SIXTY-SECOND YEAR

U. F. Fund Drive Ends In Success

The ladies have scored again. Fifty-one women, headed by Mrs. J. Peyton Smith and Mrs. Mike Cunningham, conducted a one-day campaign Thursday to raise funds for Cross Plains United Fund. They had been given a quota of \$2,904 to finance the charitable organization during the ensuing 12 months and indications late Tuesday were that the amount would be reached.

Jack W. Tunnell, U.F. treasurer, revealed yesterday that \$2,643.86 has been banked, and several large donors are yet unreported. It is always a week or so before all gifts are paid in, he explained, pointing out that several chain-owned firms necessarily take this matter up with their home offices.

Mrs. Smith, who has either

served as head or co-chairman of at least 10 United Fund campaigns in Cross Plains, said Tuesday that she had never seen finer cooperation from both donors and solicitors than was evidenced Thursday. She and Mrs. Cunningham jointly thanked all ladies who worked and the contributors who responded so enthusiastically.

The \$2,904 sought this year has been budgeted as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$700, Medical and Research Foundation of Texas \$50, M. D. Anderson Tumor and Research Center \$500, Salvation Army \$175, American Red Cross \$175, Girl Scouts (Council and Local) \$404.32, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Local and Transient Relief \$500 and Christmas Cheer (Goodfellows Program) \$300.

Lest We Forget

A holiday which means a great deal to many people is about to be observed in America. It is today, Nov. 11, and used to be called Armistice Day, but is now Veterans Day, a time designated by Congress to honor veterans of all wars in which this country was ever engaged.

As oldsters recall, Nov. 11, 1918, marked the cessation of hostilities in World War I. It was a day of glory, a time when the nation went wild with joy. Cross Plains has seen many happy occasions but none surpassed the jubilation of that event.

Although the holiday is now for all war veterans, it probably means more to the "Doughboys of '18" than to any other group, for it was actually their day of triumph; it meant the end of Kaiser Bill, farewell to muddy trenches and struggle for survival.

Hundreds of young men from the Cross Plains area served their country during the great World War I. Their numbers are thinning fast, however, and average age of those who still live is believed to be near the middle seventies. The Review made an effort to secure the names of all veterans of World War I now living in this immediate locality. Hereunder are listed 36. There are certainly others, but inability to make the roll positively complete seems insufficient reason to deny this salute to the heroes of yesteryear.

"Persons living out in the district, away from Abilene, are urged to send a card or letter to Box 3258, Abilene

79604, and tell us when it will be best for us to call them to help with their social security problems. They should be certain to give their telephone number and the day and time best for them to get a call.

"We will do all within our power to call at the time and day given us; however, in some few instances it may become necessary for us to call at a time other than that specified," Tuley explained.

Buffs To Host Dublin At Grid Finale Friday

Dublin Lions will invade Buffalo Stadium Friday at 7:30 p.m. for the final 1970 football game for both elevens.

Only the visitors will have anything at stake in the District 10-A scrap. The Lions hold third place in the league with a 2-2 mark, and a loss to the Buffaloes would mean that the Herd, and probably Ranger, would share the spot.

Comparative scores and statistics rate the Lions solid favor-

ites. Dublin defeated Ranger by one point early in loop warfare, and the latter dealt Buffaloes a 57-0 licking last week. Both units fell to Goldthwaite, Buffs 61-0 and Lions 42-7, and De Leon, Cross Plains 55-6 and Dublin 20-7.

Records show Friday's visitors to be far superior defensively. The Lions have given nine opponents just 142 points, a mean of just under 14 points, while Bisons have surrendered a whopping 292, an average of over 32. Offensively Dublin has tallied 101 points, and Cross Plains has scored 80.

Dublin is loaded with seniors, at least 11 at first of the year, and 10 lettered on the 1-9 squad of 1969. Ironically the team is led by a senior non-letterman, Rocky Ford, at quarterback. He has quality in running backs Gary Couch, 187, and Troy James, 165.

The Lion line is blessed with good size. At least four of the forward warriors hit the 200-pound mark, although the letterman of the group is tackle Bo Henderson. Lions have two all-district performers back in Rickey Greer, 160-pound end, and Richard Thiebaud, 155-pound guard.

