Hunting-dog fanciers from a wide swath of Texas will converge on Cross Plains Saturday for annual convention of Star Fox Hunters Association. Convention will be held in the City Park, on State Highway 36, in the western edge of town.

Class For Nurses To Open Tuesday

A nurses aide training class will begin in Cross Plains Tuesday night, Sept. 15. It will be held in the S.O.S. Center on West 8th Street, starting at 7 p.m.

The class will be taught by Mrs. Mary Knott, a licensed vocational nurse and will continue through 70 hours of classroom instruction. Those successfully passing the course will receive a nurses aide certificate.

\$151,500 Set Up For County Roads

Four state highway improvement projects are scheduled in Callahan County, calling for expenditure of \$151,500. The work will be in four separate segments.

Estimated cost of 5.7 miles of seal coating from I. H. 20 to Eula, on FM Road 603, is \$12,500.

Estimated cost of 9.6 miles of seal coating from I. H. 20 to Putnam south toward Cross Plains, on FM Road 880, is \$13,600.

Estimated cost of 5.7 miles of seal coating on I. H. 20 from a point two miles east of Baird is \$47,000. Another project to start at that point and provide seal coating to the Eastland County line, a distance of 8.9 miles, is expected to cost \$73,400.

\$100 REWARD POSTED TO CAPTURE VANDALS

A reward of \$100 is being offered by the City of Cross Plains for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person, or persons, who turned on a fireplug some time after midnight Sunday and wasted 150,000 gallons of water.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said the plug is on George Scott Street in the Tom Bryant Addition.

In addition to needless waste, the dissipation of the city's reserve water supply is reported to have imperiled life and property if a fire had broken out.

"We want the offenders caught and severely punished," said a spokesman for the city.

Cross Plains Buffaloes will open the 1970 football campaign Friday at 8 p.m. hosting the Wylie Bulldogs in a non-conference clash.

The Thundering Herd will be attempting to snap an opening game victory drought covering the past four seasons. Not since 1965, when Bisons dumped Early 26-0, has a Buffalo team won its initial game. Buffs will also be seeking to end a two-year victory string that Wylie owns over the Herd. In 1968 Friday's visitors took a 19-13 decision, and last year the District 7-A Bulldogs romped to a 39-0 verdict.

Robert Lewis, 160-pound senior who was an all-district selection at tackle last year, is now at end, Darrell Walker, 170-pound junior, an alternate last season, is also wearing tackle numbers.

Remainder of the forward veterans are expected to be made up of largely inexperienced juniors and sophomores.

Pancake is the only proven veteran in the backfield. Although two others, Rodney Renfro, 145 sophomore, and Brad Harris, 130 senior, saw some action in 1969, the backfield is not proven.

Melton and Harris were elected team captains last week.

Wylie Veterans

The big plus for Wylie's chances this season is the veteran backfield. Three of the quartet are proven runners. Tailback Gary Clark, 160, Fullback Larry Brown, 160, and Halfback Virgil Hobbs, 165, are all seniors. The signal caller, Joe Bob Stricklin, is said to be a mature sophomore who tips the scales at 185.

Up front Wylie is also plagued with inexperience. Still two senior lettermen return. They are Center Dale Cheairs, 170, and Tackle Lloyd Couch, 175.

