Car Crash Thursday Injures Local Lady

Mrs. J. B. (Doris Farr) Gibbard of Cross Plains sustained multiple injuries in a two-car accident at intersection of West 8th Street and Avenue E about 6:15 p.m. Thursday.

An estimated \$1,400 in property damages was also done in the mishap.

Mrs. Gibbard was rushed to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene by Higginbotham ambulance after initial treatment by a local physician. She was placed in the intensive care unit at the hospital where she remained several days reportedly suffering several broken ribs and a punctured lung.

Force of the collision of Mrs. Gibbard's auto, a 1964 Chevrolet, and a 1966 Plymouth being driven by Judy Brooks, 26, of this city, caused the former's car to veer into an apartment of the federal housing project, several yards away. The vehicle ripped away two porch support posts and caved in a brick wall of the dwelling.

A small child in the Brooks auto, Virginia Lynn Jeter of Monahans, sustained an abrasion on her head and was treated at the scene. Two other adults and three other children in the same vehicle were not injured.

City Marshal Chuck Thomas, investigating officer, estimated damage to the Gibbard car at \$800 and to the Brooks auto at \$200. Another estimated \$400 damage was done to the apartment.

"Our people are always welcome to visit in the school," said Wayne Ford, superintendent, yesterday, "however, this open house event affords a particularly good opportunity to establish closer relations between patrons and teachers, and we hope many adults will call on us at this time."

Cedar Bluff School Was Typical Early Day Institution

The place was a typical one-room school house, located 12 miles north of Cross Plains. The time was the period between 1938 and 1942. The stage was the interior of this building and the surrounding playground. The actors were the 18 to 25 boys and girls, who came from homes of the surrounding area. The audience was the parents who were proud observers and loyal boosters.

With all the correlating of fields of learning and combining of classes, there were several class periods at any time. There were few visual aids, no school buses, and no hot lunches until the last year.

With the aid of A. C. Halsell, the book room was changed into a kitchen. Lunches were served at the students' desks, and with the help of the older girls, dishes were washed and the kitchen made ready for the next day.

All basic subjects were taught daily, and when time and interest permitted, there were nature study, art, and music, (the teacher's piano was a part of the furniture of the school-room). Some guidance in "research" was given, with the use of the "World Book" furnished

by the teacher. This exercise developed a curiosity about people, places and things, that could not be acquired through travel and television, as is possible today.

There was no sex education, no drug problem, and no protests.

One afternoon in each month

was scheduled for a party for all pupils who had birthdays in that month. There were programs consisting of plays, songs, drills and monologues. Each

Christmas, a large native cedar tree was hauled in and set up by some booster. After the singing of carols and the staging of the Nativity scene, a Santa Claus distributed gifts to every one present. No one was overlooked, though Santa was somewhat limited in finance like everyone, during those depression years.

Each Sunday this "stage" was used for another community service, Sunday School each Sabbath and preaching services once or twice a month. Often there was ball playing on Sunday afternoon, when the people came together and enjoyed this time of recreation.

There may be little reason for writing about such past history, one may say. This story is typical of most any rural school of that period. Yet in the light of all the improvements in methods, one must give credit to those schools for jobs well done.

From this one group of boys and girls, there has come a teacher, a nurse, a minister and a college instructor. The others are good citizens, who are employed in various occupations. All are contributing their fair share toward fulfilling the American dream. Isn't that what it is all about?

Street Paving Project Near Completion Here

Three and one-half blocks of new paving are being completed in Cross Plains.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reports that property owners are paying 75 cents per square foot for the surfacing in front of their lots and that the city takes care of the cost for intersections. "The city has authority to levy paving liens where assessments are not met," the mayor said.

Now being paved is one block on 7th Street between Main and Avenue D, the street which runs along the southside of Freeman's Blacksmith Shop; a block and one-half in front of the housing project on Avenue E between 8th and 9th Streets, and a half-block on 9th from the Fire Station to Avenue E.

The paving is being done by Newman Paving Company of De Leon, which firm has surfaced about two miles of local streets in years past. The present project is the only paving planned for this year.