Local Families Reported In Strong Financial Condition

Residents of Callahan County seem to have their financial affairs under good control. As a whole, they are living well within their incomes, spending much less than they are earning.

Some of the surplus is being used by them to reduce their consumer debt. The remainder, or a considerable part of it, is being put into savings. The evidence is seen in the rise in their bank deposits, in their savings and loan accounts

and in their purchases of U. S. savings bonds.

During the past year, it is estimated, Callahan County families stashed away some \$1,014,000 in liquid assets.

As with people in other parts of the country, they have grown cautious. High prices, unemployment, strikes and other economic conditions have led them to postpone some of their big-ticket purchases and wait for a more favorable climate. Meanwhile, they are accumu-

lating a sizeable nest egg. This pool of purchasing power, when released, could spark a big buying surge.

The figures on savings are based upon national findings reported by the Commerce Department and other agencies and upon income and sales data for each community.

They show, as would be expected, that the amount a family can save depends primarily on how much it has left after paying its bills for necessities.

Those with merely subsistence incomes were not able to save anything, of course.

Those at the \$5,000 after-tax level put aside 3.0 per cent of it, on average, and those at \$7,000 about 5.2 per cent. In the higher income brackets the rates were considerably larger.

In Callahan County, where the average disposable income per household was \$6,124 last year, according to the latest annual report, the over-

all rate of savings was 4.6 per cent. It amounted to \$280 per household.

Implied is that the rate in each community is similar, for each income group, to what it is in the rest of the country.

For the local population as a whole, the savings in the past year reached the imposing total of \$1,014,000.

Nationally, such savings are touching \$42.8 billion for the year, an increase of \$5.2 billion over the previous year.

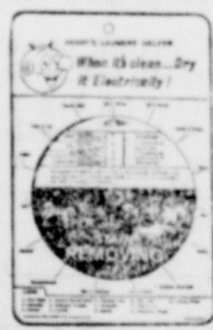

Mrs. L. P. Henslee, 78, Buried In Anson

Mrs. L. P. Henslee, 78, of Anson, widow of a former publisher of the Cross Plains Review, died Saturday at West Texas Medical Center in Abilene after a brief illness.

Funeral was held Tuesday at 3 p.m. from the First Baptist Church in Anson. Burial was in Mt. Hope Cemetery at Anson.

Mrs. Henslee was born Zora Mae Carter Aug. 5, 1892, at Cottenwood. She attended Simmons College and taught school until her marriage to Lem P. Henslee Sept. 16, 1915. Mr. Henslee was then editor of the Review. The couple moved from Cross Plains to Anson in 1923 where Mr. Henslee was editor and publisher of the Western Enterprise for 30 years. He died Aug. 8, 1958. She had been a resident of a rest home in Abilene the past several years.

Survivors are one son, Col. Lem Paul Henslee, U. S. Air Force, Omaha, Neb.; one daughter, Mrs. Ace G. (Zoann) Powers of Albuquerque, N. M.; eight grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

