Bransford Eubank, Cross Cut rancher, is presently in Uganda, East Africa, where he is representing Technoserve, Inc., a non-profit charitable organization which seeks to update agriculture in backward countries, as a means of helping natives to better support themselves.
After two weeks in Uganda, where he will be concerned primarily with introducing rice planting, Eubank will go to Ethiopia for a six-weeks stint as an agricultural consultant.
In addition to being a practical rancher, Eubank formerly taught agriculture at Howard Payne College in Brownwood. He was for a number of years a Presbyterian missionary in the Orient.

Priest From Quintana Roo, Mexico Visits Local Farms

Father Walter Winnich of Carillo Puerto, Territory of Quintana Roo, Mexico, visited in Cross Plains last week with the Harold Garrett family. He was interested in seeing root-planting equipment, which Garrett had recommended for use in Central America, during a visit by the local man to a remote Mayan Indian village as an agricultural consultant for Technoserve, Inc., an American charitable organization.
Garrett explains that the Indians presently farm by burning forests and planting corn in holes, punched with sharp sticks. No attempt is made to remove stumps.
Garrett was accompanied on the recent trip by his wife and their young son, James. The boy was the first white child ever seen by people of that area and Mrs. Garrett was the first white woman ever there. The village was reached by a long, arduous jeep ride.
Efforts are now being made to get heavy machinery into the area and clear agricultural lands.
"Modern methods are needed to raise the average family income from \$80 per year," Garrett said.
Technoserve has asked that Garrett return to the Territory

Experts Rate Buffaloes Lowest In Football Circuit

Cross Plains Buffaloes will get first taste of outside opposition Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium when the Class AA Cisco Loboes will arrive for a scrimmage session.
Cold water was dashed on hopes of Buffalo fans last week when the yearly poll conducted by the Abilene Reporter-News rated the Thundering Herd in last place in the six-team District 10-A, which Cross Plains, Early and Goldthwaite moved into this year.
Abilene's poll differs slight-

ly with Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine ratings published earlier. Campbell rated Cross Plains a fifth place finish, ahead of Early.
In District 10-A warfare, Campbell rated Ranger the favorite to win the crown, but in the latest poll Goldthwaite was given the top spot, just ahead of Ranger. De Leon and Dublin exchanged spots in the two prognostications with De Leon, defending champion of the old 10-A alignment, holding third place in last week's

poll. Abilene projections also lifted Early into fifth place ahead of Cross Plains.
Head Coach Mack McConal said last week after his charges went through an intra-squad scrimmage session, "We (the Buffs) looked good." He added that offensively the team looked real sharp, but qualified that statement by adding that the number two defensive unit furnished opposition to the varsity offense.
He said that spirit of the team is good, and that leadership

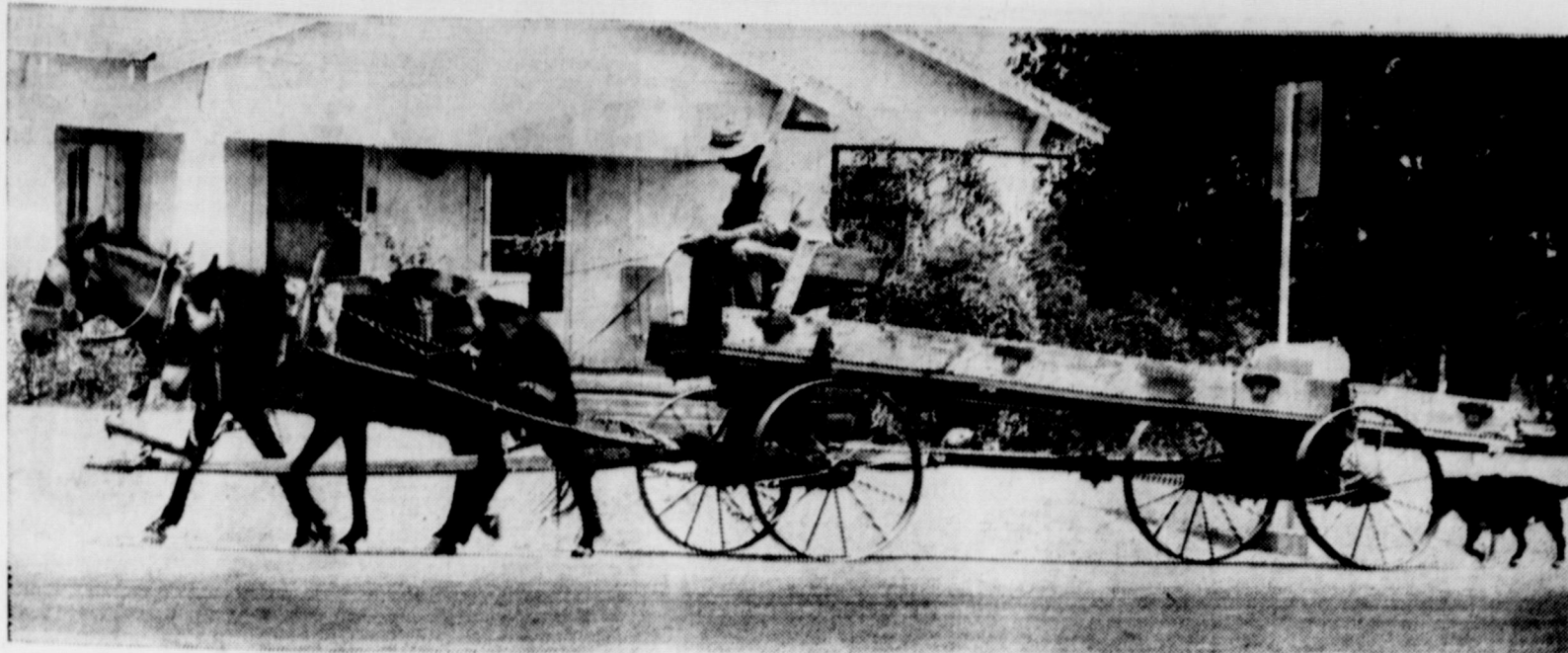