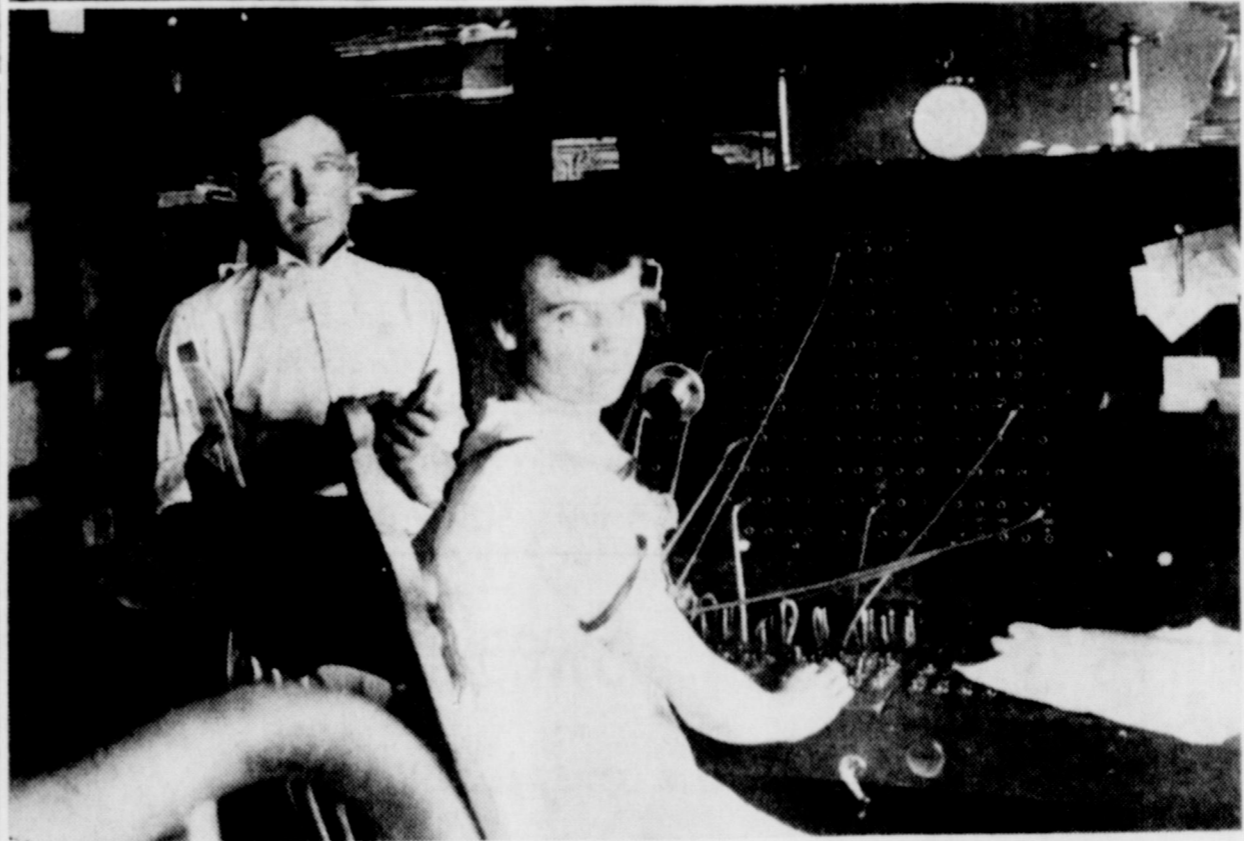
Burkett Still Wet After Liquor Vote

Early Day Phone Operator Recalls Interesting Happenings

Editor's Note: Oliver Wolfe of Austin, a native of Cross Plains, writes an interesting reminiscence of early days in Cross Plains, telling of experiences as a telephone operator in the town, which had just moved from the banks of Turkey Creek to its present location.

I was the night operator. About 9 or 10 p.m. when the board got quiet, I would pull the bed over by the switchboard, turn on the night bell, and go to sleep. When a call came in, the bell would wake

me. It usually was someone wanting a doctor. There were three good doctors in Cross Plains: Dr. T. C. Cochran, Dr. John Tyson and Dr. R. Robertson. Always when they drove out of town on a call, they would tell us where they were going. If that party had a telephone, we could contact them there.

Party Lines
Most of our subscribers were on party lines, sometimes as many as six. When we rang someone all the receivers would go up. A lot of our calls were from people whose clocks

had stopped, wanting to know what time it was.

We didn't have electricity. The board was operated with dry cell batteries. Walton Wagner owned the telephone company, and he sure was a good boss. After an ice storm or other bad weather, the lines would get crossed and down. Mr. Wagner would send his son, Ross, and me out in a backboard wagon to look for trouble and to fix it.