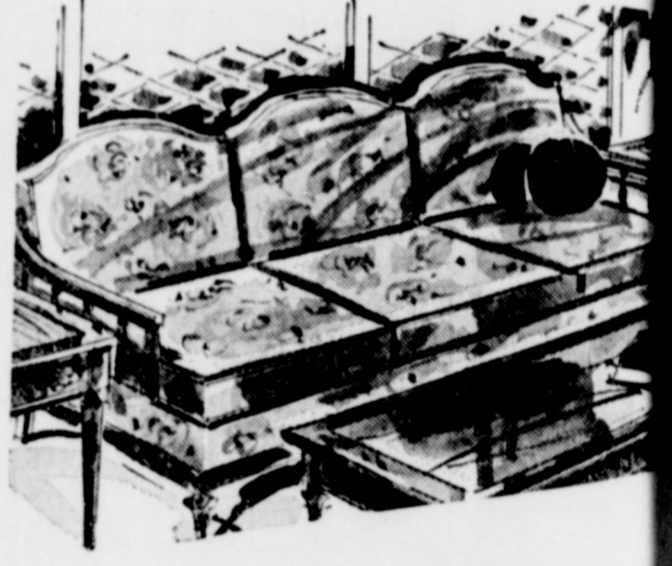

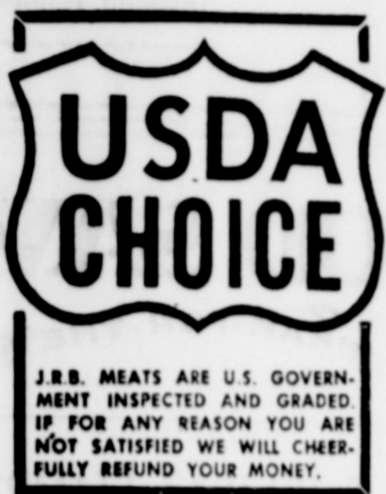

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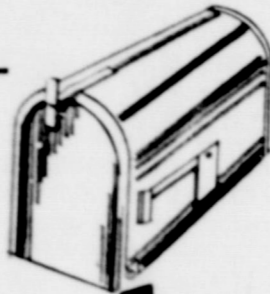

Ranger's Awesome Power Humbles Buffaloes 57 To 0

Long runs and passing bombs burned Cross Plains Buffaloes last Friday night as host Ranger Bulldogs humbled the Herd 57-0 in a District 10-A football clash.

As the scoreboard indicated, Ranger's offensive unit ran rampant amassing 751 yards total net offense. On the ground the Bulldogs collected 464 yards, and 287 yards came through the air. Cross Plains got 320 yards, 229 of that came on the ground.

Ranger's only lost fumble delayed scoring onslaught briefly. Bulldogs took the opening kick and marched to the Herd's six where a Bison smothered the loose pigskin. It took the hosts just two plays after the Buff punt to score on a 35-yard pass from Quarterback Jesse Speer to Halfback Roger Rutledge. Speer got the two-point conversion with 7:26 left in first quarter. Just over two minutes later Quarterback Billy Fox passed 28 yards to Halfback Rae Rippy. With 8:23 left in the second stanza Rutledge raced 57 yards for a 20-0 edge.

A 57-yard Buffalo march died at the Ranger one midway of the second period, and four plays later Rutledge raced 56 yards into gloryland. Pass from Speer to End Milton Monroe for the two bonus points put the halftime score at 28-0.

Two plays after Ranger got the ball in second half, Bulldogs tallied. Speer got the six-point-er on a five yard run after Fullback Mike de Los Santos rambled 70 yards. Fox got the two points with 11:08 left in the third. Less than two minutes later Rippy spurted four yards into paydirt. With 1:51 left in the third canto, after a Cross Plains drive bogged at the Ran-

ger 16, Fox passed 28 yards to Halfback Robert Garcia, and a good kick made the score 49-0.

Buffaloes cranked up for a 73-yard march to the Ranger seven before losing possession. Bulldogs moved the Herd's 13, but a 30-yard field goal attempt was short and wide. Theft of a Buff pass with a 25-yard runback and a 15-yard penalty against the Herd put the ball on the Cross Plains 35. Three plays later Rutledge circled right end for the last 10 yards. Halfback Mike Myers got the final two bonus points with 46 seconds left.

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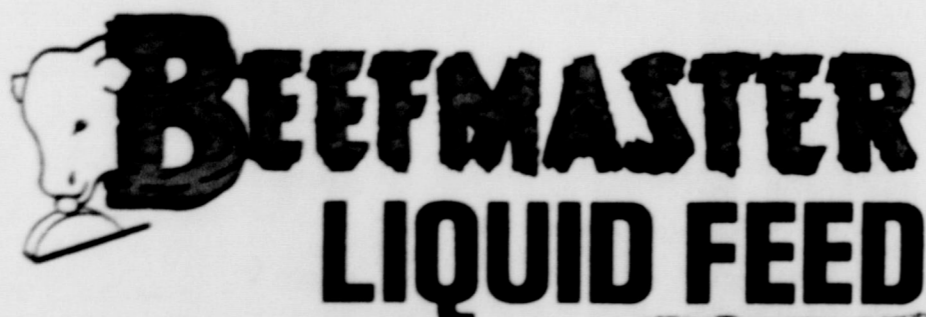