Raymond DeBusk, street commissioner, is overseeing the work now underway.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."
Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
 "The State Building Commission is created and its powers and duties are vested in the Commission. Its members shall consist of three citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each member shall be elected for a term of two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."
 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

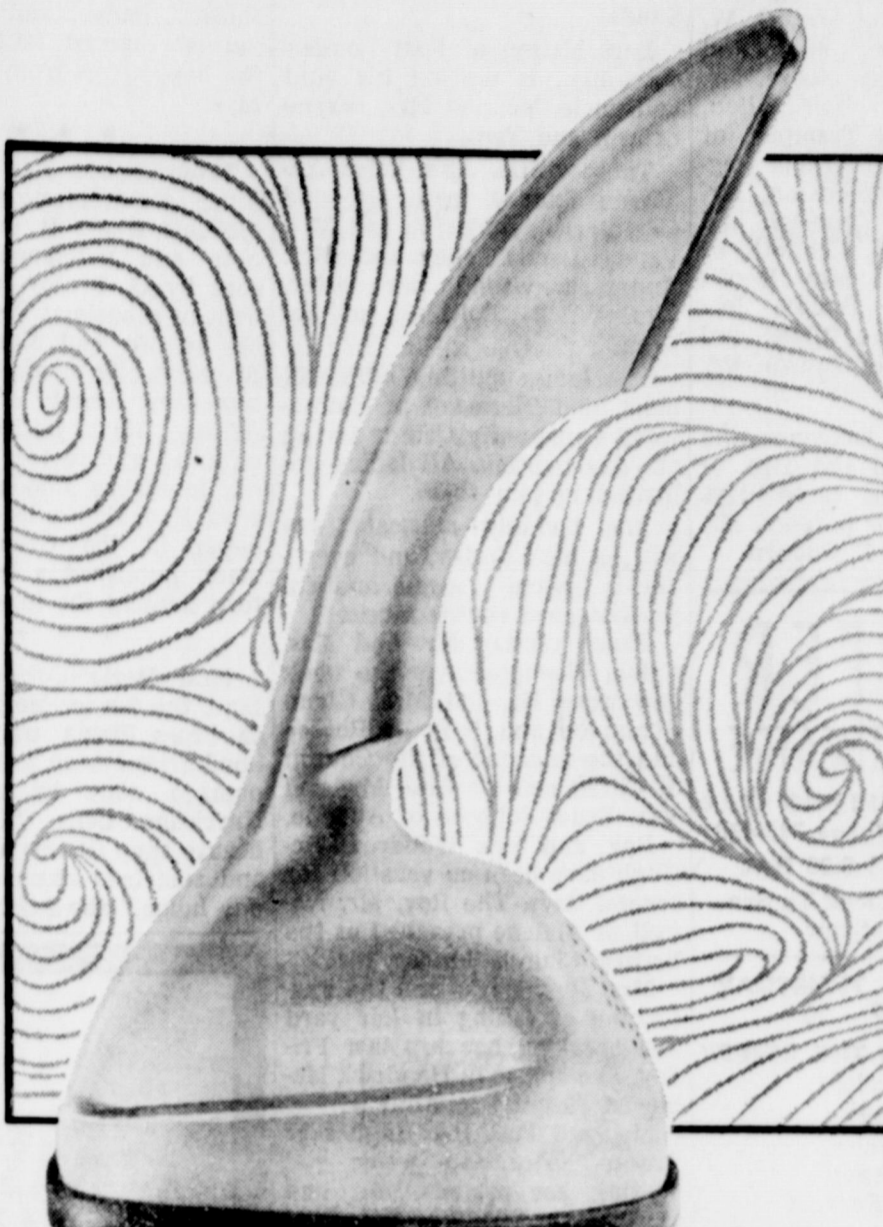

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PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for wilful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties; which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

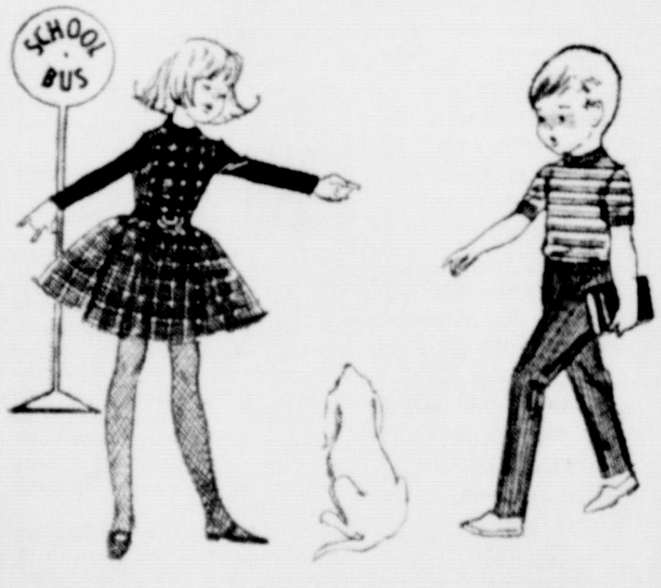