I recall the first time they let me put on a pair of climbing spikes to climb my first pole to replace a broken insulator.

The office was located upstairs over the barber shop and Cross Plains Mercantile Company on 8th Street, behind the bank. The steps leading upstairs to the office provided a gathering place for old timers to whittle and talk about old times.

One of the regulars who came every day was John T. Gilbert. His many friends would stop to talk. I recall one night loud noises and pistol shots aroused me. I went to the window and looked down. It was dark. I couldn't tell who they were, but there must have been 8 or

10 on horseback. It wasn't long before I got a call for the sheriff, who was John Moore in Baird. By the time he got here the rowdy boys were gone.

Business Firms

Some of the business houses that we got lots of calls for were: Davis-Garner, B. L. Boydston, The Mercantile Company, Higginbotham Bros. & Company, Sam Sipes and Edwin Neeb, hide and cream buyers, Lee Jones Ice House, MK&T Depot, Robertson's Drug Store, Fos Bond's Bank, Sid Monsey's Blacksmith Shop, Knight's Live-ry Stable and the Kemper and

Central Hotels.

Once in a while someone would want to place a long distance call to Fort Worth. To get through we would call Rising Star. They would call DeLeon, Dublin, Stephenville, Granbury, then Fort Worth. With that many connections, we had to repeat every word that was said — I mean hoot and holler! Sometimes it would take two or three hours to complete a call. With the service like it is now, in just seconds you can get New York or Los Angeles. It wasn't like that in 1913.



Harvest Vehicles Receive Cautions

In an effort to prevent local farmers being subjected to highway use fines — as occurred here last year — reminders are made for the approaching harvest season.

Texas law places the following requirements, believed to be of particular concern to farmers of the Cross Plains area:

1. Truck weight limitations: no single axle may exceed 18,000 pounds; no tandem axle may go beyond 32,000. Maximum gross weight of any vehicle or combination of vehicles is 72,000 pounds.
2. All trucks must be registered for their gross weight allowed or their actual gross weight when loaded. License receipt for commercial vehicles must be carried at all times.
3. All trucks must be equipped with all requirements to be approved for a motor vehicle inspection certificate and must display a current sticker.
4. Operator of a truck carrying in excess of one ton must be a licensed commercial operator.
5. Trailer weight limits are same as for trucks. A trailer with 4,000 pounds or less used by a farmer to haul his own products needs no registration. Trailers over 4,000 pounds, but not over 10,000 pounds and used by a farmer to haul his own products may be registered with the \$5.30 farm trailer plate. All trailers with a gross weight over 4,000 pounds must display valid registration.
6. A trailer weighing over 4,000 but not 15,000 may be used to haul cotton and cottonseed with the \$5.30 farm plate.
7. Trailers with farm plates are subject to following: (a) When gross weight exceeds 4,000 pounds the speed must be at 30 MPH or less, (b) Cannot be used for hire, (c) Cannot use metal tires or wheels, (d) Must have adequate hitch to prevent breakaway.