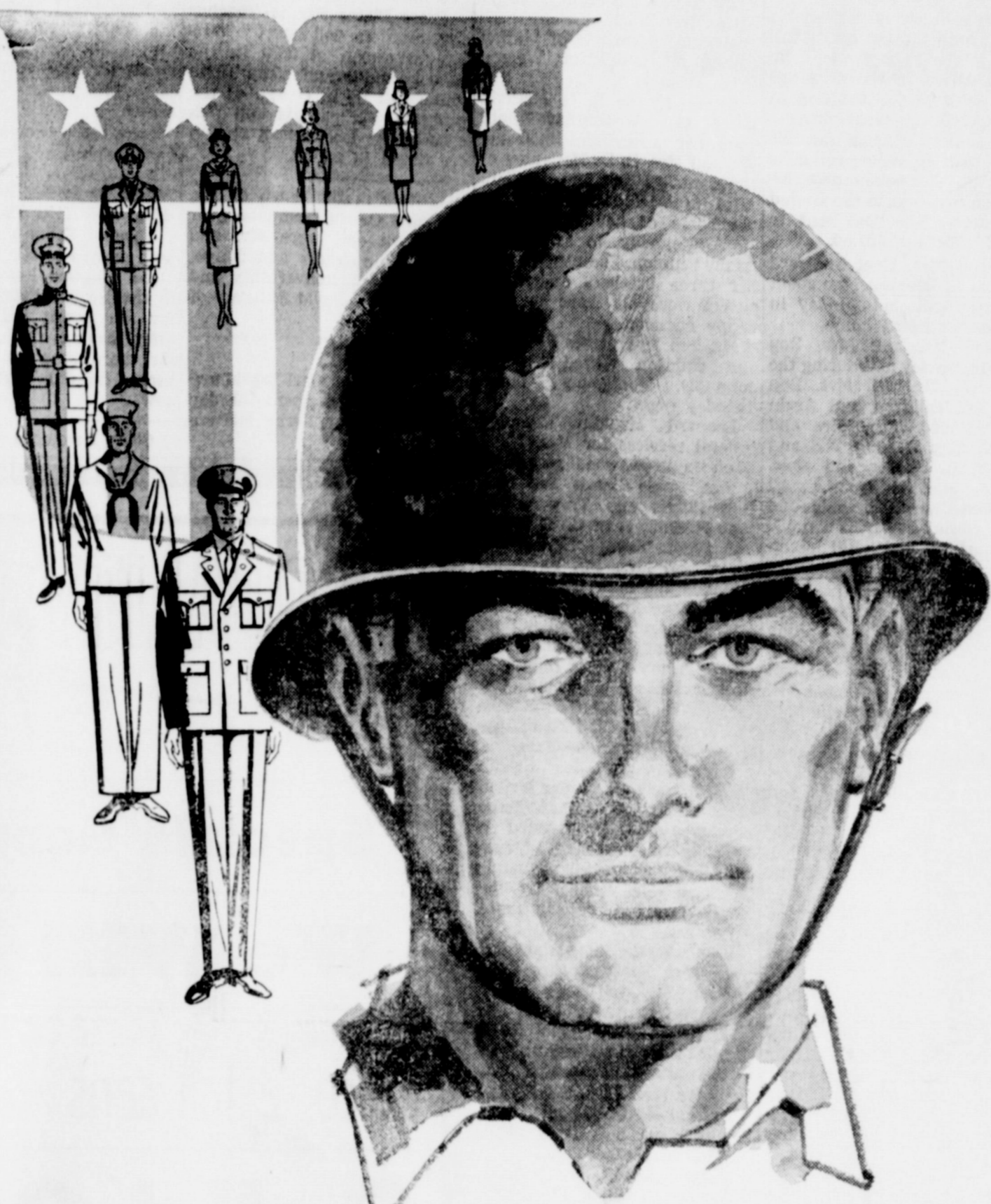

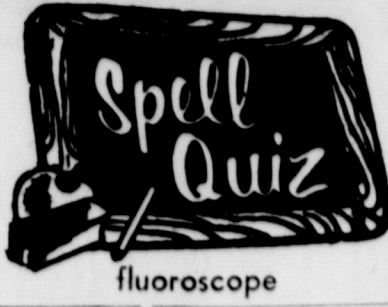
