the erection of markers at historical places over the county.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reports that a street parade through the downtown district is scheduled by Cross Plains Riding Club. Business concerns

are invited to enter floats and horsemen and youngsters on decorated bicycles are also asked to join in.

Simultaneously with the assembling of old settlers will be an open horse show at the riding club arena, just west of the reunion grounds. Trophies, rosettes and ribbons will be awarded in both halter and performance classes. Judge of the show will be Luther (Shorty) Harmes of Coleman.

Cross Plains Riding Club has also scheduled a junior rodeo to be held at the same site Friday night. It will be free to the public and starting time is 7:30 p.m. Belts and buckle sets will be awarded prize-winners.

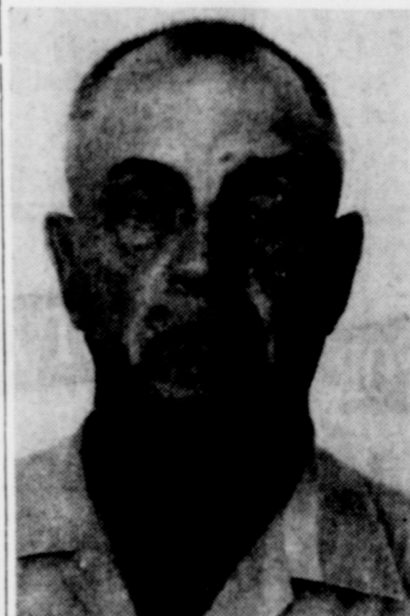
Financial Drive Launched To Buy Cemetery Acreage

A drive is being launched to pay for land recently purchased to be added to Cross Plains Cemetery. The property is across the street east of the southern part of the cemetery. It was bought from the Bond estate for \$1,000.

T. T. Nichols, president of the Cemetery Association, estimates that about \$300 will be required to bulldoze, burn brush and then level the grounds.

A fund-raising campaign launched over the week end was kicked off with three gifts totaling \$500. Others, families, individuals and business concerns are being invited to join in. Father Faces Murder In Child's Death Here

James Paul Washburn, 32, of Big Spring was charged with "murder without malice" in Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones' court at Baird in connection with a one-car accident which killed Washburn's six-year-old daughter about 5 p.m. Wednesday.

Washburn was placed in Callahan County jail Thursday in lieu of \$4,500 bond.

Services for Teri Lyn Washburn were held at 1 p.m. Friday in Big Spring.

The Washburn child was thrown from the car being driven by her father when it went out of control rounding a curve two miles east of Rowden on State Highway 36. She died about one hour later in Hendrick Memorial Hospital. Investigating Highway Patrolman Harold Hambrick of Baird said the car overturned once. Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of Cross Plains assisted in the investigation.

Officers said charges were filed against Washburn after he had been administered a "breathalyzer test" to determine if he was intoxicated. Receiving multiple bruises and

abrasions in the crash was Washburn's 11-year-old son, Ricky Wayne.

Washburn was not injured. Reportedly, he was taking the children to Houston for a visit when the accident occurred.

The Washburn child was born Feb. 5, 1964, in Big Spring. She had lived in Big Spring until a year ago when she moved to Houston.

Survivors include the mother, Mrs. Fredrick Bryant Baker of Houston; the father, James Paul Washburn of Big Spring; one brother, Ricky Wayne Washburn of Houston; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward H. Moore of Big Spring; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Washburn, Big Spring.