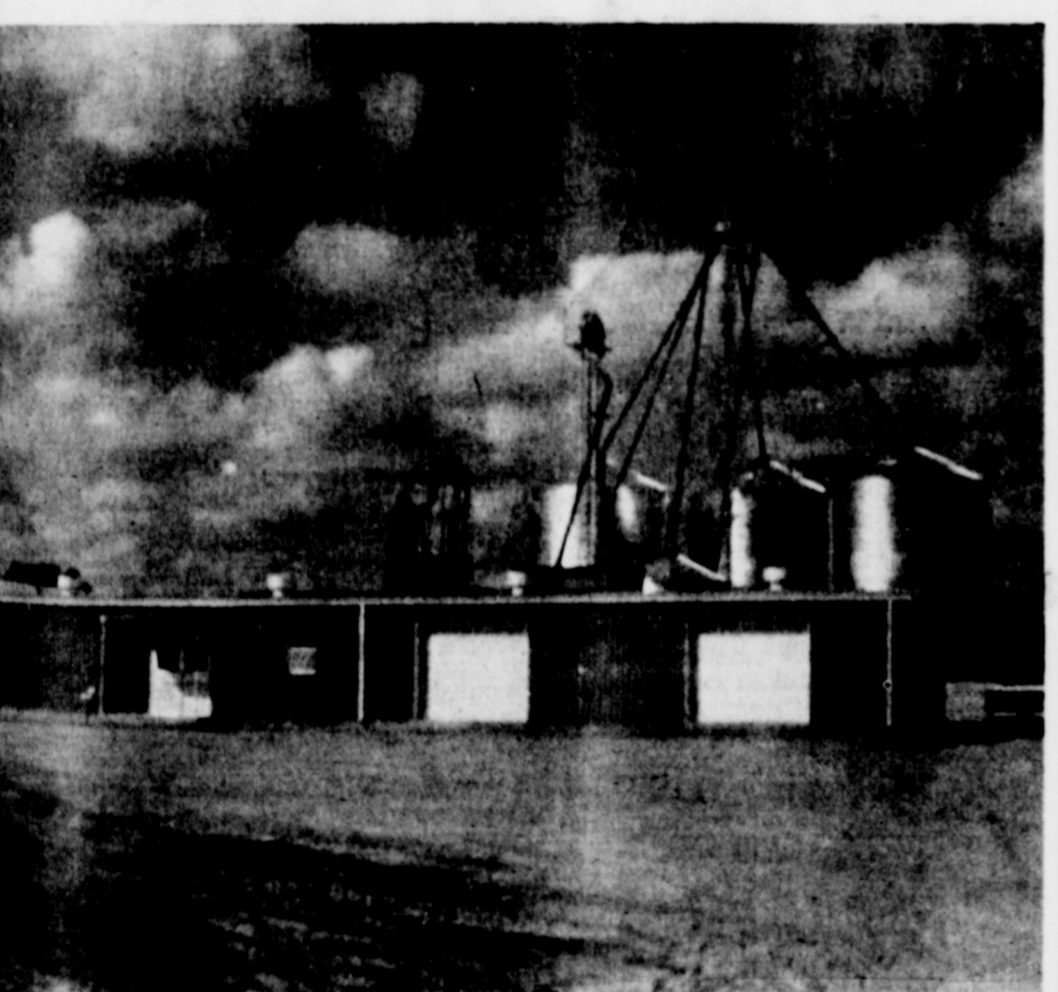

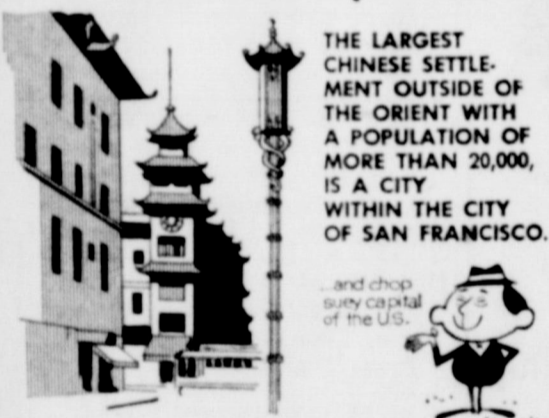

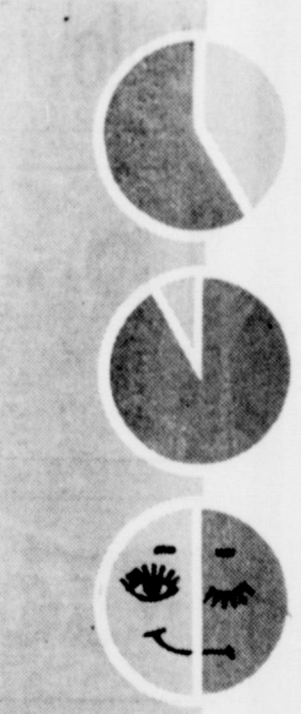