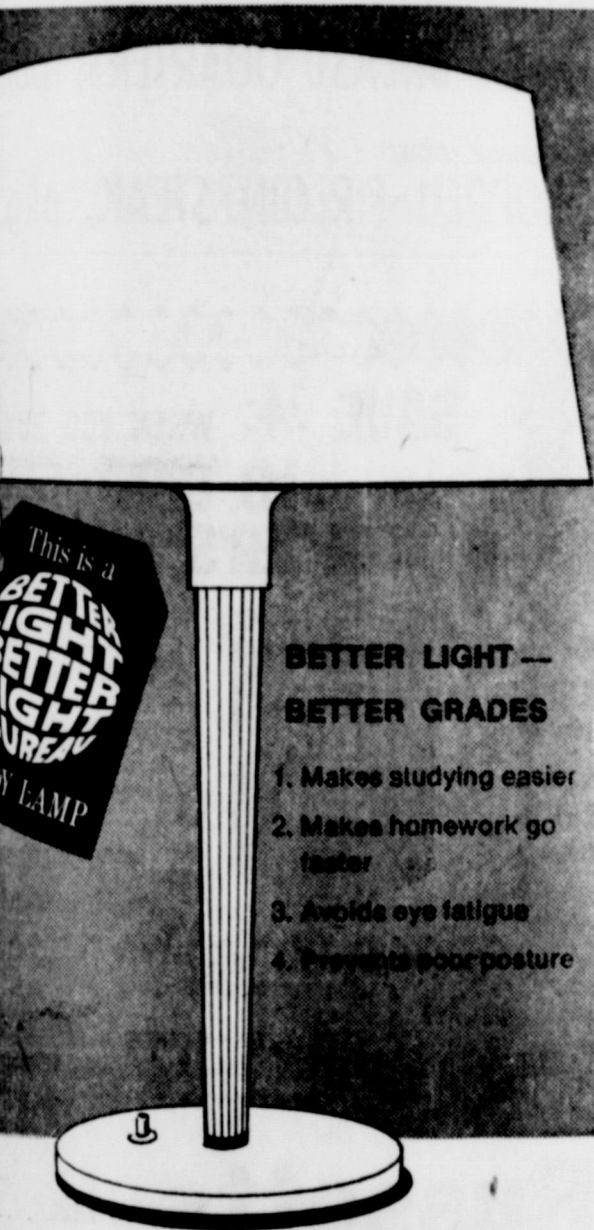

Oiler Finaled In Spring Gap Area

C. B. Edgar of Abilene has completed another producer in the Spring Gap Mountains oil field, midway between Cross Plains and Baird.

The oiler is No. 2-D Guy Caldwell, spotting 617 feet from the north and 2,100 feet from the west lines of Section 12, Block 5, SP Survey.

Daily potential was 94 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 30 barrels of water. Flow was through a 28-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 600 to 150 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 4,136-42 feet, treated with 500 gallons of 15 per cent mud acid. It was fractured with 19,200 pounds of sand and 13,700 gallons of gelled water. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 4,200 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 2.00-1.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be held by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Justice of the presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not infeasible is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: (a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, and one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment is submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this state at an election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1970, at which election ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment submitting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

Damaging Pests Hit Area Peanut Fields

About 60 per cent of the peanut fields in Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Callahan counties have infestations of lesser cornstalk borers, according to a recent survey by Texas Department of Agriculture personnel at the De Leon Research Laboratory. Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"Development of the destructive pest is not uniform in all the counties nor even from field to field," White said.

He urged farmers to check their fields at least every week for presence of the corn borer. The best time for checking fields for moths is early in the morning or late in the afternoon. During the middle of the day, the moths hide under peanut plants and are inactive.

Entomologists at the De Leon lab have found that control by insecticides is much easier when the larvae are small. After the larvae have begun to mature in their silken cocoons they become difficult to kill.

Commissioner White urges farmers to check with county agents on the correct insecticide to apply to control the borer. He emphasizes that correct insecticide for a specific pest is very important.

"Just because your neighbor is spraying doesn't mean you should also be applying chemicals," Commissioner White said. "Find out if you have an infestation, then try to determine what stage of development most pests have reached. Work for maximum effect with the least expense," he urged.

Personnel at the Texas Department of Agriculture lab at De Leon can positively identify the moths, pupae and larvae for persons not familiar with the pest.

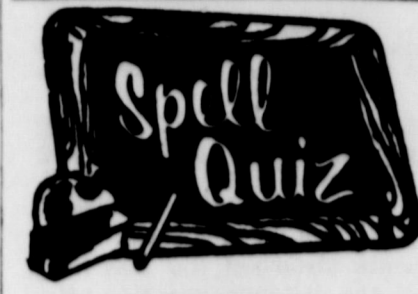

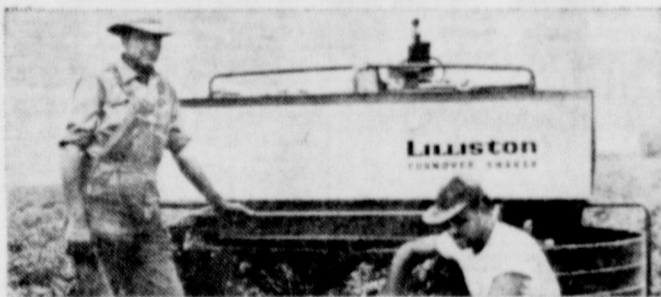

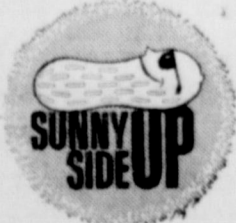
